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VETERANS Questions & Answers

Q-I am an Air Force Reservist. Is it true if I am recalled to active military duty I do not have the protection of rights under the Soldiers' and Sailor's Civil Relief Act that returning servicemen of the other branch. es of service have?

A-This Act, passed before creation of the U. S. Air Force as an independent branch of the service, did not include Air Force personnel. However, subsequent legislation blanketed them for full coverage of rights extended other servicement under the Act.


Q-How do I apply for an improvement loan on my GI home?

A-If your original loan was a VA guaranteed loan, contact your lender or holder of your mortgage. If you got a direct home loan from the VA, con-tact the VA Regional Office that made you the loan.

Q-What is the new deadline date allowing Korean veterans the maximum time to get a GI loan?

A-Korean veterans are allowed ten years from the date of their separation from service plus one year for every three months of their active wartime service in which to secure a GI loan. Q. What is a "waiver of premium" policy? I understand that it provides my life insurance free if I am taken sick.

A. Your description is not quite adequate. The waiver of premium clause is a provision that may be added to most life insurance policies, guaranteeing that the life insurance company will meet the premiums for you, if you are permanently and totally disabled from any cause. This holds true, even if you are disabled for life.



A large percentage of policies include this provision today and it does not cost much. The rate depends on your age, but it may run as low as 30 cents per \$1,000 of insurance at very young ages, to as much as \$5 per \$1,000 of insurance at the higher ages.

Q. The other day I read something about a lot of special fea, tures that could be added to existing life insurance policies for nothing or a very little. Could you mention some of these? A. Yes. Some of the "free" addi-

tions that may be added to policies are: a common disastes clause, to provide terms of payment if both policyholder and beneficiary die at or near the same time; a contingent beneficiary, in case the beneficiary predeceases the policyholder; supplemental agreement to arrange special plans for benefit payment; retirement income provision for use of policy cash values; joint and survivor plan for retirement benefits, continuing benefits as long as either lives; plan giving right to withdraw portion of policy proceeds that have been set up as an income plan; automatic premium loan plan, where not already contained in policy; provision for use of policy dividends to purchase paid-up additions to the policy. Among the many provisions which may be added to policies at relatively small additional cost are: waiver of premium clause in case of permanent and total disability; double indemnity clause in case of accidental death; payor clause, to maintain premium payments for parent on child's policy, in case of parent's death; family income clause in some cases; likewise mortgage insurance clause; also educational fund clause; guaranteed insurability clause,

Carla Damaged Automobiles Are Not Bargains


Purchasers of automobiles have been warned to be on the lookout for vehicles with salt water damage from Hurricane Carla.

H. C. Pittman, executive vice president of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association, said, 'According to reports received in our office, scores of persons throughout Texas are being vic. timized by unscrupulous bargain promoters who have purchased automobiles in the Gulf area, after they have been totaled by insurance companies and are reselling them in other parts of the state to purchasers who are unaware of the salt water damage.

TADA is a state wide organization of franchised automabile dealer, with headquarters in Austin.

We have received reports of persons who have made special trips to purchase quantities of these new cars, Pittman continued. After cleaning them up and removing the factory stickers they are selling them without advising the purchasers of the certainty of quick deterior-ation from salt rust. The public in the Gulf area is educated to this type of damage and therefore most of these cars are being sold in Central, North and West Texas.

"To protect themselves from such losses, automobile purchasers should beware of suspicious bargains and should buy their automobiles only from well known established dealers in their own communities, Pittman stressed. "No legitimate dealer would handle such a sale. This same type of unscrupulous activity cost many hard working families their life savings when they purchased auto. mobiles bought in from Louisana after Hurricane Audrey,' he added.
