#### s From The The price of fertilizer did not increase during the period from 1951 to 1960. But, during the unty Agent same period, wages for hired farm labor increased 34 percent,

farm machinery costs increased 29 percent and real estate taxes 62 per cent, added Haws. Texas farmers and ranchers are realizing that fertilizer is a good buy because they increased the amount purchased during this period 23 per cent, and there is room for additional in-

creases in fertilizer use. In considering the use of additional fertilizer, a soil test should be made. A soil test will tell the amount of additional plant nutrients required for a given level of production. Also, it indicates the proper balance between plant nutrients for optimum growth and yields.

The form of fertilizer from which the recommended plant nutrients are obtained will have some influence on their price. Study the various forms and analyses in order to save on fertilizer costs but be sure to buy the kind and amount needed and don't just buy fertilizer, explains the county agent.

To determine just how good a buy fertilizer is on your farm, be sure to leave a check plot.

The cotton farmer who thinks that low infestations of bollworms are not harmful may be losing considerable production

Water, water everywhere but concludes Haws. Bossy needs a drink. Water, the cheapest item in milk production, is all too often the limiting factor, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

Milk is about 87 percent water and the dairy cow needs about five gallons of water to produce a gallon of milk. Water also comprises 75 percent of the cow's total weight.

The food nutrients are carried to the parts of the body by water and the body wastes are carried from the animal by this important liquid. Of all the animals, the dairy cow in milk requires the greatest amount of water, in proportion to her size. Thus, to the dairy cow, water is as important as feed.

The amount of water a cow will drink depends upon her body size, the amount of milk she gives, the air temperature and humidity and the amount of water in the feed she eats. An average consumption of water per day is 121/2 to 15 gallons, but some very high pro-ducing cows may drink 35 gallons or more.

Therefore, make sure your herd has access to plenty of fresh, clean water of a desir-





harvest mites. Call them chiggers. By whatever name, they mean sleepless nights and ceaseless spasms of itching misery.

This is their season. It will yard until the spray dies. ther cuts into their ranks. A few people have an apparent immunity to chigger attacks, but the vast majority of us are oh-so-susceptable.

They-the chiggers-have a special affinity for low, damp places covered with vegetation. Bermuda grass harbors them well, but for some unexplained reason they are not usually found in carpet grass. Just for the record, it's the

larave which do the damage, attaching themselves with their mouthparts and sucking blood until they become engorged and fall off. The fiery itching is cased by an anti-coagulant material they inject into their host.

Although adult chiggers large, red and velvety - are probably harmless to humans. their wayward offspring can be serious as well as annoying. Not that they spread any specific disease-at least not in this country - but their bites demand scratching which frequently causes secondary infections in the form of sores and boils.

To learn where chiggers are harboring, stand a piece of black cardboard of end where you suspect their presence. If after a few moments you see tiny yellowish or pinkish mites accumulating on the upper edge you know it's time to check your supply of insecticide. Chiggers attack lizards.

snakes, birds, and rodents with the same vigor and resourcefulness they display in attacking humans. No distinction is drawn between man and lesser animal species, which is hardly complimentary to us Homo sapiens. Light applications of sulphur dust on lawns and low branches of shrubs have been used successfully for years to control

chiggers. Nowadays, the new insecticides such as chlorodane and lindane give better results. Just follow the directions on the


