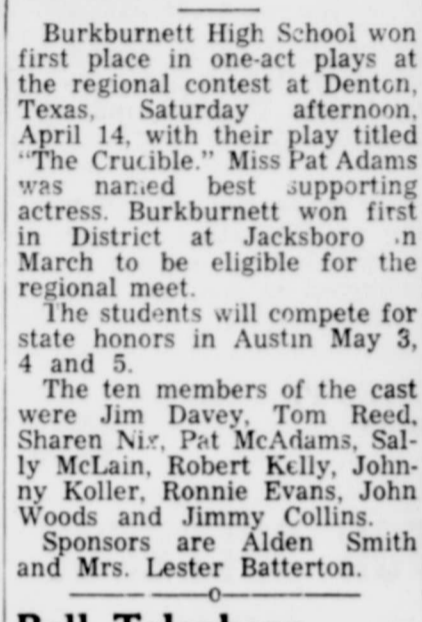
OLD LANDMARK DOWNTOWN TO COME DOWN TEXAS ELECTRIC CO. TO OCCUPY NEW BLDG.

An attractive new building is to be constructed at the northeast corner of Third Street and C Avenue for Texas Electric Service Company, it was announced Wednesday by Jim Ady, Texas Electric manager, and J. B. Riley of Burk Burnett. The present two-story structure at the site will be razed to make way for the new building, which will be a one-story and will measure 50 feet by 104 feet. Work to clear the site will start within the next month, Riley said. The new building, to be leased by Texas Electric, is scheduled for completion in September. The exterior of the new Texas Electric Building will be of masonry and cast stone. The building will include a room that will be available for meetings of civic groups and organizations in the community, as well as for company activities, Ady said. This room will be known as the "Reddy Room" and will be designed to accommodate about 100 persons. The "Reddy Room" will be equipped with an all-electric kitchen. The building will be heated and cooled by electric heat pumps. Among the other features of the building will be an area where major appliances can be displayed by dealers. Plans also call for construction of new sidewalks, with the convenience of those parking at the curb. Riley has contracted with Virgil Mills Construction Company to build the new building. Riley also announced that he plans to remove the second story of the adjoining building facing on C Avenue and extending through the building now occupied by the Texas Electric office. The ground floor level of the structure to be converted to one-story is occupied by the Chamber of Commerce and the Roy Majors Insurance Agency. Pardue Read & Dice of Wichita Falls are the architects, engineers for the Texas Electric Service portion of the building.

Bell Telephone Rates Reduced On Texas Calls

A reduction in rates on certain long distance telephone calls within Texas, which will save telephone users more than \$2.5 million a year, will be put into effect May 20, C. A. (Dub) Deuschle, manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, announced today. In general, the rate reduction will apply to station-to-station and person-to-person calls of more than 198 miles, Deuschle said. The reduced rates will apply to nearly 17 million calls a year within the state. The reduction will range from five to fifteen cents for a three-minute call. Here are some typical examples of old and new rates for three-minute daytime calls:

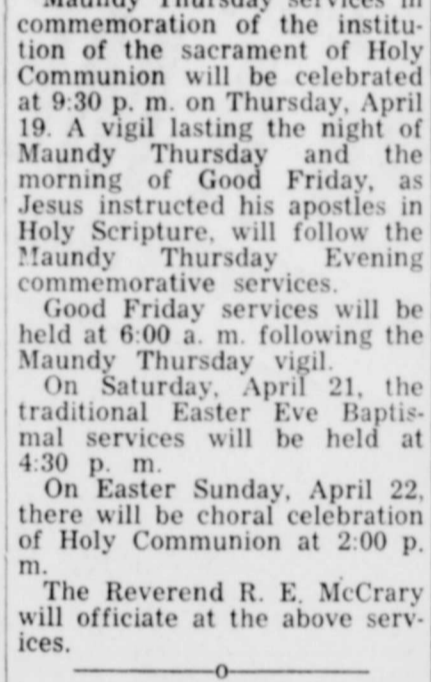

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

There still appears to be no solution to the farm problem despite the fact that storage costs on surplus government supported farm products are running better than a million dollars per day.

Is there a solution? A study of the milk industry would seem to indicate that there is not, because here is an industry in which it would seem the combined efforts of Big Business, Big Labor and Big Government have been to the detriment.



According to the Milk Industry Foundation, the per capita consumption of whole milk in the U.S. has declined from 825 pounds in 1939 to 678 pounds in 1959. Since 1950, the decline has been quite rapid.

Other sources show that since 1950, over 30,000 independent dairy distributors have been driven out of business by the big dairy combines. Today, practically the entire milk industry is monopolized by three big combines.

