





Markets, Jobs, and Living Standards

What stands in the way of maximum economic growth for this country and the ability of American enterprise to compete with top effectiveness and success in today's ruggedly competive world markets?

There is, obviously no single answer to so broad a question. But one of the barriers is certainly found in obsolete tax laws concerning the depreciation of industry's physical facilities, the tools, to use that word in its fullest sense, that are used to produce our goods and services.

A publication of The American Economic Foundation explains it this way: "The amount of tool money set aside by industry has been seriously affected by inflation and by the Federal law and regulations which limit the amount of depreciation to the original number of dollars invested and require that it be written off over a prescribed period of years.

"This means, for example, that a \$10,000 tool with a prescribed 20 year life, bought in 1940, would cost at least \$20,000 today, but under the law only \$10,000 could have been set aside at an annual rate set by the Treasurer Department.

In a recent issue of the New York Times Magazine, Dr. Alvin H. Hansen, the distinguished Harvard Economist and presently an advisor to President Kennedy, said: "Accelerated depreciation is designed to modernize American industry, to make it more efficient. Modernization is essential in order to hold our own competitively in international markets. And cost reducing improvements will raise the standard of living at home by making industry capable of turning out more goods at lower prices.

Low producers led all other reasons for removal of cows from herds with 13.8 percent. Other reasons, including death, diseases, accidents and old age accounted for the remaining 8.1 percent.
