To illustrate the importance of timely and accurate communications as essential to public understanding of a subject, J. M. Patterson of the American Oil Company said:

"Robert Fulton was credited with running the first profitable steamship in 1807. But the 1807 James Rumsey of Shepherdstown, W. Va., had been running one on the Potomac River for 18 years. However, it was without benefit of the New York press enlisted by Fulton.

"Longfellow—another professional communicator—immortalized Paul Revere's midnight ride from Boston to Lexington. But how many people know the British intercepted him enroute to Concord and that Paul had to walk back to Lexington? (The) Same night—Isreal Bissell started a four-day, six-hour ride from Watertown, Mass., to Philadelphia to take news to the Continental Congress that the war had started.

"Attitude surveys show most people think everything is too high. But we were surprised to learn that the public thought that when it comes to raising prices, gasoline was second only to haircuts.

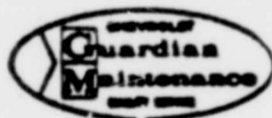

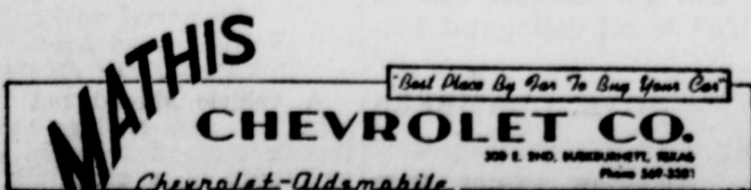

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

Traditionally, the word "extortion" has always held a somewhat sinister meaning.

However, it now appears there would well be a new type of terminology for the word, and that there will now be set up the term "legal extortion."

At least that appears possible unless Congress takes some action to clean house in the National Labor Relations Board. There has been C. W. Harder some suggestions that as long as it seems, in some quarters, perfectly fine to give the communistic government of Yugoslavia jet planes, perhaps as additional help to Tito, it would be well to ship him several carloads of NLRB people.



The latest off-tackle slant...off left tackle of course, by NLRB is to establish the edict that a non-union worker in a plant where there is union workers, does not have to pay union dues. He just gives the same amount each month to the union. It's called union security.

Basically, this is just another move by a government bureau to encroach further into the affairs of individual states. Some states have "right-to-work" laws which makes it illegal to require union membership to hold job.

These laws, of course, irritate the leaders of monopoly labor organizations. And of course, nothing grieves an NLRB official quite as much as an irritated labor leader, unless it is the thought of getting the National Federation of Independent Business

ing off the government payroll and having to go to work.

But in this situation, they come up with a most curious ruling. In these particular states, a worker does not have to belong to the union. But he does have to fork over to union operating in his job area, an amount of money equivalent to dues called "union security" payments.

This opens an entirely new area of economic opportunity for enterprising people. Hoodlums should no longer demand payoffs, which is extortion. Instead, they now should be able to seek plate glass security payments. In fact, this could probably go a long way to alleviate the national crime problem. If some nice terms can be found to be used for other forms of extortion, for armed robbery, et al, then there would be less criminal offenses throughout the land.

It now appears that this whole question of unbridled license given a few labor leaders will be a major issue in the forthcoming session of Congress. Even Congressmen with heavy labor constituencies report three-fourths or more of their people are demanding corrective steps.

Senators Thurmond and McClellan, Congressmen Algar, Santangelo, Heistand, and many others, are either writing bills, or working with other legislators, on bills that will curb the powers of these labor czars in their inauguration of practices which have created a serious unemployment situation, held down the economy, and hampered national defense. There is growing demand the system be changed back to where American government is by the people, of the people, and for the people.

