Over \$500 Collected In Red Cross Drive

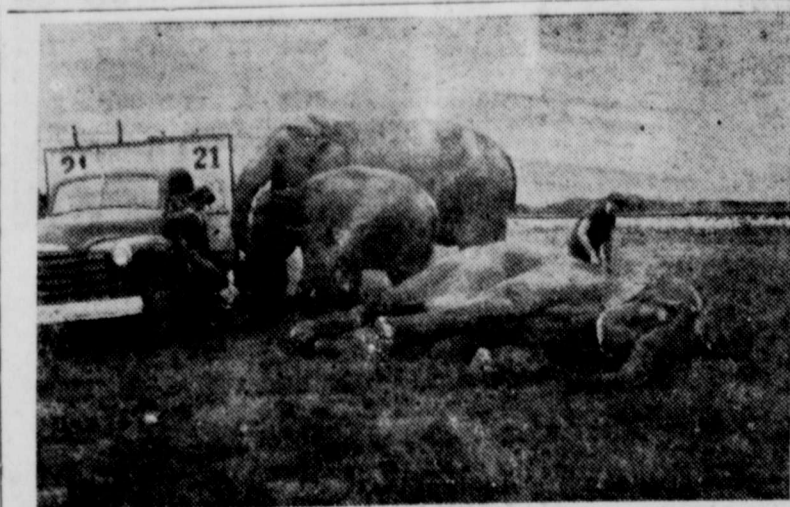
The Annual Red Cross drive conducted last Monday evening netted over \$500.00 according to Jerry Thomas, campaign chairman.

Building Permits Are Being Issued Every Day

Building permits hit a new record for the first quarter of 1961.

Permits were issued for \$628,055.00 during January, February and March. This is compared with \$329,000.00 during the same period of 1960.

It was some time in June before the permits went over the \$600,000.00 mark during 1960.

According to recent surveys made by the Savings & Loan Association and the Chamber of Commerce office, building in Burk has progressed at a fantastic rate.

Private construction, such as homes and businesses, churches, any building done with private investment during the past five years, has been to the tune of \$8,418,000.00. And public construction, city and schools, has totaled \$1,865,000.00 for a grand total during the past five years of \$10,283,000.00 in construction in Burk Burnett.

With its estimate of 2000 families in Burk Burnett, 675 or 1/3 are living in homes less than five years old.

Total income for Burk Burnett citizens has been estimated at \$14,040,000.00 for 1960. This compares with \$3,173,000.00 estimated income in 1950. If present trend continues, the Chamber of Commerce estimates a population increase of 875 more people and \$1,575,000 more local income during 1961.

The Wichita Falls Dinner is one of 39 being held in April by the Texaco Quarter Century clubs throughout the country according to Mr. P. Pool.

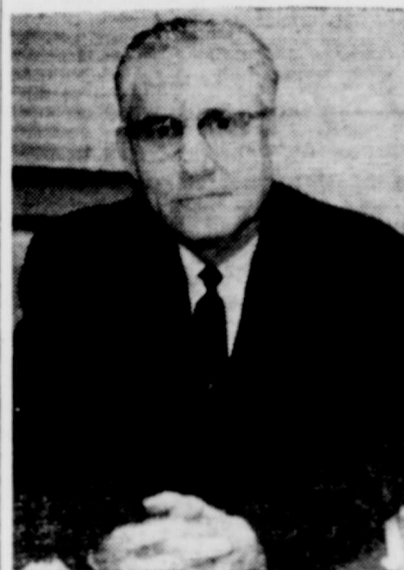

N. Y. School Ordered Stop Segregation

On the oft-expressed premise that it is the unusual that is news, one would have expected far wider publicity for a recent school integration order by a federal judge than it received.

What made this particular order unusual is that it was handed down, not in some southern state, but in New York. Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman found that the board of education of New Rochelle, upper-bracket residential suburb of New York City, had deliberately gerrymandered school districts to create a segregated school for Negroes. He ordered the board to present to him a desegregated plan for the fall school term.

