Wolfe Ford Company Announces New Car And Truck Warranty

J. Harold and Joe K. Wolfe, co-owners of Wolfe Ford Company, Burk Burnett, today announced that all purchasers of 1963 Ford cars and trucks will receive a 24-month or 24,000-mile warranty.

The new warranty, they said, represents a doubling of the 12-month, 12,000-mile warranty, with which Ford dealers led the industry in offering to their customers in the 1961 model year.

The 24,000-mile warranty was pioneered by the Lincoln Continental on 1961 models.

"Extension of this warranty to other car and truck models for 1963," Mr. J. Harold Wolfe said, "is possible because of continued progress toward quality and reliability goals that year after year have enabled Ford dealers to be the leader in providing products requiring less and less maintenance."

Terms of the new warranty provide that for 24 months or for 24,000 miles, whichever comes first, free replacement, including related labor, will be made by authorized dealers of any part with a defect in workmanship or materials. Tires and tubes are not covered by the warranty; appropriate adjustments will continue to be made by the tire people. Owners will remain responsible for normal operations, such as wheel, brake and clutch adjustments and engine tune-up, and for routine replacement of such items as filters, spark plugs, ignition points, wiper blades, and brake and clutch linings. The warranty also will not apply to deterioration of soft trim and appearance items due to usage and exposure to the elements.

The new warranty covers both the original owner and subsequent owners during the specified mileage and time periods.

Mr. Wolfe said that his dealership introduced their new 1963 models to the public on Friday, September 28th.

The Crime of 'Unlimited Secrecy'

"Washington Cover-Up" is the title of a new book by Clark Mollenhoff, which Doubleday has published. And Mr. Mollenhoff, let it be said at the start, is no political gossip. He is a capital correspondent of top reputation who has won many awards, the Pulitzer Prize among them.

He tells us that unlimited secrecy, at high levels has been "employed to hide incompetence, laxity, bungling, and outright frauds in the Defense Department, in the foreign aid program, and in dozens of other areas." And these crimes of omission and commission, he says in effect, have occurred in both Democratic and Republican Administrations. So this is not a partisan problem.

Other reputable reporters of the national scene have said much the same thing. And it is particularly evil when the Defense Department is involved. For Defense accounts for more than half of all federal spending. The American people support this enormous burden willingly, looking on it as a sacrifice our age demands in the name of survival. So, if any agency of the government should be as Caesar's wife, Defense is that one.

Secrecy in government affairs can be justified only when a real question of security is at stake—when the release of information would aid our enemies. In all other areas, it needs to be rooted out.

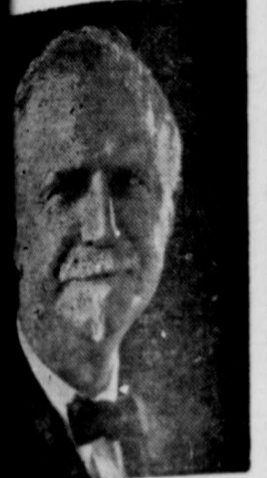

will. Most people realize
scarcely, and yet I am con-
surprised by the num-

ber of intelligent folk who "just don't get around to it." Nobody likes to think about death, and still one cannot look at the daily newspapers without realizing how many reach an untimely end through automobile smashups and other hazards of civilization. You may live to a very ripe old age, but you might die tomorrow. Let me tell you why I think it is all important to protect your estate by a will, whatever your age.

Select Your Own Executor
A will gives you the opportunity of choosing in advance a friendly executor rather than having some judge appoint an acquaintance of his with whom you might not be satisfied. If you die intestate and the court has to disburse your estate, it can run up a lot of costs, including the necessity for a bond. Most of these costs can be avoided by making your will and appointing your own executor. Under some circumstances, your executor can give your beneficiaries securities or property at a fair value instead of cash.

Your own executor, also, can

use discretionary powers that a court appointee would not possess. He can, for example, decide what property to sell, and follow out the directions in your will as to the disposition of certain articles of clothing, furniture, etc. to definite friends or relatives. He can do the things that you want done in the way that you would do them yourself, without litigation fears. Your estate may be saved thousands of dollars because your executor can be given time thru your will to use his best judgment and consult with other people, and thus avoid liquidating your assets hurriedly or during a time of depression.

