ANOTHER WORLD

Arthur Temple, Jr., president of the National Lumber Manufacturers Association, has something worthwhile to say about this nation's tax system and the Washington "climate" as it applies to private enterprise. He warned men of American business that this country's economic future stands to be taxed, restricted, and harassed into the role of a secondary economic power in the world.

Lumber, like so many other basic industries, is plagned with special and urgent problem of its own. But it also shares the general problems which harass and, in some instances, hamstring business as a whole. As an example, he pointed to the increasing competition we will have to meet in world markets-a competition characterized by the swift and dramatic development of the European Common Market concept.

It is often said that we should meet this new competition by modernizing our productive plant-by demonstrating that American know-how and capital and ingenuity can offset such elements as the low industrial wages generally existing in other countries. But this requires money-vast sums of money. As Mr. Temple puts it, "We have been losing American supremacy for lack of profits to plow back into business and for lack of assurances that our productivity will be permitted its proper putlet

This is not the world of 20 years ago-or even the world of five years ago. We must compete with our international friends, as well as with our communist enemies. Government policy, in matters of such specifics as taxstion and such intangibles as the attitude toward productive enterprise, needs to recognize that fact, and very



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


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Boy Scouts Tour SAC Command At Sheppard AFB
