Stamp Out Polio On Sunday Program

T-SHEET—Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine

MASS POLIO PROGRAM SET AT TOWN HALL IN BURKBURNETT, SUNDAY, SEPT. 16

"Eliminating polio is as easy as eating a sugar cube. In fact, that's all you have to do. Sunday September 16, you can go to Burkburnett Town Hall and help stamp out polio... by eating a sugar cube."

This is the message to Burkburnett and surrounding communities from the local Medical Doctors.

"The sugar cube you eat will have three drops of Sabin oral polio vaccine on it... placed there under the careful supervision of the pharmacists.

"Even though you may have taken Salk shots, which gave you personal immunity against polio, you can carry and transmit the polio virus to others who aren't immune. By taking the Sabin vaccine, you can prevent such transmission and build even greater resistance within your own body."

Medical authorities say that only one dose of Sabin vaccine for each of the three types of polio is all that is needed to build permanent immunity. The Salk method requires periodic boosters.

Even older folks are urged to take the Sabin vaccine. While they are beyond the susceptible age, they can carry and transmit the virus to others.

Sabin vaccine has been found to be completely safe. More than 286 million doses of the vaccine have been given, and no undesirable effects have been reported. Also, not one case of polio has occurred among them after the vaccine had had sufficient time to build

immunity. "Sufficient time" is four to five weeks.

The Wichita County Medical Society, sponsor of the mass immunization program anticipates a turnout of about 140,000 people throughout the county.

Although this program will cost a lot of money, no specific charge is being made for the vaccine. Contribution boxes will be located in the clinic for those who want to donate their fair share of the cost.

A donation of 25 cents per dose is suggested. However, those who cannot afford to pay will receive the vaccine free of charge. "Our aim is to immunize everyone, regardless of his financial status," said the local medical doctors.

All persons between the ages of "three months and 103 years" are urged to take the Sabin Vaccine Sunday, September 16. Polio can be stopped cold if everyone will go to the Town Hall next Sunday and eat a sugar cube, that's really all there is to it, the sponsors pointed out.

Volunteer workers from numerous civic, social, trade and professional groups will staff the clinics in an effort to stamp out polio Sunday. These folks are doing more than their share to stop the polio menace.

All they ask the citizens to do is take a few minutes out of the day next Sunday, and eat a sugar cube containing three drops of Sabin vaccine. It is worth the time. Besides, the sugar has only nine calories. The clinic will be held from 12 noon until 6:00 p. m.

If you have more than six minor children, you can obtain additional forms at most grocery stores, department stores and other places where people congregate. Our Space Age Horse and Buggy

We have a right to congratulate ourselves on such space spectaculars as global TV, but we should take warning that the advantage won by American science can still be lost.

A case in point is international communications, where the vista of space satellite transmissions—television, telegraph and other—is dazzling.

Yet we are warned by the nation's greatest communications pioneer, David Sarnoff, head of the Radio Corporation, that practices and regulations, some of them harking back, in spirit at least, to pre-Civil War days, could prevent our reaping the full benefits of leadership.

Today, as he noted in a speech to the American Bar Association, both telephone and telegraph can be transmitted over the same circuits. But in the international field, American telegraph companies are not permitted to use overseas voice channels to provide a full public service, voice and message, nor can they link up with the domestic telephone system for this purpose. The result is half a service in which the public is the loser.

For another example, communications in foreign countries are generally under government monopoly. Here ten American international telegraph companies compete for the business and negotiate separately with the foreign monopolies, sometimes to our disadvantage.

General Sarnoff urges that, while there is still time, we get in step with the new era in communications. He proposes that we unify the present international carriers into a single privately owned American company, independently operated but under Government regulation; a company that could deal on equal terms with foreign

monopolies and provide the public a full service geared to Space Age realities. Failure to do this, he warns, "could delay and even frustrate our national purposes".

Keep in mind that we are not the only nation with space capabilities and ambitions. Getting a satellite into space is only half the job. The payoff is how we put our communications service to work for America and her prestige around the world.

"This is not the kind of court to which we should turn over the power to determine whether it has jurisdiction over the internal affairs of the United States."

Farm Facts

If you spend \$100 a year for meat, then your meat bill is slightly more than the average, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The Department's Agricultural Marketing Service economists figure the average person has been spending about \$91 per year for meat and that this represents about 46% of his income.

The \$91 bought 138 pounds of meat—55.8 pounds of beef, 64.6 pounds of pork, 6.3 pounds of veal, and 4.6 pounds of lamb and mutton.

