Highway Patrol Report

Highway Patrol investigated 19 rural accidents in Burkburnett County during the month of May according to Sergeant L. Stroud, Patrol Supervisor of this area. Wrecks accounted for persons killed, six persons injured and an estimated damage of \$12,543.00. A rural traffic accident in Wichita County during the month of May through May of this year resulted in a total of 67 crashes. As a result of these crashes four persons were killed and 10 persons injured. The estimated property damage totaled \$35,431.00. During this month, the Department of Public Safety has its annual SLOW AND LIVE summertime campaign which, as its objective, has as its objective the task of emphasizing the importance of motorist to control driving speed. Speed is vital to safety, because the overcrowded condition of the highways caused by the thousands of vacation travelers of whom are in a big hurry to get home. Burkburnett Industry Manufactures Foam Flotation Barrels

Special Plastics, Incorporated has been molding polystyrene into flotation barrels. These barrels are 22" diameter by 33" long and will fit inside a 55-gallon drum. They are used for boat houses, barges, piers, and for water games. Though a light enough for a child to lift easily, it will support 400 pounds totally submerged. The process by which the barrels are molded is very simple. Tiny beads of polystyrene are expanded and blown into a mold which looks much like a 55-gallon drum. Thank you and Texas Electric for sponsoring my trip to the Nuclear Energy Symposium at the University of Texas. It was a great experience for me. I met several very nice people from all parts of Texas. I learned of the advances made in several fields of science and of the problems that face scientists in the near future. There were three highlights of the trip. The first was the lecture by Dr. P. H. Miller, Jr., on solid state physics. Dr. Miller's lecture underlined the great advances being made every day in the use of light and electronics to improve communications. The second was a lecture by Dr. W. O. Milligan that showed the advances made in understanding the make-up of matter by the use of nuclear physics. I enjoyed Dr. Milligan's lecture very much and learned at the same time how a truly great scientist does his work. The third highlight was a lecture by Dr. W. T. Guy, Jr., Professor of Mathematics at the University of Texas. Dr. Guy showed us how important all types of mathematics will be in the world of the future. He also proved to us that translating a mathematical idea into reality may cause troubles that were not seen at the time the idea was thought of. I think Texas Electric, the other power companies involved, and the University of Texas are doing a wonderful job. I hope symposiums of this type will be held again, for they help school students understand what the future will be like and may help some students decide what they will become in the future. 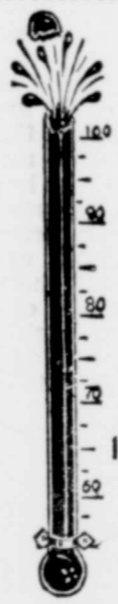
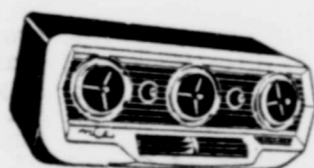

