

Nine deaths were chalked up last month as compared to ten that were recorded in January, 1961, 147 injuries were repotred this January which is higher than the 105

for the same period last year. A total of 217 rural traffic accidents were investigated as compared to 225 for January, 1961. "The slight decrease in the total number of accidents is encouraging to us, but the increase in the number of persons injured points out the need for compliance with the speed regulations by all motorists to reduce severity of these





Less than thirty per cent of the registered vehicles in this area have been safety inspected



### **HOW BILLS BECOME LAWS**

#### IN THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE

The Texas Legislature meets in a regular session for about subject, except that tax bills about onee-third of the bills in-

deems it proper to do so. He proper consideration. called a special session to meet before it for consideration. It is sometimes called the "Gover- in the Legislature. nor's Session" because he controls the subjects upon which bills can be passed.
In order to become a law, it

is necessary that a bill receive a majority of the votes in each branch of the Legislature. The State Constitution requires that a bill, immediately after being introduced, be referred to the proper committee. This committee may or may not recom-mend the passage of the bill. If the committee takes no action on a bill, it is stopped and never proceeds further. Per-haps a third of the bills receive a favorable committee report and are placed on the calendar of either the Senate or the House of Representatives, de-pending upon the branch in which the bill was introduced.
