





Personnel on duty have instructions to refuse any information to the general public over the phone, and to hang up immediately in order to clear the line.

Please become familiar with the following signals, as they give all necessary information:

1. Steady continuous sound for 3 minutes: An attack probable. You are to tune your radio to CONELRAD-640 or 1240-for instructions. Civil defense workers are to report to their places of assignment.

2. Warbling tone for 3 minutes: Attack imminent. You are to take cover immediately in best available shelter: or Tornado has been sighted and is headed toward Burkburnett. You are still to take all possible precautions immediately.

3. Steady continuous sound for at least 5 minutes: All clear signal. The "All Clear" signal will be sounded after all oncoming danger has passed.

You should become thoroughly familiar with the above 3 signals as they are for your benefit. The following signals are primarily for firemen, however, they are listed here for your information. The rules on phone usage still apply:

4. One steady continuous signal for at least 30 seconds but not more than 1 minute: Fire within the city limits.

5. Two distinct signals, not more than 30 seconds each: Fire outside the city limits.

6. Three distinct signals, not more than 30 seconds each: Other emergency where firemen are needed.

Sharon Cecilia Nix of Burk burnett, a citizen of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State now in progress in Austin, at the Texas School for the Blind, was appointed to the Texas Youth Council, and was elected as Federalist Candidate for County Judge of County I, in tonights election. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Nix and was sponsored to Girls State by the local American Legion Auxiliary unit, No. 264.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and nonpolitical, the purpose of the Girls State program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults. They learn the problems of government by performing the same duties as real office holders in the everyday world. The 1961 session of the Amer-

ican Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls, held at Baylor University in 1941 to become the larg-

est single extracurricular educa tional program for high school girls in Texas. This year, 399 girls are in attendance, making a total of more than 5,400 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program. Citizens are selected at local level, principally on a basis of character and leadership from students who have just completed their junior year in high school each year.