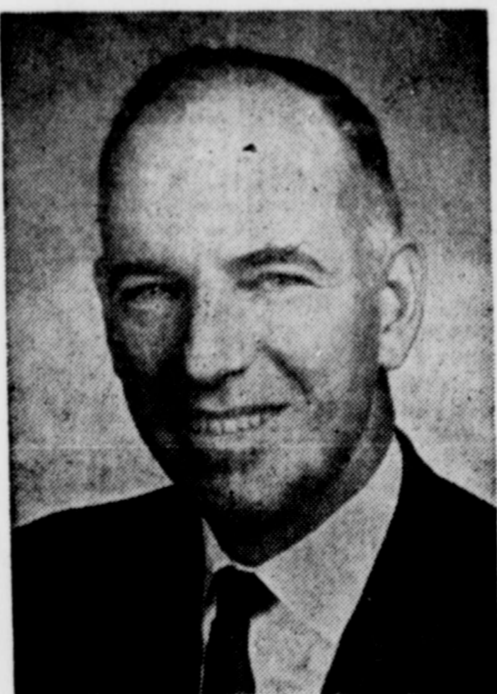

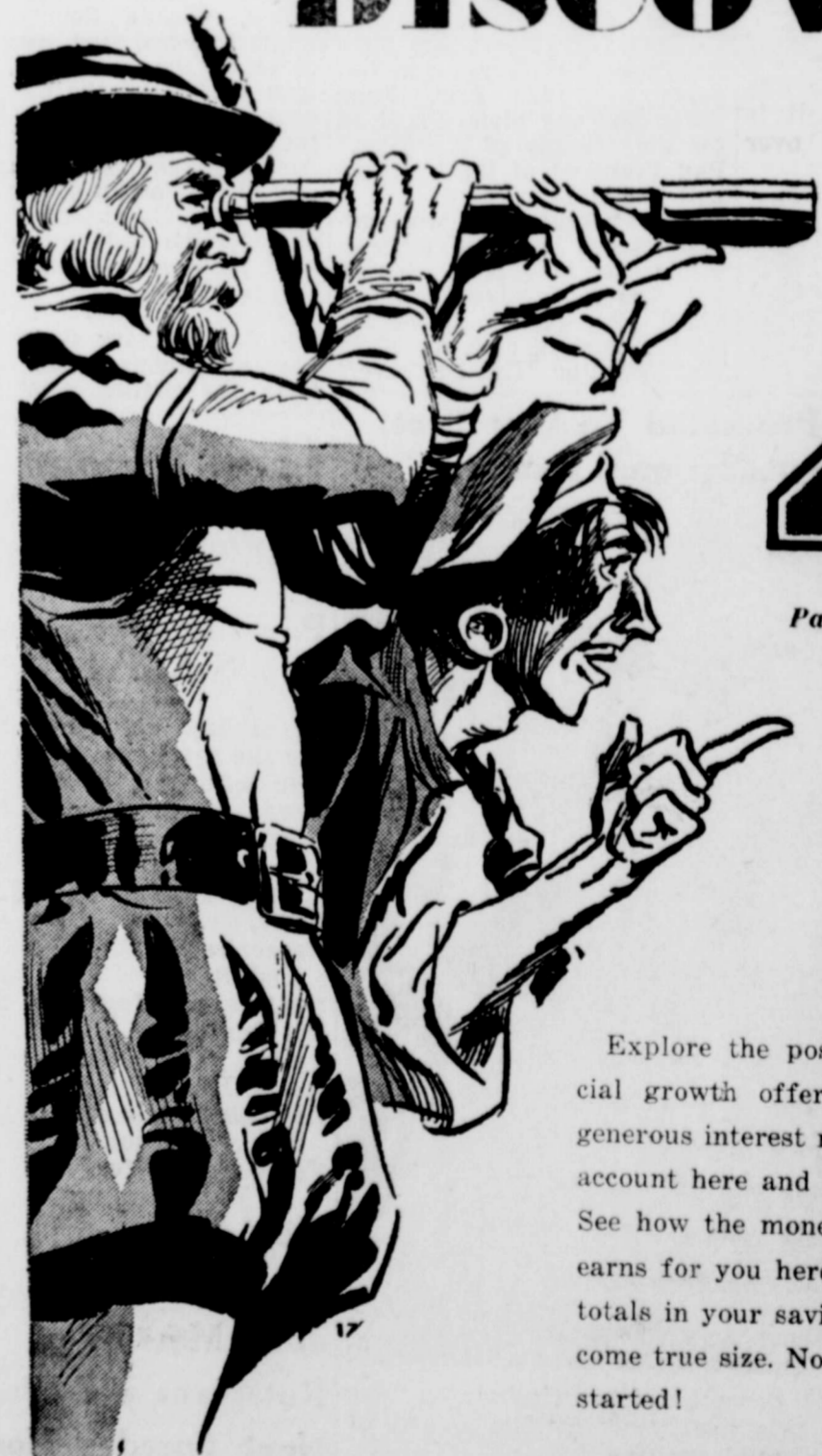

#### FIFTH GRADE READING PROGRAM

The 7th Grade Class is under the direction of Mrs. Ruby Taylor. Mrs. Taylor plans the program in such a way that we have free reading periods, work on exercises, word lists for words learned, current events notebook, and test over stories given in the textbook.