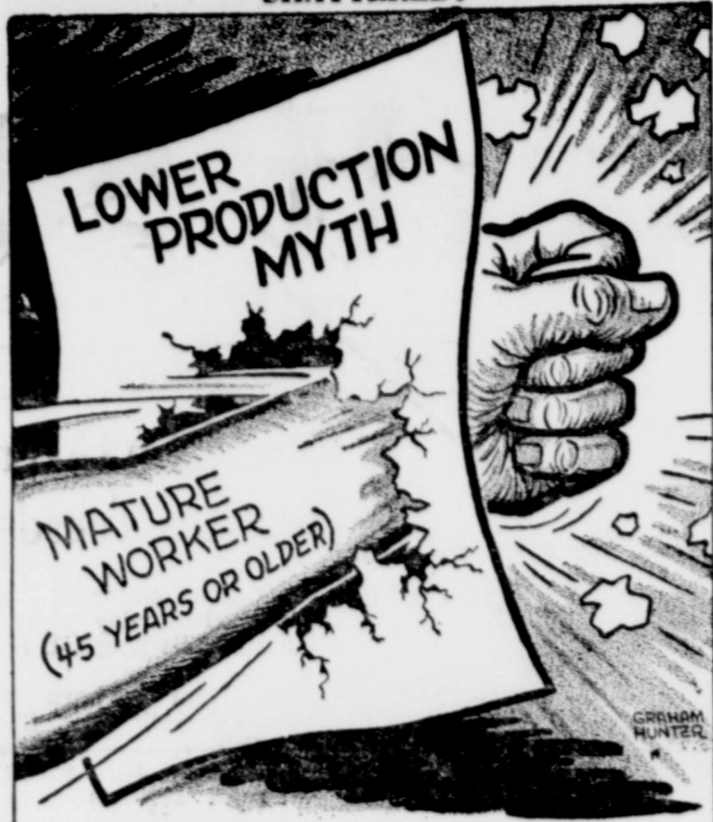

Let AREA CODES speed your Out-of-Town Calls



Now there is a new, faster way to make Long Distance calls. Simply give the Long Distance operator the Area Code for the city you are calling and the distant number. You need not tell her the name of the called city or state.

HOW AREA CODES SPEED CALLS

Area Codes are three-digit numbers that identify the more than 100 telephone dialing areas in the United States and Canada. The map above shows the dialing areas for several nearby states.

Long Distance operators here use these Area Codes to route your calls quickly to their destinations.

When you tell the operator the Area Code for the city you are calling, she can put your call through immediately. No waste of your time while she looks up the code number.

LOOK IN DIRECTORY

You'll find the Area Codes for many cities throughout the country listed in your telephone directory. The Long Distance operator will give you Area Codes for any cities not listed.

HOW TO CALL

Suppose you were calling KL 5-2368 in Memphis, Tennessee. Your telephone directory shows the Area Code for Memphis is 901. Here's the fast, easy way to make the call:

1. Dial "O" for Long Distance.

2. Tell the operator: "Area Code 901 KL 5-2368." (No need to mention Memphis.)
3. When the operator asks, tell her the number you are calling from.

Use Area Codes when you make Long Distance calls. You'll find it easy and you'll like the fast way calls go through.

Here's another tip. The Area Code here is 817. Include Area Code 817 when giving your number to people in distant cities. This will help them call you faster.

For handy reference, include the Area Codes in your list of Long Distance telephone numbers. To help you start your list, Area Codes for several frequently called cities are shown at right. Many others are listed in your telephone directory. The Blue Book has a special column for writing Area Codes beside the numbers you call frequently. 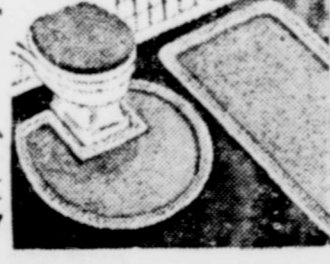

their individual belongings. When the youngsters are grown, the cabinet can be used to store shoe polish, brushes and other supplies.

Install cabinets under the sink. Put a drawer at the bottom and add a hinged cover. Put in a floor-to-ceiling cabinet at the end of the tub or wherever else you can find space.

Have plenty of towel rods. Allow 21 inches of rod space for each person. The rods can be installed on the bathroom door if there is a shortage of space.

Grab bars by the tub or shower help prevent falls. For a shower, place a vertical bar about 18 inches from the shower end of the tub. The center of a horizontal bar for tub users should be placed about a third of the length of the tub

from the faucets. Hooks for attaching a clothes line can be placed at each end of the tub, Miss Wirges pointed out.

