DOING SOMETHING ABOUT IT

The high rate of rejections by the armed forces of draftees and volunteers alike and the disclosure by recent tests that the average American boy is soft—weaker, less agile and with less endurance than the average in most other countries—should shock us into action and the fullest support of President Kennedy's Youth Fitness Program.

But, while ACTION—especially on the part of the 90 percent of our youngsters who ride instead of walk or run, watch sports and TV instead of playing—is the only solution, there must be guidance, too. It is therefore encouraging to report that the Tea Council of the USA, Inc., has begun distribution of a 32-page two-color illustrated booklet written expressly for youth and called "Your Guide to Physical Fitness."

The guide contains general and specific information on daily exercise training with weights, self-tests and diet. It was prepared under the direction of the Council's advisory board composed of such authorities as Larry Snyder head track coach, US Olympic Team, Ohio State University; Otto Graham, Director of Athletics US Coast Guard Academy; Pete Newell, Athletic Director, University of California and Dr. Don H. O'Donoghue, chairman of the Department of Orthopedic Surgery, University of Oklahoma School of Medicine.

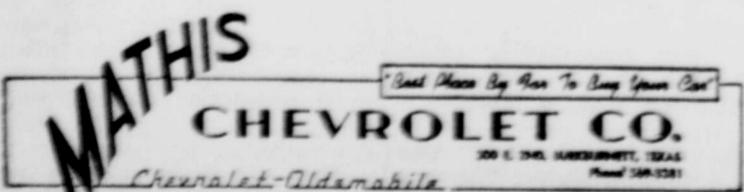
Copies have been placed in the hands of 20,000 coaches and athletic instructors by having it bound into the February issue of a leading publication directed to coaches and athletes. Twenty free copies will be furnished to coaches and instructors on request for distribution to high school and college students and additional copies will be available at a cost of ten cents to cover mailing.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

Many very fine people live in Mount Olive, Mississippi. And it is not their fault that they live in a town in a state where the per capita income is about the lowest in the United States.

Economically, the entire south is on the move, and it is the hope and desire of every thinking American that in the near future the economy of Mississippi will be such that the per capita income is on a par with the highest in the nation.



But right now, no big Fifth Avenue furrier in New York is opening a big new store in Mount Olive, stocking it with the finest of mink and chinchilla. Neither is he laying off people in New York, to finance his Mount Olive venture.

However, far-fetched as this seems, this is the basis for a lot of the argument being used to eliminate U. S. tariffs. If this is not done, the cry is, this nation will not be able to sell anything to the nations in the European Common Market.

There is a fundamental law of business involved here. That is you cannot sell people unless they have the money to buy.

At the present time, the people of these European nations have only \$642 per capita per year to spend. It is optimistically expected that the common market will "boom" this to \$844 by 1970. By 1959 the American people had an annual per capita to spend of \$2,168.

and by the time the 1961 figures are computed this will undoubtedly be well over \$2,200, or almost three times what it is hoped average European will have eight years hence.

Thus the concept that everybody will live happily ever after with American incomes buying cheap labor imported products, and European incomes somehow buying expensive American products is somewhat akin to the recipe for ox-rabbit stew. Put one ox and one rabbit in the pot.

At the present time it is asserted that Europe buys \$6 billion from the U.S. while the U.S. only buys \$4 billion from Europe. But \$6 billion of U.S. products at U.S. costs is far less volume than \$4 billion of European products at foreign costs.

In addition, there are other factors. Tobacco is a major U.S. export to Europe. A package of English cigarettes, for example, that sells for 25 cents on the high seas when tax free, costs 68 cents in England when the British purchase tax must be paid at the retail counter. Thus, on the British income level, there is little hope of increasing tobacco consumption, because how many more packs of cigarettes at 68 cents each can the average Englishman hope to buy?

Thus, this whole question gets down to one of common sense. As any merchant, on any Main Street in the land knows when people lack money, they do not buy. An Italian, living on \$650 a year, is not a prime prospect for goods produced in America at a labor cost of around \$3 per hour. Business still depends on money.

