Come next spring, you'd better have your number on that "declaration of estimated tax" (deadline April 15th). If you have a Social Security number, that's it. If you don't, you get a form at the post office or an office of the Internal Revenue Service.

From there on, you're a number to Uncle Sam's tax collectors ,and to every organization that reports on payment to you. If you forget it on your income tax return, it will cost you five bucks. And the penalty will be the same every time you fail to supply it to any source of income that requests it. And that ain't all.

Congress hung this one on your eye on September 25th-to give the IRS a full-Nelson on every taxpayer. We predict tattoo artists will be coming back—strong.