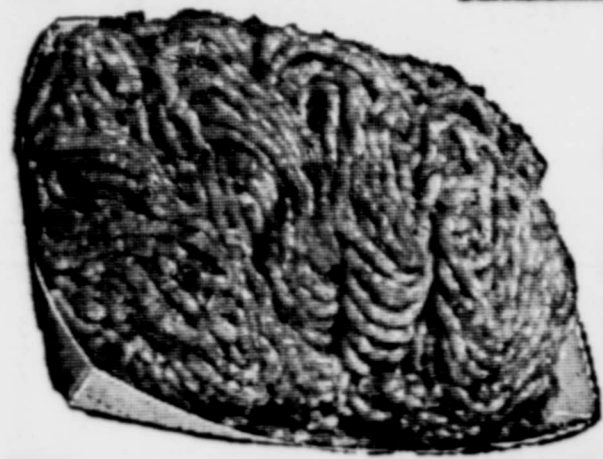

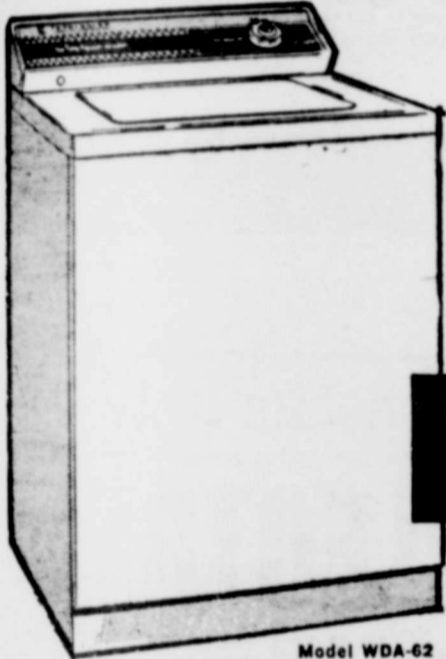

Babson Discusses Railroad Properties

In my column which appeared during the week of May 17th, I referred to the new corporations which are being formed by the Bangor & Aroostook and the Kansas City Southern railroads. I think this Release was No. 2050, which means that I have written this number of columns for a similar number of weeks over the years.

Should Wake Up
 These business corporations which are gradually being formed do not change the operations of the railroad passing through your city. Such a "business corporation", however, gives the railroad an opportunity to use its right-of-way, its stations, and its opportunities for business in more profitable ways. Every Chamber of Commerce should now take this matter up with the railroad passing through its city. Said railroad enlarging its facilities means a profit, which should mean an advantage to your city as well as to the stockholders of the railroad.

The railroad passenger business is dead and every community should recognize this as soon as possible. Otherwise, the railroad stockholder perhaps should consider alternatives in other transportation fields.

Suggestions to Chambers of Commerce

Every Chamber of Commerce at its next director's meeting should appoint a Railroad Committee. This Railroad Committee should meet and carefully go over the property of the one or more railroads passing thru its city. It further should ask the city tax assessors for a rough map of the property which these one or more railroads own in said city. In fact, it might be well to have the chairman of the Tax Assessment Committee present at the next meeting of the Railroad Committee. I fear that the railroad would hesitate to give a Chamber of Commerce a list of all its land holdings, even in said city; hence such a list must come from the tax assessors.

One of the first things for this Railroad Committee to consider is the amount of idle track which now exists. Certainly the

railroads will want no more tracks, and probably much of its present track could be abandoned, enabling abundant land to be utilized for other purposes. If the railroad company refuses to sell or use such land, they the assessors should feel free to raise the tax assessments thereon. The railroad Committee can explain to the railroad company authorities that it wishes to provide some additional earnings for the railroad rather than handicap them by higher taxes.

Formation of "Business Corporations" by a Railroad
 As suggested above, there are many things which a railroad

company can do without any additional legislation. The Boston & Albany Railroad, which runs through Wellesley, Mass., had two beautiful stone stations built during the prosper-

ous times. One of these it has rented to a clothes cleaning establishment, with a small waiting room for passengers. The other railroad station, one mile beyond, is being demolished by the railroad company which will sell the land for various purposes.

In almost every community there is a shortage of good parking spaces at the present time. There are sections of vacant land which the railroad company has which could be rented for parking lots. These would be both a contribution to the community, and also give a constantly increasing revenue to the railroad companies from whom it would collect money through the leases of the property.

Importance of Every Railroad Company Getting Permission From the Interstate Commerce Commission to Go Into Outside Business

Such "outside businesses" vary from the operation of buses to the leasing of supermarkets and small factories. This is a real opportunity for rail-

roads to discover what can be done. In the case of the Bangor & Aroostook, it has had its business corporation purchase a personal loan company to make small loans along its line; it is now negotiating for a machinery company to install automation in various plants in New

England. Its headquarters at Bangor, Maine; the Chamber of Commerce of that City be glad to send to any Chamber of Commerce of what the Bangor & Aroostook Corporation is doing.

