### Eleven Persons Injured in Traffic Mishaps In Area

The Highway Patrol investigated 16 rural accidents in Wichita County during the month of January according to Sgt. E. L. Stroud, Patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for eleven persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$7,465.00.

The Highway Patrol supervisor pointed out that rural motor vehicle traffic accidents in the 29 county North Texas district have declined slightly during January, 1962, as compared with the same month last year. Nine deaths were chalked up last month as compared to ten that were recorded in January, 1961, 147 injuries were reported this January which is higher than the 105 for the same period last year.

A total of 217 rural traffic accidents were investigated as compared to 225 for January, 1961. "The slight decrease in the total number of accidents is encouraging to us, but the increase in the number of persons injured points out the need for compliance with the speed regulations by all motorists to reduce severity of these accidents," the Sergeant stated.

The Highway Patrol Sergeant reminded motorists that Texas law requires all registered motor vehicles to have valid inspection stickers displayed by midnight April 15 and the best way to avoid the long line expected in the last minute rush is to have your vehicle inspected now.

## CITY HALL News and Notes

If you want to get a job done—turn it over to a group of women. This is especially true when the group include, seemingly, every woman in Burkburnett. I have been in places where a large number of clubs existed, but never where they were so effective in making their influence felt throughout the entire city in promoting and accomplishing civic improvements.

It was several months before I could determine who's who and what's what is regards to the various clubs. I don't yet fully understand, but I've just recently understood that the many Study Clubs are Federated and that they also have a Council of Federated Study Clubs. The Garden Clubs also have Council of Garden Clubs. And then there are various committees. There are many other good clubs and organizations that are not federated and are completely independent of any other organization. The important point is that when there is a civic improvement project, it seems that all groups lose their identity in the cooperation with each other to get the job done.

This is as it should be. It is good that the clubs are more interested in 'getting the job done' than in advancing their own individual recognition. (We're speaking of community-wide efforts.)

And they do get the job done. I cannot begin to name the many worthwhile accomplishments that have benefited the entire city.

A few cases come to mind, such as the new swimming pool. What club or organization did not have a part in its realization. The recent 'Chicken Noodle Dinner' sponsored by the Council of Federated Study Clubs—all clubs and organizations seemed to be behind this because the purpose was to benefit the city as a whole. Speaking of the success of this effort, a member of the Council of Federated Study Clubs told me that she had no desire to say "look what our Council did," but rather, "look what all of us working together did."

Such an attitude as this can accomplish anything. In as far as the average citizen is concerned, he is not really interested in who sponsors what—he knows that he and the other citizens benefit from such efforts, therefore he is willing to lend his support, regardless of who the sponsor may be.

This 'working together' on the part of clubs, other organizations, and individuals, has resulted in the formation of a Community Council with representation from all the various groups. This Community Council should be a big help in the coordinating of various activities, and will also permit the Chamber of Commerce to be of greater benefit to the various groups.

In our next article we will discuss the newly organized Community Council.

## Have Car Safety Inspected for '62 By April 15th

Less than thirty per cent of the registered vehicles in this area have been safety inspected for 1962, according to Patrolman Harlan Eades, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

With the April 15 deadline, for having the vehicles checked, rapidly approaching, this means there are approximately 37,900 vehicles in Wichita County remaining to be inspected by the 53 approved inspection stations available.

Many motorists are going to find long lines awaiting them as the deadline draws nearer, due to the inspection stations not being able to cope with this large number.

The patrolman urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible to avoid this last minute rush. In addition, he reminded drivers that this time of the year is noted for adverse weather conditions which prevent the inspection stations from checking the vehicles.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," Patrolman Eades said. "All motorists not displaying a valid 1962 inspection sticker by April 15 will be in violation of state law."

weeks until such damage can be easily seen. At that time prune the plant back to live wood by making the pruning cut several inches below the last sign of dead wood.

One way to lesson damage in case of another freeze is to water the plants thoroughly as soon as pipes thaw. This prevents drying, which causes more damage than the cold.

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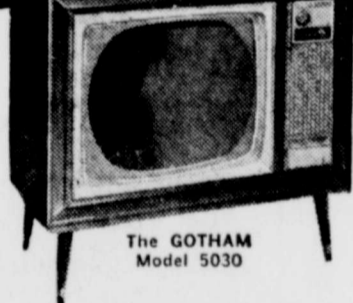
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**RESEEDING OF LAND HAS BEGUN ON W. H. HALL FARM**

## HOW BILLS BECOME LAWS IN THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE

The Texas Legislature meets in a regular session for about four months once each two years. At a regular session any member can introduce as many bills as he desires upon any subject, except that tax bills must be introduced in the House of Representatives. Only about one-third of the bills introduced ever reach the Governor's desk. He vetoes some which do.

The constitution provides that the Governor can call a special 30-day session whenever he deems it proper to do so. He called a special session to meet on January 3, 1962, and it must adjourn at the end of 30 days and can consider only the subjects which the Governor places before it for consideration. It is sometimes called the "Governor's Session" because he controls the subjects upon which bills can be passed.

In order to become a law, it is necessary that a bill receive a majority of the votes in each branch of the Legislature. The State Constitution requires that a bill, immediately after being introduced, be referred to the proper committee. This committee may or may not recommend the passage of the bill. If the committee takes no action on a bill, it is stopped and never proceeds further. Perhaps a third of the bills receive a favorable committee report and are placed on the calendar of either the Senate or the House of Representatives, depending upon the branch in which the bill was introduced. A bill can be, and often is, amended in either or both

branches. If it receives a majority vote in the first branch, it is then sent by messenger to the other branch, where it travels the same course that it did in the first branch, and if it is amended in the second branch, it is then returned to the first branch. The latter must approve the amendments or the bill does not go to the Governor's office.

I often receive a heavy volume of mail about the various bills that are introduced. Time does not permit a member of the Senate to keep up with the bills introduced over in the House of Representatives while they are still over there. Since a House bill may be amended several times after its introduction and while still in the House of Representatives, it is almost useless for a member of the Senate to waste time on it until it comes to the Senate. Those which do come receive proper consideration.
