





How Builders Are Needs of Home Owners

There's a definite degree of conflict in the desires of many home owners for both freedom and privacy.

On the other hand, they want protection and isolation from prying eyes and the hustle of

crowded streets. On the other hand, they crave greater freedom of vision and movement along with a generous parcel of outdoor living.

At first glance, it would seem easier to fit a square peg in a round hole than to fulfill com-pletely all of these contrasting 'wants"-especially on the typically small urban lot.

However, don't discount the ingenuity of today's designers and builders. In many a bright and novel package, they're blending all the necessary ingredients of freedom, privacy and outdoor living.

To generate more living space in small homes on small lots. they're engineering roof designs, the Southern Pine Association says. One such system is wood plank-and-beam construction—an ideal medium for the high strength and natural beauty of Southern Pine. The high self sufficiency of this roof structure permits a simplified floor plans and partitioning. Some partitions can be eliminated for the sake of larger rooms. Others can be fashioned in the form of space conserving storage-type room dividers.
At the front of the house, dis-

creet clerestory windows form an attractive companion piece for plank-and-beam. These ceiling level windows let in light, but assure privacy. Beneath

with solid but appealing ma-terials, such as wood boards-Resolving Conflicting and battens siding. The strong vertical look of the battens-and-boards blends beautifully with the handsome horizontal lines of the beamed ceiling.

Toward the house rear, the self sufficiency of plank-and-beam fulfills the conditions of freedom and outdoor living.

Here, the strength of the roof permits placement of large window areas adjacent to private and attractively landscaped patios. The outdoors comes streaming in and the rooms seem much larger than they really are.

The "wood deck" plays a prominent part in this plan. Two inch thick lumber decking forms the roof structure and finished ceiling of the house. A wood deck may also provide comfortable and attractive walking surface for the exterior patio. When the lumber is subject to severe weather exposure. it should be pressure treated with chemical preservatives.





"Yes, it's the thymus gland," says Dr. Robert A. Good, research professor of pediatrics at the University of Minnesota,



A part of City Ordinance No. 250, pertaining to the Vaccination, Licensing and Restraining of Dogs Within the City Limits.

SECTION II Vaccination and License

It is unlawful to keep or cause to be kept within the territorial limits of the city, any dog, after the 1st day of July of any year. without first having said dog vaccinated for rabies within 60 days preceding July 1, and presenting a Certificate of Vaccination to the City Inspector, and obtaining a license for keeping the dog in said city for the ensuing or current year.

All dogs are to be vaccinated on becoming three months old. SECTION V

Restraint The owner shall keep his dog under restraint at all times, and shall not permit such dog to be at large off the premises of the owner, unless on leash and under the control of a compet-