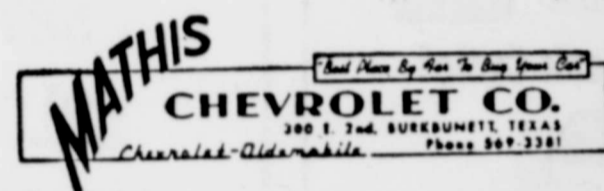

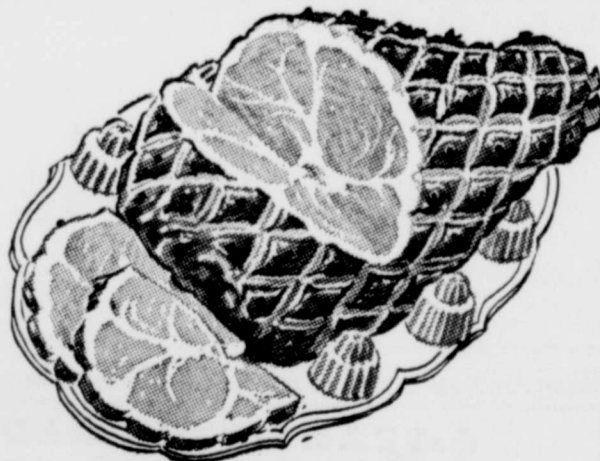

News From The Congress

Sam B. Purcell, Congressman

During the past week the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives reported out the "Trade Expansion Act of 1962." This is a big, all-inclusive trade bill designed by the President for the purpose of expanding our trade with other nations. Specifically, it is designed to put us in a better bargaining position with member nations of the European Common Market. Most of you know, a number of us who are members of the Ways and Means Committee have been waging a fight to protect our domestic oil industry by placing a reasonable limitation on imports of foreign oil. We were joined in this effort by a number of congressmen who studied the problems that exist and discovered, as we had done, that this was vital to our national security as well as being

vital to the economy of oil producing areas.

We were terribly shocked and disappointed to find that the final Committee version of the trade bill does not contain the provisions we had requested. It does not change the oil imports situation at all.

The bill will probably be considered by the House under a rule which will prohibit amendments from the floor. This means that the oil import regulations can not be added to the bill after it leaves the Committee on Ways and Means.

I believe the committee's action, or lack of action in this case, to be a complete failure to consider the facts presented in behalf of this proposal. The committee has, apparently, completely disregarded the very vital needs of this most necessary segment of our national economy.

Most important, it seems to me, the committee has failed to heed the warnings of the obvious results of a continuation of the present policy. It seems very clear to me that unless something is done soon to reverse the present trend in the domestic oil producing industry, this nation is going to find itself in the unfortunate position of not being able to produce enough oil domestically to take care of our needs in case of national emergency.

The independent oil producers, who produce 65% of the oil and drill 90% of the wells, are going out of business in large numbers. This is because excessive foreign imports and other factors have created such a large supply of oil that there

is no market for new production. If the oil men did drill new wells, they could not pump the oil out of the ground because there is no market for it. Consequently, thousands of people and hundreds of oil companies are out of business for lack of a market. Unless this situation is corrected, our domestic oil industry is going to be incapable of finding enough new oil reserves to supply our potential needs. This is why this problem is so vital to our national security. It is certainly foreseeable that our foreign supplies could be cut off by a national emergency, and we must be able to maintain our fuel supplies in that event.

For these reasons, I find that I cannot, in good conscience, support the Trade Expansion Act in its present form. There will probably be a motion made to re-commit this bill to the committee for revision. If this motion is made, I will vote to re-commit the bill.

The Administration considers this one of the so-called "must" bills in its program. While I agree that we should take steps to expand our ability to trade with other nations, I do not believe this should be done to the detriment of our national security, or in the face of what could be the ruin of the independent oil industry.

I urge your support of my position in this matter.

Graham Cracker-Nut Crust. Combine 1-1/4 cups fine graham cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup finely chopped nuts, and 2 tablespoons sugar. Add 1/3 cup melted butter and mix well. Firmly press over bottom and sides of a 9-inch pie pan. Chill 1 hour before filling. For baked crust, place in a moderate oven (375°F.) 5 to 8 minutes. Cool thoroughly before filling.

