

A year ago President eKnnedy promised the country he would put before Congress a major tax reform billaimed at-equal treatment of equally situated persons.

Nothing wrong with that. And then just a few weeks ago, the President gave us some equally promising words. He would ask Congress for tax cuts for all. Certainly nothing wrong with that either. Not on the surface any-

But from the evidence at hand the new tax bill that's been brewing for over a year now will prove to be more like a 50 megaton bomb than a soothing syrup in its effect on the U. S. taxpayer, It will, on the face of it, provide tax cuts alright. But it will then reach back into every taxpayer's hind pocket-big and small-to pay for them. And it also appears that somebody forgot to pass along whatever formula the President had for "equal to Congress in August: treatment of squally-situated persons.'

Policybolder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance



Q. Why do I have to pay interest on my life insurance policy loan, when it is my policy and my cash

A. It is your policy, but the cash value is yours only if you actually take it out and drop the policy. Until that time, the funds you are accumulating in your policy are part of a general fund in which all other policyholders are participating. #### Attic Heat Gain Cut 7½ Times In Cooling Study

An uninsulated attic will allow approximately 5½ times more heat to enter a house than an attic that's properly insulated. This was discovered during an exhaustive study initiated by the Federal Housing Administration and conducted at the University of Illinois by engineers of the air conditioning and heating industry. This figure is based on an outside temperature of 90 degrees and an "average" range of daily temperature extremes. An uninsulated attic will al-

Air conditioning authorities have found that proper insula-tion, in addition to assuring comfort, also helps keep operat-ing costs low, and often makes it possible to reduce the size and cost of the air-conditioning

In new houses, batts or blan-kets of mineral wool insulation can be installed easily during construction. To insulate a house properly for air conditioning as well as electric heat, the National Mineral Wool Insulation Association recommends batts or blankets of mineral wool labeled R-19 for ceilings, R-11 for walls, and R-13 for floors over unheated spaces. The "R" number refers to resistance to heat flow.

A form of mineral wool called "blowing wool" is used to in-sulate existing houses. Blowing wool is forced through a hose under air pressure into spaces between ceiling and floor joists and wall studs. Qualified insulation contractors can install blowing wool in houses with virtually any kind of exterior facing material.

Another way to reduce the air conditioning load is the use of a light shade of asphalt shingles. According to the study, a com-bination of white or light color roofing and proper attic insula-tion was 7½ times more effec-tive in blocking the passage of heat into a house than dark roofing and no insulation.

The new minimum requirements, based on recently revised standards of Underwriters' Laboratories, became effective April 23.

In announcing the revision, FHA Commissioner Neal J. Hardy said the change in standards "involves increasing the weight of the shingles from 210 pounds per square (100 square feet of roofing) to 235 pounds per square, together with several technical changes in the minimum of 240°F, on coating,
