This Week's Ideas - for Sportsmen

Fish, fowl and meats are delicious when broiled over charcoal fires. For those who like that flavorsome hickory taste, here are some suggestions:

Get someone who owns a wood-lot to give you a log or two of hickory. Saw the log into sections only five or six inches long. Split each section into small billets about finger size. Store the billets in burlap bags until they are dry. These hickory billets burn down to long-lasting coals, with or with-out added charcoal.

Place a layer of these billets side by side, close together, on the fire-bed of the outdoor grille. Lay a billet crossways on the two ends. Place a "Sterno" Charcoal Lighter Cube in the center of the wood, and light it. Lay more billets cross-ways on top; then either add charcoal or additional billets to provide as big a fire as needed.

The object is not to smother the flame, and to let it burn up through the criss-crossed billets to get a good fire going quickly. If no "Sterno" Charcoal Lighter Cubes are handy, a gob of "Sterno Canned Heat" dug from the familiar can with a stick will do as well. This pink-colored fuel is recommended because it is solidified alcohol which is smokeless and nearly odorless. Since it remains solid even when burning, it is very safe to use; far superior to newspapers and other types of

wait until the fire has burned down to coals before starting to cook. If you want more hickory cook. If you want more hickory amoke flavor than the dry hickory provides, soak a few of the hickory billets in a pail of water. Lay a wet billet or two directly on the coals. If flameless cooking is desired, wrap a billet or two in aluminum foil, and then puncture the foil in several places. Lay this on the coals. The foil-wrapped hickory won't flame up, but it will provide amough hickory smoke to give delicious flavor to the foods which are being brolled.

THREE FACTS ABOUT COMMUNISM

Fallout

Planning

Last week we defined the "alert" level of radiation. When this is reached it becomes important to determine the amounts of different radioactive substances present in the fallout area. This is necessary because different fallout materials are distributed in the body differently and are retained in the body for different periods. The retention time will depend upon the "half-life" of the fallout components. "Half-life" is the time required for a radioactive substance to lose one half of its radiation strength. From a health standpoint the most important fallout elements are:

Iodine¹³¹: half-life 8 days Strontium 89: half-life 58 days Strontium 90: half-life 27 years Cesium¹³⁷: half-life 27 years Having determined the composi ion of fallout material, the next step is to determine the health hazards by use of guide-lines set up by the Federal Radiation Council. These guide-lines express the potential hazards of the radiation against the reasons for accepting the hazards. The answers are expressed in three different ranges, which help scientists determine what action is called for. As our readers are by now aware, the fallout problem is very complex