Let it be emphasized that it is the judge's order that is unusual in the North, not the practice of gerrymandering school districts. The practice is quite common and amounts to hidden segregation in the states which look down their noses at those few remaining states where segregation is still openly practiced.

It may be indeed, that if the N. A. A. C. P. were as active in breaking up segregation in the North as it is in the South, there would be quite as many orders issued in the North to comply with the Supreme Court edict as there are in the South.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

SIMSBURY, CONN., HERALD: "In Washington today, the legislative machinery is being lubricated for the effort to increase the minimum wage to \$1.25 per hour. There are some people who think it's sinful to oppose an increase in the minimum wage law. They hold that opposition to it is heartless. Yet many of the same people may find themselves unemployed should the minimum wage law be increased to \$1.25 per hour."

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

One of the major headline making issues on Capitol Hill is to raise the minimum wage to \$1.25 per hour and include under the law retail and service trade workers.

There are many facets to this issue, but with the great American sin of over-simplification, probably nurtured by the fact in Western horse operas, there is always a "good guy" and a "bad guy," the anti and pro of this C. W. Harder measure are tagged in two categories. Those opposed are die hard reactionaries trying to drag America backward. Those supporting are liberal progressives seeking to move America forward. Obviously, neither position is completely right.



The nation's independent businessmen, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have opposed raising, or extending scope, of minimum wage law.

By and large, the reasoning appears to be, what good can be accomplished except perhaps in a few very isolated instances. For example, what family can lead the abundant life if paid only \$1.25 for a 40 hour week. Or again, who can hire reliable help at \$1.25 per hour today. Thus, what good would be accomplished?

On the other hand, recognizing there may be some isolated instances of very low paid labor, is it wise to burn down the barn to destroy a few rats?

A far greater consideration

is tied up with the growing problem that is somewhat loosely termed juvenile delinquency.

It is natural for youth to have energy. It is also natural to a large segment of youth to use up some of that energy in doing something they feel useful. For example, a large part of the men now engaged in the communications industry in some phase started out doing part time work in a print shop, washing up presses. Many men in all walks of life today first learned feeling of having their own pocket money, first learned good work habits, doing odd jobs around garages, stores, shops, other enterprises.

Actually, nobody is born with good work habits. This is something that must be learned. A youth who grows up without learning good work habits runs the danger of being fit only to be a bum or a bureaucrat.

But many businessmen report they do not feel they can give odd jobs to what could be enterprising youth even at the present minimum wage level of \$1 per hour, to say nothing of all the forms that have to be filled with bureaucrats.

Businessmen report they have jobs that boys, or even severely handicapped people could perform if they could legally pay at a rate commensurate with the lack of work experience. But when faced with paying even \$1 per hour, they are better off paying \$2 per hour to casual adult laborer who knows how to work with minimum of supervision. Thus, raising the minimum wages promises to accomplish little, if any good, but a vast amount of harm to nation's most valuable asset . . . it's youth.

**ORDINANCE NO. 251**  
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 245 OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS, BY ADDING A NEW SECTION THERETO PROHIBITING PLACING LITTER IN STREETS:

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett, Texas:

SECTION I.  
That Ordinance No. 245 of the Ordinances of Burkburnett, Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as to add thereto a new section to read as follows:

"SECTION 9-A—The leaving or the placing of kitchen garbage, trash or rubbish or material or dirt or soil by the leveling of any lot, in any street or alley, within the City Limits of Burkburnett, Texas, is prohibited and is a violation of this ordinance, and shall be subject to a fine as defined in Ordinance No. 245, of the Ordinances of the City of Burkburnett, Texas."

SECTION II.  
The fact that there is no adequate regulation preventing the littering of the streets of Burkburnett, Texas, creates an urgency and emergency for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and general welfare, creates an emergency and requires that this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication, and it is accordingly so ordained.

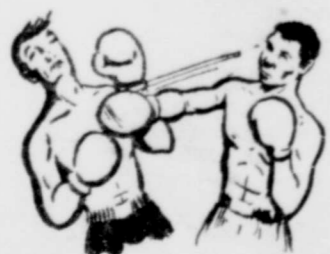