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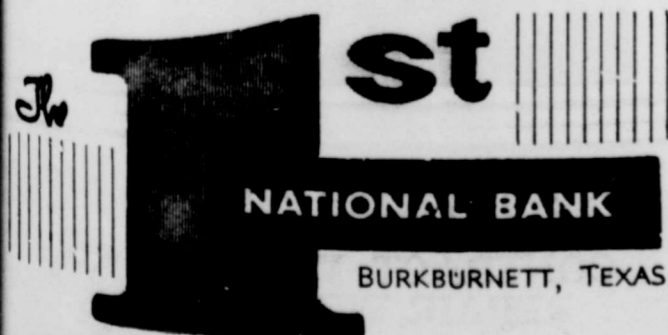

SOCIALIZED MEDICINE

The drive to gain political control and domination of the medical profession has reached fantastic proportions. It is doubtful that even Mr. Ribcoff, the prime mover in the attack upon medicine, has the remotest idea of what is involved in this effort to control both the doctor and the patient.

There is something of a blind frenzy in some of the statements used by those who seek the capture of this great profession. Mr. Ribcoff of the Health, Education and Welfare Department has made some ridiculous statements in his frantic quest for power. He accused doctors of "trying to blackmail the Congress and the American people." This is patently untrue. The doctors are seeking no political preferments of handouts. If doctors were trying to raid the public treasury and force taxpayers to maintain them by political force, their effort might properly be classified as attempted blackmail.

The doctors, however, object to this effort to impose political medicine upon the American people at taxpayer's expense and are trying to prevent the terrors of socialized medicine. It is the advocates of political compulsion for both doctors and patients who are truly "trying to blackmail the Congress and the American people."

The stern resistance of the medical profession has frustrated the political contrivers. This was evidenced when Mr. Ribcoff accused doctors opposing his domination of "violating the Hippocratic oath that they took before they began the practice of medicine."

Mr. Ribcoff should familiarize himself with the history of medicine and the Hippocratic oath. Hippocrates, a Greek physician, is credited with being the father of modern medicine because he, in his time, rebelled against the same kind of political domination Mr. Ribcoff now advocates. The Hippocratic oath is a defiance against political control and avarice. The effort to distort this oath and make it into something it is not is just as injurious to the cause of human freedom as the violation of the oath taken by federal administrators to uphold and defend the Constitution against its enemies, foreign and domestic.

The power of the federal administrator appears to be dedicated to the conquest of medicine. Politicians, at taxpayers expense, arranged 3 major mass meetings to sweep the doctors into submission. A speech by President Kennedy was a main attraction. Among other things Mr. Kennedy said:

"The fact of the matter is what we are now talking about doing, most of the countries of Europe did years ago. The British did it 30 years ago. We are behind every country pretty nearly in Europe in this matter of medical care for our citizens."

Which way was the President looking? The record is clear. American medicine is the envy of the world. The countries of Europe to which Mr. Kennedy referred have very low life expectancy compared to ours. They also have comparatively low health standards.

During the last 60 years, under politically independent practice of medicine in America, life expectancy increased 20 years. It has put our health standards far ahead of every nation where political domination of medicine exists.

The effort of politically dominated medicine is conquest for the sake of conquest. The medical profession is faced with the same condition confronting every factor of our private property—private enterprise system. We can outlaw these conquests by applying the terms of the LIBERTY AMENDMENT pending in Congress as H. J. Res. 22 and already approved by Wyoming, Texas, Ne-

vada, Louisiana, Georgia and South Carolina. It provides that:

"Sec. 1. The Government of the United States shall not engage in any business, professional, commercial, financial or industrial enterprise except as specified in the Constitution.

"Sec. 4. . . . Congress shall not levy taxes on personal incomes, estates and/or gifts."

A Sound Fishing Tip

Don't let muddy water discourage you from fishing. Murky water often is better than clear water, because when a fish's vision is obscured it feels by sound—carried to it either by radar-like nerve endings, or its hollow bones that act as sound chambers.

Fish pin-point the location of your lure by its vibrations. So, in murky water, or any water after dark, use a good noisy lure, which gives off heavy vibrations that a fish can hear.

Reel from slow to faster, until you feel the lure's strongest pulsations, then maintain that speed throughout retrieve.

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Multiple Sclerosis

Q. Is there anything new in treatment of multiple sclerosis?

A. Some years ago a diary developed that multiple sclerosis is related to fat intake. A year study has just been completed of 121 multiple sclerosis patients given a low-fat diet. Results are encouraging. Patients with signs of the disease did as well on the low-fat regime as about 95 per cent of those who maintained the same or improved during a period averaging 8 years. Late case plaques in the diet showed remarkable reduction in the number of relapses experienced. However, quite a few case patients continued to regress slowly.