Consumption of meat for 1961, according to the USDA, is expected to be about 4 pounds per person more than last year. Beef consumption is expected to reach a record high of 89-99 pounds per person.

Per capita consumption of a factory today will buy more than two pounds of round steak, as compared with 1.8 pounds in 1939 and 1.2 in 1929. A factory worker in the Soviet Union would have to work an hour and 22 minutes to earn a single pound of beef.

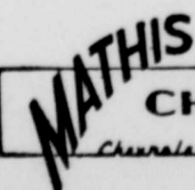

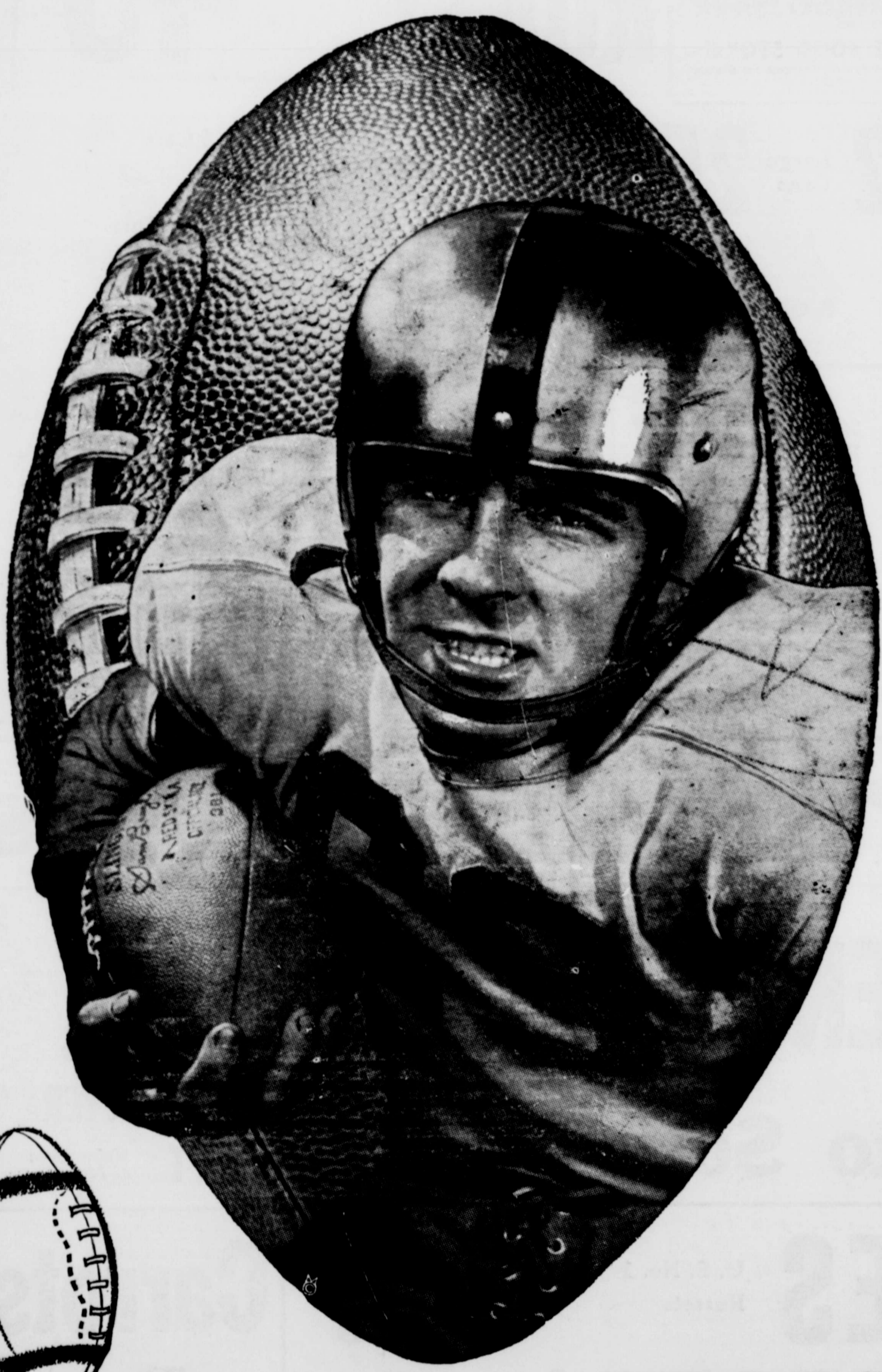

A—Your doctor will tell you how to collect a specimen of your feces (bowel movement) to send to a laboratory to see



Policyholder Questions Answered
by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. Can I name my children as beneficiaries of my life insurance?
A. A minor child cannot legally receive money or property. If you were to name your children directly as your beneficiaries, your life insurance company might not be able to pay them the proceeds of



your policy until they became of age. If your children are still young, it would be preferable to name an adult guardian to receive the money for them. Or, if the amount involved is large, you might wish to set up a trust fund for them.