Wills Permit Special Provisions
Only through a will can you arrange to leave money in trust so that the bereaved can have the full income for life and then have the principal go to the children or other chosen people. You can, if you wish, distribute your property in unequal amounts among your heirs where the need of some may be greater than that of others. It should be clearly recognized, too, that it could take

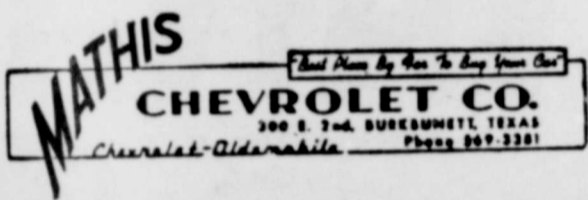

explain any technicalities to you, particularly as to the laws in your state.

It is a good idea to have at least three carbon copies of your will so that your suggested executor can familiarize himself with your intentions. One can be put in your safe-deposit

box for your own personal reference, and one can remain with your lawyer. The original should be left with your bank and a receipt therefor obtained. Even if you have not very much money at this time, you should make a will. It will turn out to be a fine investment for you.

Satellite City. Also, Mrs. Garcia showed colored slides of many interesting subjects there in Mexico, and her talk was enjoyed by all those present.

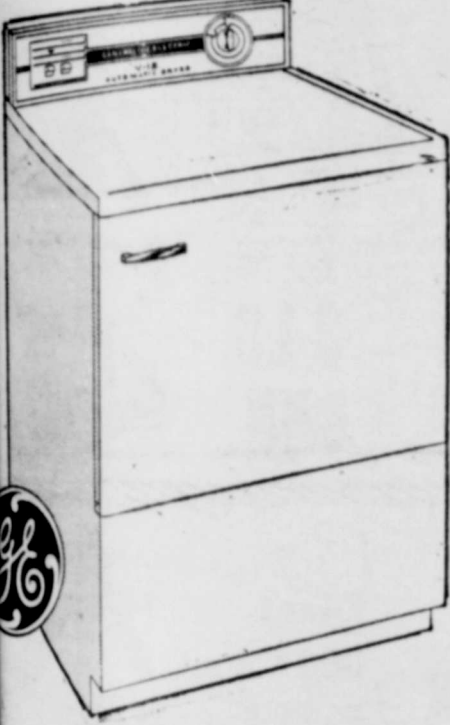

Engineers See to It More to Today's Window Than Meets The Eye

Dry air is as necessary to proper functioning of some modern windows as is glass itself. While the best windows made for homes today might seem to consist only of glass and wood, they incorporate many specialized components selected by engineers so that the windows will operate properly for the life of the house.

For Long Wear
Nylon bearings, vinyl gaskets, "non-galling" gears, water-repellent and preservative chemicals, and anodized weatherstripping are among the other refinements that make a significant difference between good windows and cheap ones—even though the two might look much the same.

Operating hardware—for instance sliding hinges with nylon bearings that fit into stainless steel tracks—is designed to work smoothly and eliminate any possibility that the sash might sag or rattle in the wind. Locks are made not only for security but to draw the sections of a window tightly together to seal out cold air.

Gears Don't 'Gall'
When gears are used, as in the crank that operates a casement window, one gear may be made of metal, the other of plastic. This prevents the binding, or "galling," action of metal-to-metal contact.

Water-repellent, preservative treatment makes wood highly resistant to the effects of weather, forestalling warping, swelling, and shrinking.

Factory-assembled
With old-fashioned house construction methods, window sash and frame were assembled at the site. The best modern technique calls for stock ponderosa pine window "units." A unit is completely constructed in a mill-work factory. Sash, frame, hardware, weatherstripping, balancing devices and all other parts are designed to work together.

Basic Growth Factors
Growth is the result of a combination of factors which enables an industry or company to increase its sales and profits over a period of years. One of the fundamental growth forces is population increase. This is the basis of potential demand for goods and services.

Technological advances constitute another vital growth force. This is quite obvious at the present time because of the great interest in science. In the form of automation, for example, technological advances can raise the level of productivity and lower production and distribution costs.

How to Recognize Growth Stocks
Selection of growth stocks involve considerable judgment because indiscriminate purchases can be very costly. Many factors must be carefully weighed. Without getting involved in the more technical details, I suggest use of at least the following benchmarks when choosing a growth stock.

Look first for a better-than-average record of increased sales and profits, of around 5% a year for at least five years. Allowances must be made for interruptions in the growth trend due to recessions, strikes, etc., but growth stocks usually bounce back strongly from these setbacks. Most growth

companies plow back a substantial part of each year's earnings. This builds up future earning power and allows for internal financing for future expansion.

