

The report states that from 1954 to 1960 the total small business share of military busi-ness declined from 25.3% to 16.1%, or a drop of about one-third.



Here's my advice for oven-eleaning: Sponge off lining with warm soapy water just as soon as the oven cools. If spots prove difficult to get off, leave 1/4th cup of ammonia in the oven overnight. Then wipe off spots the sext morning with a damp cloth.

Several readers have sent in

questions about farm shop specifications and equipment. QUESTION: What do you consider a good size for a farm shop

ANSWER: When constructing a special building for your shop, we suggest you make it at least 30x30 feet and design it in such a way that it can be ngthened at a later date if needs require. Include space for tools, benches, building materials, heating unit, and for safe working on farm equipment. Make the door at least 16 feet and other equipment can be driven inside.

QUESTION: I'm planning to get a portable electric generator for my farm and am wondering what size to buy. What do you suggest?

ANSWER. A good size generator for the average farm has a capacity of 5 kilowatts, supplies 115 volts of direct current. Things to look for: Carrying handle for easy moving, full shock-mounting with direct connected coupling, heavy-duty rewind starter, two three-pronged receptacles, also accommodating standard twoprong plugs. Buy your portable electric generator with an eye toward using it for on-the-spot powering of portable electric tools around the farm, as well as for emergency power.

QUESTION: I'm rewiring my workshop. What spacing would you recommend for the light outlets? My shop is 26x32.

ANSWER: Figure a ceiling light every 200 square feet, to eliminate shadows over wide areas where you may be working on equipment parked in the shop. Over the work benches there should be lighting outlets every 8 to 10 feet to provide brighter illumination in these close-work areas. You should have 115-volt service to accommodate any electric power tools you may want to use.


A. Three different grades of abrasives are enough to get a good finish on most material, though some perfectionists use up to six different abrasives, going from

coarse to very fine. The best progression for finishing plastics begins with 36 or 40 grit, goes to 60 or 80 grit and winds up with 100



Abrasives are designated in two ways, by symbol or grit size. The most common sizes (first number is the symbol): 3=24 grains per square inch; 21/2=30, 2=36, 11/2=40. $\frac{1}{2} = 60$, 1/0 = 80, 2/0 = 100, 3/0 = 120. 4/0=150, 5/0=180, 6/0=220,7/0=240, 9/0 = 320. 8/0 = 280. 10/0=400. 11/0=500, 12/0=600.

Silicon carbide abrasives cover this entire range; aluminum oxide covers all but the very-fine grits, and garnet goes only to 8/0. Carbigrit, a lifetime abrasive material made of carbide bonded to metal, is available in three popular grades: 80 (medium coarse), 120 (medium), and 150 (medium fine).

B. T. Haws, county agent says actually a dead mesquite tree is worth more than a live one. A live mesquite, 10 inches in diameter ,will use a ton of water to produce a pound of beans. A reader writes to ask us whether the new metal sanding sheets now on the home workshop market have to be used differently than sandpaper. "I had difficulty getting a smooth finish on a homemade bookcase with one of those metal sheets in my power sander. The metal sheet seemed too coarse. Is it supposed to be used differently than sandpaper?"

This reader has reference, we believe, to the new permanent abrasive sheets-carbide abrasive material bonded to metal. You must select the proper grit in permanent abrasive sheets just as you do with sandpaper. These metal sanding sheets are made in various degrees of coarseness, so for finish sanding you should select a metal sheet with fine grit.

The reader who sent in the sanding query no doubt was using too coarse an abrasive. As far as difference in method of using sandpaper or metal sanding sheets, there is none.

QUESTION: I had planned to buy a 4-inch portable electric drill as the first power tool for my home shop but a friend told me I'd be smarter to buy a %-inch drill. Is he right? ANSWER: It depends entirely

upon the extent of the projects you plan to undertake. For small work, a 1/4-inch drill is adequate. A %-inch portable electric drill will do everything the 1/4-inch will do-plus heavier, more difficult jobs beyond the capabilities of the smaller drill. The average %-inch drill weighs about 41/2 pounds, only 1/2 pound more than the 1/4-inch, so a beginner should have no trouble with either. There's getting to be less and less difference costwise, too. Assuming you don't plan to limit your workshop projects in scope and don't object to a slight additional investment, you'll probably be happier with a %-inch

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
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
