Why Are More Taxes Necessary?

By Senator George Moffett

Texas is not the only state which has financial troubles. Twenty-four other states have already passed new tax laws this year and twelve others probably will do so before the year's end.

Among the reasons for new taxes in Texas are the growth of state services and the falling off in oil tax revenue. Oil wells are only allowed to produce 8 days per month at this time. Not many years ago they could produce 30 days per

The record breaking increase in the state's population is the principal reason why more taxes are necessary. Each year there is an increase of nearly 100,000 students in the public school system and also a heavy increase in college enrollment. It costs about \$275 per year per pupil to operate the public schools. 



Policybolder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

A. Estate shrinkage is a very real protection need for any ily that has begun to accumulate wealth of any kind, including life estimated that for even as



the estates may trative expenses. As these shrinkage items must be met immediately, it is essential that cash be available from some source, so that assets of the estate will not have to be put up for forced sale at a possible loss. As for the amount of estate shrinkage insurance you would need, you should consult an expert who would want to know the amount and nature of your total estate, including life insurance, and any factors that may affect the cost of transferring this estate to your beirs. Certainly, from the details you give, the need could not even

Q. I am considering a job in a small plant in the next town where they handle radioactive isotopes. The workers there are generally called atomic workers. Would this affect my life insurance?

A. This would not affect your existing life insurance at all. Once issued, nothing of this nature would affect it. And the only case in which this would affect any new life insurance you might purchase would be your involvement in the actual handling of the radioactive isotopes. Throughout the country, in all atomic plants, even the primary atomic energy plants, all but a small number of workers are insured at standard rates today. Those who would have to pay an extra rate would be the few who handle the isotopes. In fact, almost the only occupation uninsurable today at any rate would be jet test pilot.