Importance of Timing
During the recent market slump, the so-called growth issues took a fearsome pounding. This emphasizes the need to be patient for worthwhile buying points, as well as to be patient for the growth to occur. At this

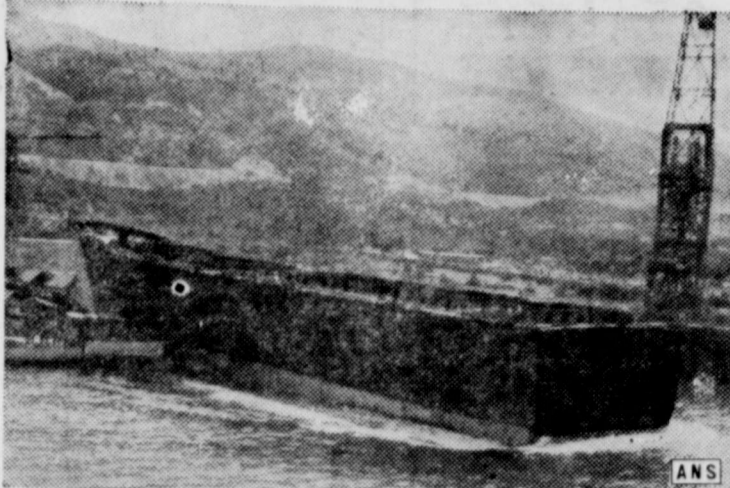
juncture, a good deal of the froth has been taken off the price of stocks. While some further decline may occur—barring Cuba, an increasing number of growth issues are becoming more realistically priced.

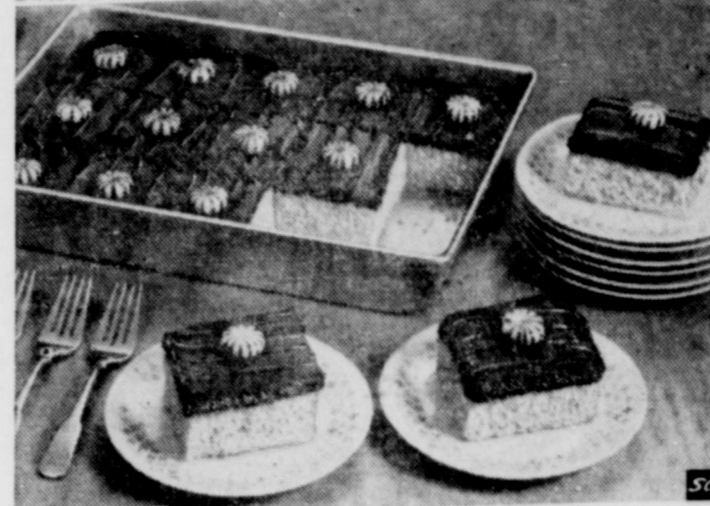

Happy Day Cake

2-1/2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour
3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1-1/2 cups sugar

1/2 cup shortening (at room temperature)
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs, unbeaten

Easy Chocolate Frosting

Measure sifted flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar into sifter. Stir shortening to soften. Sift in dry ingredients. Add 3/4 cup of the milk and the vanilla; mix until all flour is dampened. Then beat 2 minutes at a medium speed of electric mixer or 300 vigorous strokes by hand. Add eggs and remaining milk and beat 1 minute longer in mixer or 150 strokes by hand. Pour batter into 13x9x2-inch pan and bake in moderate oven (350°F.) about 30 to 35 minutes.

Easy Chocolate Frosting

Cream 2 tablespoons butter; add 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar gradually, blending well. Add 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1-1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted; mix thoroughly. Then add an additional 1 cup of sifted confectioners' sugar, alternately with about 3 tablespoons of milk, until of right consistency to spread. Beat until smooth. Makes 1-1/2 cups frosting.

Farm Facts

American farmers last year set a new production record. The total for crops and livestock in 1960 was 29% above the country's 1947-49 average.

This report comes from Rex Daly, chief of the Farm Income Branch, Agricultural Economics Division, Agricultural Marketing Service.

Output was equal to that of Mainland China and almost 60% higher than that of the Soviet Union—the world's two other largest agricultural producers.

On a per capita basis, our production was double that of the Soviet Union. It was four times that of Mainland China. Record output in the United States was accomplished with 30% fewer workers and about 5% fewer acres of crop land than in 1947-49. There was a 43% increase in yields per acre for field crops.

Production during the 1950's increased faster than population—27% compared to 19%. This resulted in big accumulations of wheat, feed grains, and cotton.