Q. What is the purpose of an endowment life insurance policy?

A. A person buys an endowment policy to accumulate a savings fund and to have life insurance protection while he is doing it. The policy guarantees that his savings goal will be achieved if he should die before he can complete it. The policyholder himself receives the full face amount of the policy when it matures. But if he should die prematurely, his family or other beneficiary would receive the full amount.

For example, endowment policies are often used to accumulate college education funds. By taking out an endowment policy on his own life, a father can make sure that, whether he lives or dies, funds will be available to send his children to college.

Many people also use endowment policies to build up a retirement fund. Most life companies offer endowment policies maturing when the policyholder reaches age 65. These policies can provide retirement benefits for the policyholder himself if he lives out his normal lifespan. At the same time, his family is protected against the possibility that he might die prematurely.

Business and professional men often use endowment policies to help achieve their career goals. For example, a young doctor or lawyer associated in practice with an older man might take out an endowment policy that would eventually provide funds to buy the practice when the older man retires. In the meantime, if the younger man should die his family would get the money.

if hookworm eggs can be found. The laboratory will examine this specimen and furnish your doctor with a report of its findings.

Q—How do hookworms eggs get into the feces?

A—Hookworm eggs come from the adult worms which are in the intestines.

Q—How do the adult worms get into the intestines?

A—Hookworm eggs hatch in the soil and the young worms penetrate the skin, getting into the blood vessels and find their way to the intestines where they grow to adults.

Q—How may I keep from getting hookworms?

A—You can easily keep from getting hookworms by placing all human feces in a properly protected toilet. The young worms will not have a chance to reach the bare skin. Never walk barefooted on the ground where human feces has been placed.

Q—If it is that easy to keep from getting hookworms, why do so many people have the worms?

A—Many people, especially children, have the worms be-

cause they place their feces on the ground in a shady, damp place and walk barefooted over the same ground and the young worms get on their bare skin.

Q—Will hookworms cause me any harm?

A—Yes. They suck blood out of the little blood vessels in the wall of your intestines. The parts of your body which make

blood have to work harder to make new blood to take the place of that stolen from you by the worms.

Q—If I have ever had hookworms, is there any danger of me getting them again?

A—You may have them many times. Many people get new ones every few days to add to the old worms they already

have.

Q—Is there any way I can get rid of hookworms if the laboratory finds that I have them?

A—Yes. Your family doctor can treat you and completely rid you of hookworms. AND NOW YOU KNOW HOW TO KEEP FROM GETTING THEM AGAIN!

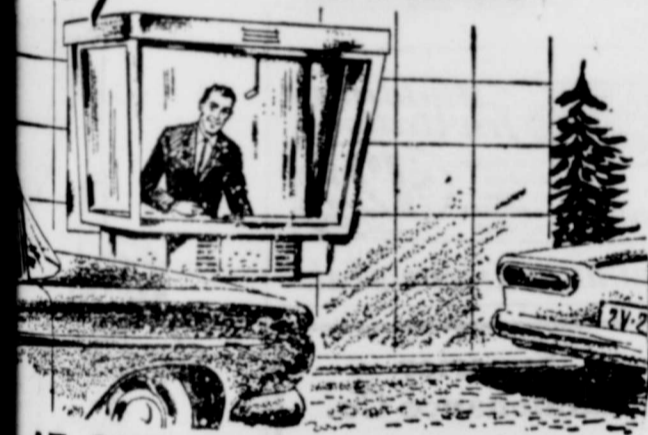

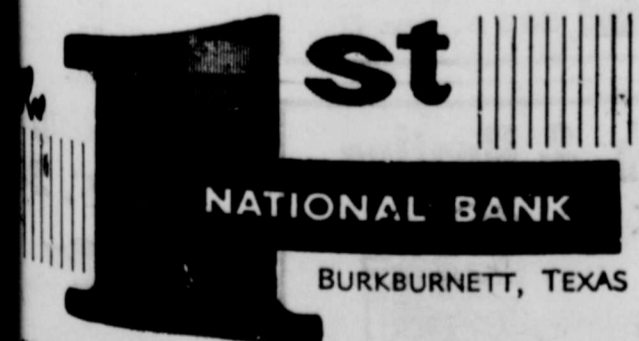