Have Car Safety Inspected for '62 By April 15th

Less than thirty per cent of the registered vehicles in this area have been safety inspected for 1962, according to Patrolman Harlan Eades, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

With the April 15 deadline, for having the vehicles checked, rapidly approaching, this means there are approximately 37,900 vehicles in Wichita County remaining to be inspected by the 33 approved inspection stations available.

Many motorists are going to find long lines awaiting them as the deadline draws nearer, due to the inspection stations not being able to cope with this large number.

The patrolman urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible to avoid this last minute rush. In addition, he reminded drivers that this time of the year is noted for adverse weather conditions which prevent the inspection stations from checking the vehicles.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," Patrolman Eades said. "All motorists not displaying a valid 1962 inspection sticker by April 15 will be in violation of state law."

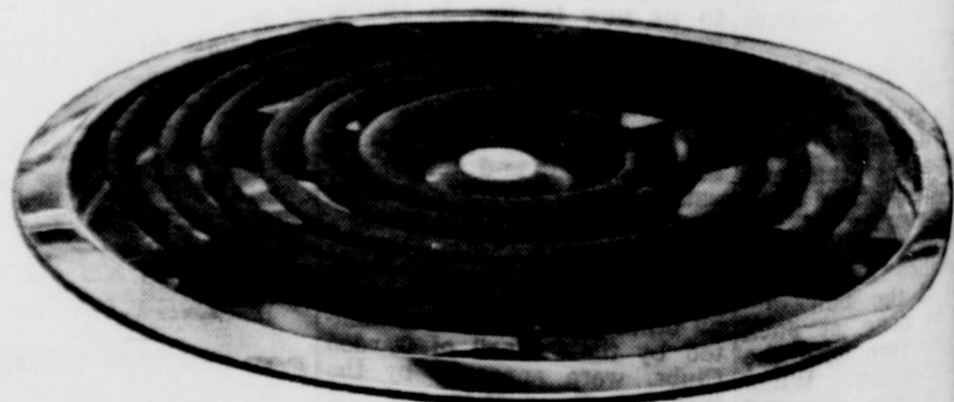

Beautiful Buns For Brunch



For morning coffee or brunch, here's a new recipe that's deliciously different...

Sweet Chocolate Tea Buns
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup butter
1/3 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 package dry yeast
1/4 cup warm water
2 eggs, beaten
3-1/2 cups flour (about)
1 package Baker's German's Sweet Chocolate
3/4 cup orange marmalade

Scald milk. Add butter, sugar, and salt. Stir until butter is softened and sugar is dissolved. Cool until mixture is lukewarm. Meanwhile soften yeast in the warm water.

Add yeast mixture and beaten eggs to milk mixture. Add 2 cups of the flour and beat well. Add enough of the remaining flour to make soft dough; mix thoroughly.

Place dough on lightly floured board, cover, and let rest 5 minutes. Knead dough 5 minutes. Place in lightly greased bowl, cover with a damp cloth, and allow to rise in a warm place until dough is doubled in bulk, about 1-1/2 hours.

Meanwhile, chop half of the chocolate; combine with marmalade. Punch down and roll out dough into a 18x2-inch rectangle. Spread chocolate mixture on dough to about 1/2 inch from edges. Roll up tightly, beginning at wide side. Pinch edges of roll together to seal well. Cut into 1-inch slices and place cut side up, a little apart, in a lightly greased 13x9x2-inch pan. Cover with a towel and let stand in a warm place until almost double in bulk, about 40 to 45 minutes. Bake in a moderate oven (375 F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Turn out onto plate immediately. Melt remaining chocolate over hot water; drizzle over buns. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar and chopped pecans, or toasted slivered almonds. Serve warm. Makes 16 to 18 buns. Buns may be stored unglazed. Then reheat and drizzle with chocolate before serving.