### Navy News Release

The Navy will accept volunteers for three year first term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program, Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel said.

The experimental program has been placed in operation Admiral Smedberg said, is to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the nation.

It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program eligible personnel who have been released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advance leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment.

The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current step in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school. Admiral Smedberg said, "Today the Navy affords one of the finest opportunities for able bodied patriotic young men to serve their country. These young Americans can well take pride in an honored service and patriotic contribution to our country. The need for pride in service and patriotism is greater now than at any other time in our country's history. Our freedom has been challenged by force of tyranny which threaten our way of life. The increased readiness which our experimental program supports will ensure this freedom."

### School Census Starts Jan. 16

The annual school census one of the most important activities of the school year, will begin on January 16, 1962.

All children in Burkburnett School District who will be six years old, and under 18 years old, on September 1, 1962, must be listed on the census roll.

Most of the students will be listed through the school where the student who is the oldest child in school, will be given a census blank to enroll every child in that family. Each year a number of students are missed because of absence, loss of census blank, or from some other reason.

The school seeks the cooperation from all parents who have children in school to fill out and return the census blanks. Information on the census forms will include last name, first name, middle initial, birth date, age, and present grade.

Cooperation is especially requested from those parents who have no children in school now, but who will have a first grader in school next year. If these parents will call the office of the Superintendent, 569-1121, someone will come to your home to list your child on the census roll.

## Safeguard Freedom of Ideas Warns Dr. Willham Speaking Chamber Commerce Banquet



DR. OLIVER WILLHAM  
President, Oklahoma State University

"Do not trade freedom for security," was the warning given by Dr. Oliver Willham, President of Oklahoma State University, as he spoke to a large audience at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet held Friday night, January 12th.

Dr. Willham reminded the group of the many changes that have occurred during the past few years. In transportation—you can go around the world quicker than you could go across the state just a few years ago. In communications—you can now talk to persons on the other side of the globe just as easy as you can talk across town. In medicine—there have been so many improvements as the result of research within the past ten years that

moral values," Dr. Willham said. Referring to the Carpenter of Gallilee, Dr. Willham stated that our true happiness comes in "giving of ourselves" to others in service.

"An idea cannot be destroyed by force. Our conflict today is a conflict between conflicting ideas—of course we must have military might to deter war, but our fight is actually more than that—if force could destroy ideas, Christianity would have been destroyed in the first century." Dr. Willham stated that the greatest advocate toward our progress and way of life is the "freedom to develop, explore and use new ideas. History will show that when we lose this freedom, we lose all. History also shows that when a people go from bondage to the freedom of the use and development of ideas that great progress is made and abundance comes. When abundance comes, people become selfish—wanting more and more hand-outs from others—from the government—. They begin to live for 'self' rather than for their fellowman and their community. This is the last step before going back into bondage.

"Do not trade your freedom for security," Dr. Willham cautioned. "Ingenuity and the freedom of society—the freedom of ideas—have made our people great."

Dr. Willham complemented the Chamber of Commerce and the citizens of Burkurnett for the work and progress accomplished, and on the challenge of the future they had accepted. He praised the community spirit of cooperation, and stated that these things could not have been accomplished without the unselfish work of so many.

Dr. Willham was introduced to the audience by Mayor George McClarty.

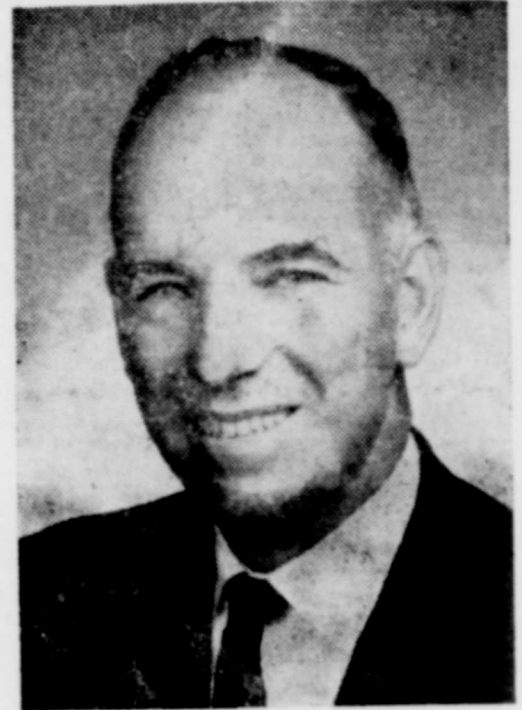
