The Burkburnett Star is approaching two mile posts, separated by just one day. On September 11th, the Star will start on its 55th year of publication. On the following day, September 12th, the Star will be published twice weekly, on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

For the past several years the Star has been adding new and better equipment, a piece or two each year, as finances permitted and the needs demanded. This newspaper has, for some years, realized that our community was growing steadily. The paper has tried to keep up with that growth, in order to have the facilities necessary to offer more and better newpaper coverage when it was needed. We feel that the time for expansion has

A 250 to 400 pound calf can develop vitamin A deficiency symptoms within 45 to 60 days or less, unless your ration takes care of their needs.

Haws says that leafy green alfalfa hay, alfalfa leaf meal, or pellets are good sources of vitamin A. Commercial synthetic vitamin-A preparations are now available for mixing in rations also. Small amounts per ton of feed are required and they are considered inexpensive.



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

Reluctantly and sadly, the Veterans Administration has to make many insurance settlements it knows would not meet the wishes of deceased GI insurance policyholders.

It's all because too many veterans fail to check their insurance records and keep designated beneficiaries up to date, Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA Regional Office in Dal-

las said. "The law gives GI policyholders the right to change their beneficiaries at any time with-out the consent of the prior beneficiaries," Onstot pointed out. "But unless the change is officially made, no choice is given VA but to pay the claim to the beneficiary of record."

Too often, he added, victims of this carelessness are minor children and widows of a second marriage. If an ex-wife is still the beneficiary of record, VA has no recourse but to pay

her the policy settlement. GI insurance policyholders will soon receive a letter from one of the VA Insurance Centers asking each policyholder to designate or redesignate his

beneficiaries, Onstot said. Policyholders also have several options as to how the insurance can be paid. Information or changes in beneficiaries can be made at any VA office.



ORDINANCE NO. 256

ING THE LICENSING AND CONTROL OF CARNIVALS,

CIRCUSES, SHOWS, FEES,

WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF

AN EMERGENCY

AN ORDINANCE REGULAT-

Section 2. PERMIT REQUIRED A permit shall be issued by order of the City Manager to hold such carnival or circus when and only when a proper application in writing is made therefor. Such application shall state in detail the different component parts of the carnival including all concessions, shows, amusements, businesses and the proposed location of said carnial, the time it is to run and the number of persons regularly traveling therewith, if any, and the number of local persons connected therewith, and shall give a complete and full plan of the proposed carnival.

Section 3. If the proposed carnival appears to be entirely composed of lawful amusements and lawful enterprises, the City Manager shall determine the number of extra police necessary to properly superintend such carnival and regulate the anticipated crowds and carnival. The City Manager shall instruct the City Clerk how many extra officers shall be needed and whether to issue such permits. License Fee

Section 4. The applicant for permit, if the City Manager shall determine that said permit shall be issued, shall then pay a license fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) together with Five Dollars (\$5.00) per extra officer for the number of officers that the City Manager shall determine shall be necessary per day for so many days that said carnival is issued a permit to run, and the City Clerk shall ssue the permit specifying the length of time and the location. Applicant shall also be subject to any and all additional inspection fees as may be provided by existing ordinances governing such.

Any application for a permit may be referred by the City Manager to the Board of Commissioners for their approval or disapproval, and such action by the Board of Commissioners shall be final.

Section 5. UNLAWFUL GAM-ES PROHIBITED. If the proposed carnival, or show, consists in whole or in part of any unlawful games, the permit shall be refused and if such carnival is issued a permit and it conducts itself in an unlawful manner in whole or in part, its permit may be revoked by the City Manager and fees paid shall be forfeited.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful for any carnival or circus or temporary show, to operate in whole or in part within 200 feet of any private residence, church, school, or after its permit expires or after it is revoked for cause, and all persons assisting in such operation shall be deemed guilty of violating this ordinance.

Section 7. The Chief of Police shall have supervision of the policing of said carnival, circuses and shows. All electrical wiring, eating establishments and other activities where the public health, safety and interest is involved, must meet the approval of the Chief of Police and the City Inspector.

Section 8. PENALTY. Any person guilty of violating any provision of this ordinance upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

Section 9. EXEMPTIONS Fairs or local shows, composed of local people for purely local charitable purposes without pro-fit may be exempt from the provisions of this ordinance as applicable to fees charged for permits or licenses upon approval of the Board of Commis. sioners, except the Board of Commissioners may levy another fee commensurate with