Since 1950, the Jimmy Hoffa forces have gained a stranglehold on the distribution of milk. Milk Foundation figures show the average price of a quart of milk in 1947 was 19.6 cents per quart, by 1960 it had jumped over 6 cents to an average of 25.7 cents.

Milk Foundation figures also show in 1959, on total consumer purchases of fresh milk totaling 7 1/2 billion dollars, farmers received only \$3 1/4 billion, while labor got \$1 1/2 billion.

But while retailers only received \$344 million, federal, state and local taxes took \$209 million out of the milk industry on fresh milk sales alone.

But the dairy farmer in 1959 on milk selling over 25 cents per quart, received less than 10 cents per quart.

Big Business, Big Labor and Big Government, all got theirs out of the quart of milk, and the dairy is faced with a continually declining market for this product.

There are many reasons for the decline of milk consumption. Some claim that people are turning away from a taste for milk. Others attribute the steady consumption decline to some new medical theories on heart disease.

However, the real answer would appear to be in another area. While people will seemingly pay any price for the milk children need, there is a limit on the price adults will pay for milk for their own consumption.

It is interesting that the per capita consumption of milk in the U.S. is now below that of any country of Europe except Italy where production is low. Even heavy wine drinking France consumes almost 50% more per capita than the U.S.

Thus, there seems to be indicated that the solution to the U.S. problem is not to pay farmers for milking less cows.

It would be interesting to see what would happen if free enterprise were brought back to the milk monopolies, unhampered by Jimmy Hoffa, and unhampered by federal, state and local tax collectors. This is quite a radical idea, but it might work.