Farm output will continue to

rise to meet the expanded requirements of the coming decade, Daly predicts. Farmers can be expected to further increase the size of their holdings. Farms will become more mechanized. Fewer workers will be needed to produce the larger output.

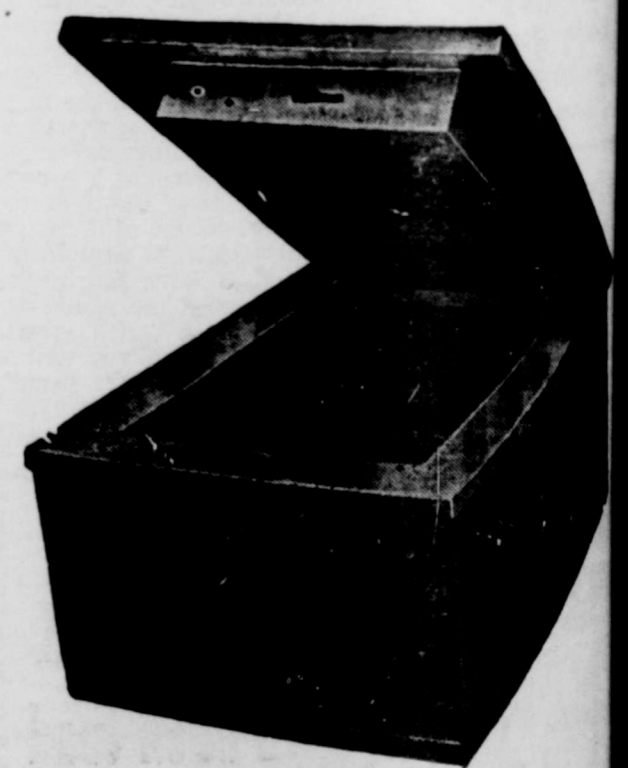

FISHING LINES

By DICK WOLFF

Do you realize that everytime you've fished through a thunderstorm, lightning has struck once or twice within a half mile of you? Most of us know enough to get out of the water during a thunderstorm, but few of us know what other safety precautions to take.

More than 70 per cent of the strikes occur during the summer months of July, August, and September, fishermen might well take note of the tips offered by the Lightning Protection Institute of Chicago. Knowing what to do can save your life.

Get out of the water. Stay away from open fields, a hill, or other exposed place.

Don't get under a lone tree, seek protection by a wire fence, or under an overhead power line.

Look for shelter in a low place protected by lightning rods, or in a steel frame house. If your car is nearby, get close to the windows and stay away from tall, pointed trees.

If shelter isn't nearby, protection in a ravine, under a cliff, in a ditch or cave, or on a flat on the ground.

In a wooded area, choose a spot of low shrubs for protection — stay away from tall, pointed trees.

If you're in an unprotected building, don't stand in a doorway or near open windows. Keep away from metal objects — fireplaces, the sink, the telephone and TV set.

If you're in a boat, be sure that it is grounded with conductors running from the mast, or highest point, under the hull, to the shore.

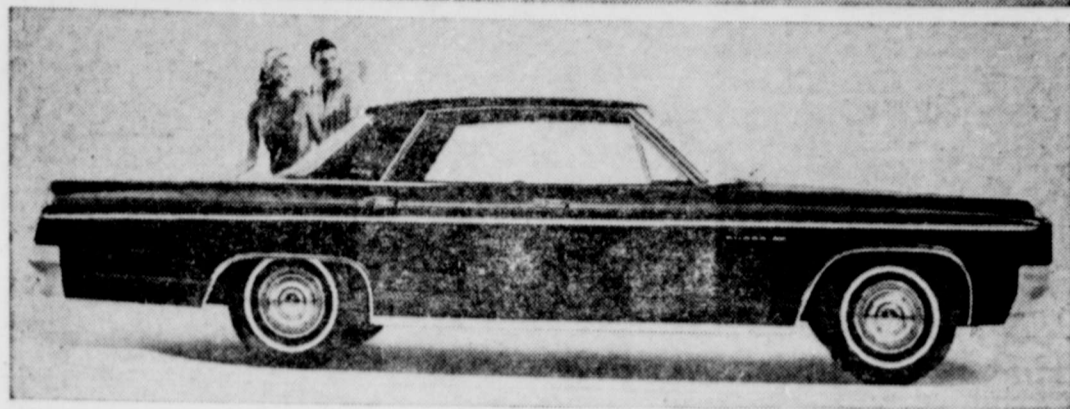
Remember, the highest object in the area is the one most likely to be struck by lightning. Make sure that you're not the highest object.

