The Federal Maritime Board operates the National Defense Reserve Fleets, available in case of emergency, and provides maritime training for cadets at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy. Specialized schools also are conducted in several major cities.

The steamship companies themselves, maintain some 300 offices abroad which not only handle their vessels, but offer very valuable trade development services to shippers.





#### Q. Can metal spinning lures be too bright - or too dull? A. Very definitely they can. When waters are low and clear, and especially when the sun is out, a dull lure usually gets best results. In fact, using a shiny lure under such conditions may frighten fish, rather than attract them. The time to use a bright lure is on a cloudy day, and especially when waters are high and discolored. Many fishermen let some of their lures tarnish, and they polish them with a polishing cloth only when bright ones are needed. To keep them bright, dip them in plastic lacquer

Q. Please name a low-priced metal lure that will take all kinds of fresh water gamefish. A. Several famous lunker-landers are in that class. One of my favorites is a quarter-ounce brass or gold-plated fish-shaped wobbler called the "Goldfish". This is an excellent distance caster which can be fished down deep or on top. Its special curves produce a lively wiggle which tempts all varieties of fresh water gamefish. The "Goldfish" comes in several sizes and colors. My favorites are the "gold-plated Goldfish", for use on dull days, and the "Rembrandt Goldfish", for bright conditions. This lat-ter model is painted to look like a trout. Both of these color schemes are killers for bass, schemes are kiners for bass, trout, walleyes, pike, or what have you. When asking for "Goldfish" lures at your dealer's, check to be sure the name "Al's Goldfish" is stamped on the back. There are many imitations of the "Goldfish", none of which seem to produce as well as the seem to produce as well as the original.

Q. Where can I get free booklets which tell how to catch fish?

A. Address a postcard to "Al Stuart, Indian Orchard, Mass." and ask for his folder called "Fishing Tips". Also send a postcard to "Joe Bates, Jr., 195 Algonquin Road, Des Plaines, Illinois" and ask for the booklet "How To Catch Bigger Fish". Both booklets are free and will be mailed to you promptly. 2. Do you recommend a spinner or a wobbler for catching fish when they are down deep? A. Since spinners should be re-

rieved at constant speeds, they are preferred for near-surface ishing. Wobblers can be rerieved at varying speeds, and herefore can be allowed to sink leep, for jigging. An active wobbler like the "Goldfish"; for nstance, catches fish when flutering down; when being jigged tear the bottom, or when being etrieved.



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