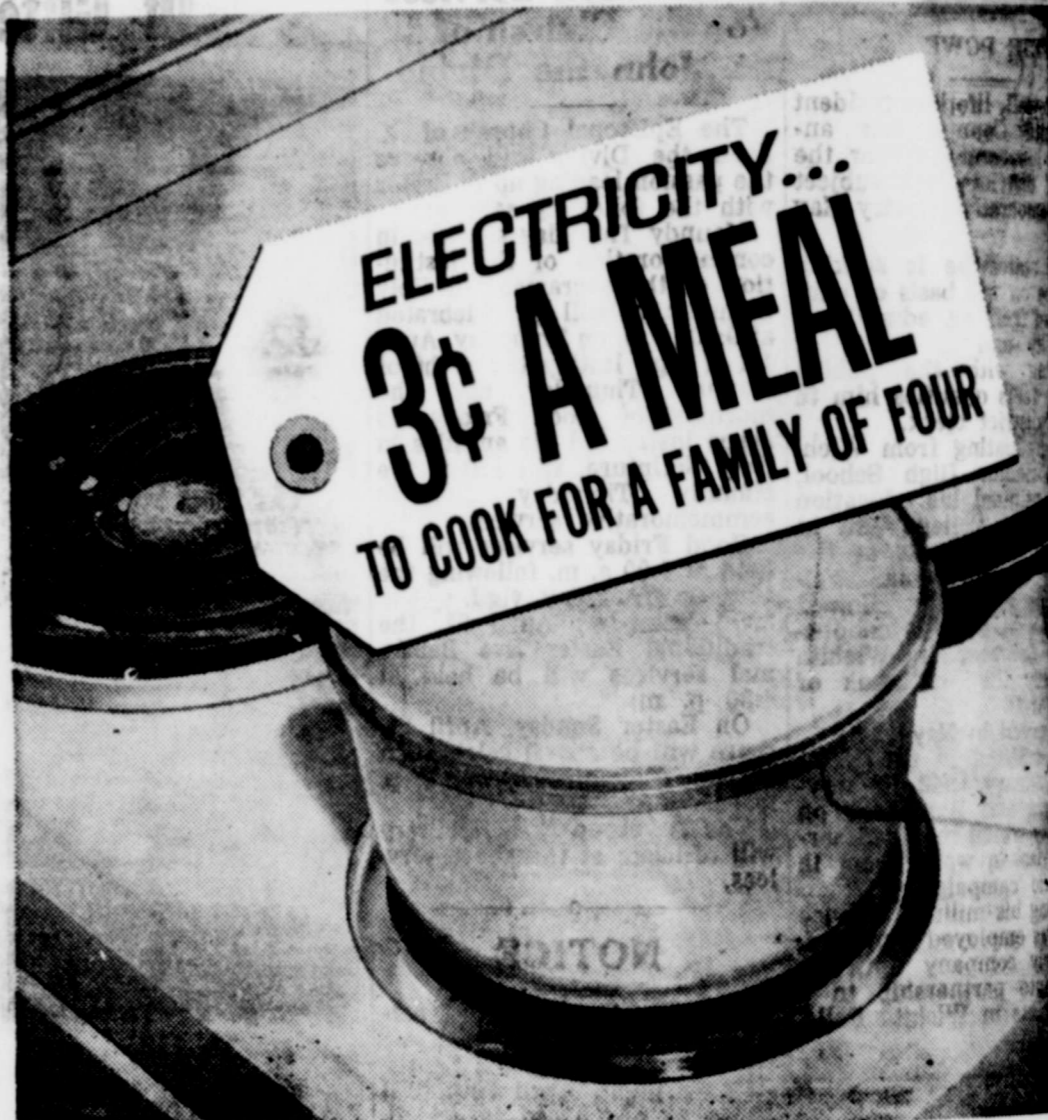

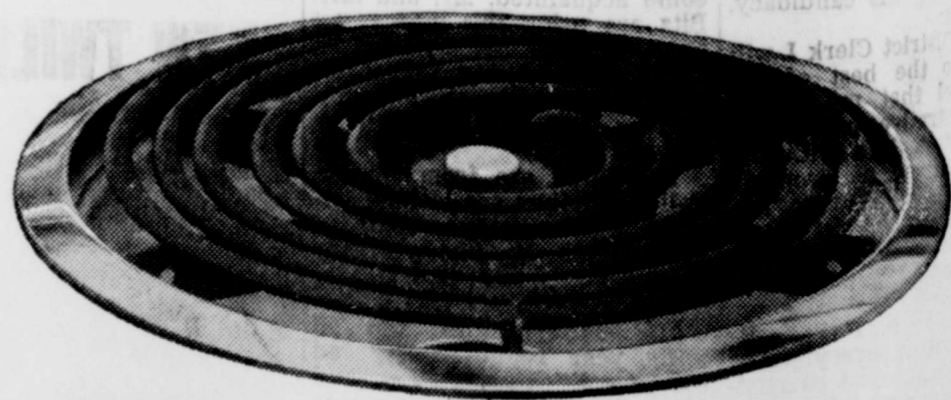

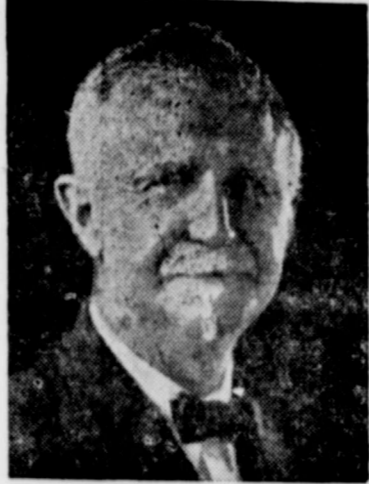

A book has recently been prepared by Mr. H. G. Olson of my organization, giving charts, earning prices etc. for the common stocks of 100 well-known companies.

Railroads and Airlines

Of course, the principal railroads are in this list, with the Pennsylvania and New York Central included.

in automobile riding has raised havoc with the shoe industry, I leave to you readers. The stocks of two large shoe manufacturers—International Shoe Co. and Endicott Johnson Corp.—have had an unfortunate record.

Farm and Other Machinery Stocks

I am sorry to see that J. I. Case's stock has declined from nearly \$40 in 1951 to less than \$10 today.

Another machine company which is being honestly operated, at Waterbury, Conn., is the Scovill Manufacturing Co. The stock of this company sold at nearly \$50 per share in 1945-46.

New Mining Companies

One of the most interesting mining stocks is that of the U. S. Smelting, Refining & Mining Co. This sold at over \$80 per share in 1946 and again in 1952.

Merchandising Stocks

Of all these stocks Montgomery Ward shows one of the widest fluctuation. It sold at \$50 per share in 1946; then declined to \$25 in 1948, again hit a high of over \$50 per share in 1955 and 1959.

In the above review I have mentioned only about twenty-five or so of the one hundred depressed stocks which Mr. Olson has selected.

A total of 5.9 million Federal income tax returns were filed in 1930 and over 94 million for 1960.

For example, in 1932 and 1933 a survey was made to determine what American cities had the most air pollution. From the results of this study the conclusion was made that the four most polluted cities ranked first, second, fourth, and fifth respectively in pneumonia deaths.

Presented next was the informative subject "Deceptive Packages" by Mrs. D. H. Smith. She said that the U. S. Food and Drug Administration seized a shipment of shortening, described on the label as being produced by a "revolutionary" process that "actually whips out calories." It had merely been puffed up with more nitrogen gas than before and a given amount of the melted new product had as many calories as did the "old" shortening.

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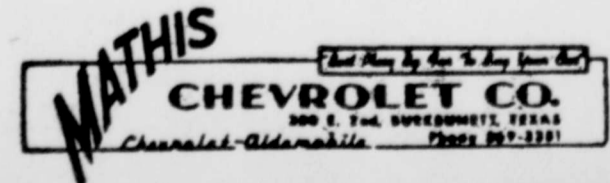