The greatest danger occurs just before the storm when the air feels "heavy" or "charged." Don't delay in seeking shelter. Lightning does strike — and often. You can compute the number of strikes expected in your area by estimating one or two strikes for each of the thunderstorms normally experienced, and 40 per cent of all rural fires are attributed to lightning.

To play it safe, keep your rod and reel a few feet away and in a spot, or lean the rod against low shrubs. Reels are metal and are good conductors — don't be foolish and stand in mid-stream casting away while the lightning crackles in the heavens above you.

as much of their money back as possible.

The court then adjudges the man a bankrupt. This means, with some exceptions, that the court will discharge him of his debts. Any income he gets after that time cannot be reached in court to pay his old debts.

Debtors may try to gain in ways not intended by the bankruptcy laws. If so, creditors may object. Besides, the courts may deal drastically with such debtors under criminal laws.

Under the bankruptcy laws, a man is not required to surrender to his creditors certain items. In this state, they usually include the family stove, refrigerator, radio, wearing apparel, working tools of one's trade and certain other items which vary with each individual case.

Even though items may be exempt from the creditors in bankruptcy, however, if they were purchased under a conditional sales contract, the unpaid seller may nevertheless repossess such goods despite a bankruptcy; so, too, the holder of a chattel mortgage on such goods may require them to be turned over to him.

BANKRUPTCY

In bygone days when a man got himself hopelessly into debt, the courts would jail him until he paid. Or, as in our colonial days a man became an "indentured" servant, and would come to America to work off his debt.

Neither jail nor servitude proved practical. A man in jail could not earn anything to pay his debt. It was drastic—something like the Siberian salt mines—to send a man to serve for years across the seas.

Through hard luck, illness, easy credit, impulse buying, or shifts in world affairs, men and women find themselves hopelessly in debt.

Our bankruptcy laws aim to permit an honest but unlucky or weak debtor to turn over a new leaf. They allow him to file a voluntary petition in bankruptcy. He accounts for all of his property and turns it over for his creditor's benefit. The court sets up machinery to get

News From The County Agent

Twenty-two Wichita County 4-H boys and girls will enter broilers in the Dallas Fair on October 12. The Broiler Show will be judged on Sat., October 13. The boys and girls entering broilers are: Gen Baxter, Sonny Bentley, Sue and Tommy Cantrell, Jimmy, L. Here are some tips on fall lawn care from County Agent, B. T. Haws.

He suggests that you apply a complete fertilizer to your lawn before winter so the grasses can go into the winter in a vigorous condition. The grasses will remain green longer in the fall and will grow off earlier next spring. Then, too, you will have less trouble with those winter and spring weeds.

The fertilizer should be applied about a month before the first expected frost. Haws suggests a fertilizer with a 2-1-1 or 1-1-1 ratio at a rate to supply two pounds of actual nitrogen for each 1,000 square feet of lawn. This amount of nitrogen will be found in 20 pounds of 10-5-5 or 25 pounds of 8-8-8.

If you would like additional information on care of your lawn, ask your county extension agents for a copy of B-203, "Home Lawns."

Alfalfa is a forage crop with several uses. B. T. Haws, county agent, points out that it may be grazed, dehydrated, fed as green chop made into silage or hay, and in addition, is a top source of honey and as a good

soil builder. It is, he adds, one of the most palatable and nutritious forage crops grown when harvested at the proper stage of growth. The forage is high in protein, minerals and vitamins and low in fiber.

Haws says there are several well adapted varieties for each of the Texas producing areas—North, Central and South Texas. For the North Texas area, that part of the state north of a line running from Brownfield through Fort Worth to Marshall, he recommends Southwestern Common, or Buffalo, Cody or Lahontan where bacterial blight is a problem or Cody or Lahontan for sections where the spotted alfalfa aphid causes trouble.

Cotton root rot is one of the most common plant diseases in Texas.

Haws points out that about 80 percent of the wild and cultivated plants are susceptible in varying degrees to the disease. The fungus may live in some native trees and shrubs without killing them, he adds.

Small flowers, shrubs and trees die suddenly after the first wilting symptoms appear. Large shrubs and trees may die more slowly. Haws says the bark of affected roots is decayed and brownish. Woolly, buff or brownish, fungal strands are present on the surface of the damaged roots.

The whole root system decays, he adds. Bark is rotted off the harder wood of the root, and root slips out of the soil with comparatively little pulling effort. Under moist conditions, with or without affected plants, spore mats sometimes appear on the soil surface. These mats are two to 12 inches in diameter, at first snowwhite and cottony; later they appear tan and powdery.

Cotton root rot fungus generally invades new areas by con-

tinued slow growth through the soil from plant to plant. It may live in the soil for many years. The disease is often found as deep in the soil as roots penetrate, says Haws.

The disease is controlled by the growing of resistant or immune trees and shrubs. Certain cultural practices may also help in checking its occurrence.

Land prices are being determined more and more by non-farm uses, such as recreation, rural home sites, hobby or part

time farming, investment and speculation, according to B. T. Haws, county agent. He says that the price of land can be expected to go even higher with the urban buyer competing strongly with the farmer.

Farm Facts

The U. S. Department of Agriculture points out that farm real estate taxes were three times higher in 1960 than they were in 1942. In fact, the rise in these taxes in the United States (not including Alaska and Hawaii) has been uninterrupted in the past 18 years.

Because the acreage of farmland in private ownership has changed little since 1942, taxes per acre have increased in the same proportion as total farm real estate taxes.

Farm real estate taxes in the 48 states totaled \$1,284 million in 1960. This was 8% more than the total for 1959. They increased in every state except Delaware, where they remained the same as in 1959.

Since 1945, increases in farm real estate taxes have averaged 7% a year. The USDA attributes this rise to the sharply increased cost of local government, largely financed in rural areas by the property tax. Local government costs jumped fourfold from 1946 to 1959.



Farm real estate taxes have tripled since 1942.

The depression and war years left local governments with a backlog of capital requirements and faced with higher prices for things to meet these needs. Population growth and demands for more services added to the problem.

News From The HD Agent

Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program are hopeful that a recent absence of screwworm cases reported in certain counties within the sterile fly release area reflects the effectiveness of the program.

In early July all counties within the sterile fly release area, which includes over 60 counties in southern Texas, reported some screwworm cases. Since that time, the number of counties in the release area reporting no screwworms has increased to more than 20 counties in the beginning of September.

Officials are hesitant to give

complete credit to fly release since that period of hot weather usually results in fewer screwworm cases anyway, but they are watching the situation very closely to see if it does represent a definite trend.

The eradication program entails the production and sterilization of screwworm flies at the plant near Mission, Texas, and their release over infested areas. The sterile male flies mating with naturally-occurring females results in infertile eggs.

Zone 4 residents of the State's 182 soil conservation districts have an election date to keep on October 2. B. T. Haws, county agent, says the election is very important and he urges all eligible voters to cast their ballot.

Zone 4 voters in Wilbarger-Wichita soil conservation dis-

trict will elect a farmer or ranchman who will serve as their supervisor and representative on the Soil Conservation Board for the next five years. Time and place for the October 2 balloting is Punkin Center Community House beginning at 7:30 p. m., says Haws.

A Valuable Trick to Know

A good woodsman, when he is turned around in the wide open spaces, can always find his directions by using his watch, providing the sun is shining. All he has to do is to point the hour hand at the sun, then halfway between this hand and twelve o'clock on the dial will be due south.

But when the day is cloudy, and no sun is to be seen, it is a different matter. Yet the watch may be made to serve as a compass even on cloudy days. If the tip of a knife blade, or a pencil point is set upright on the thumbnail on a sunless day, the sun will still cast a faint shadow. By noting the direction of the shadow, you can point the hour hand of the watch toward the sun, and thus get your bearings.

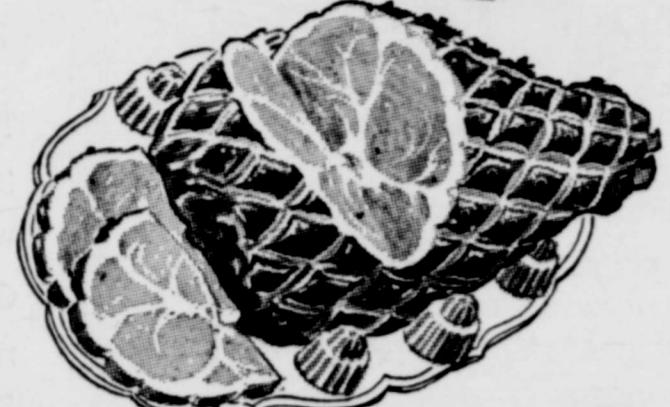
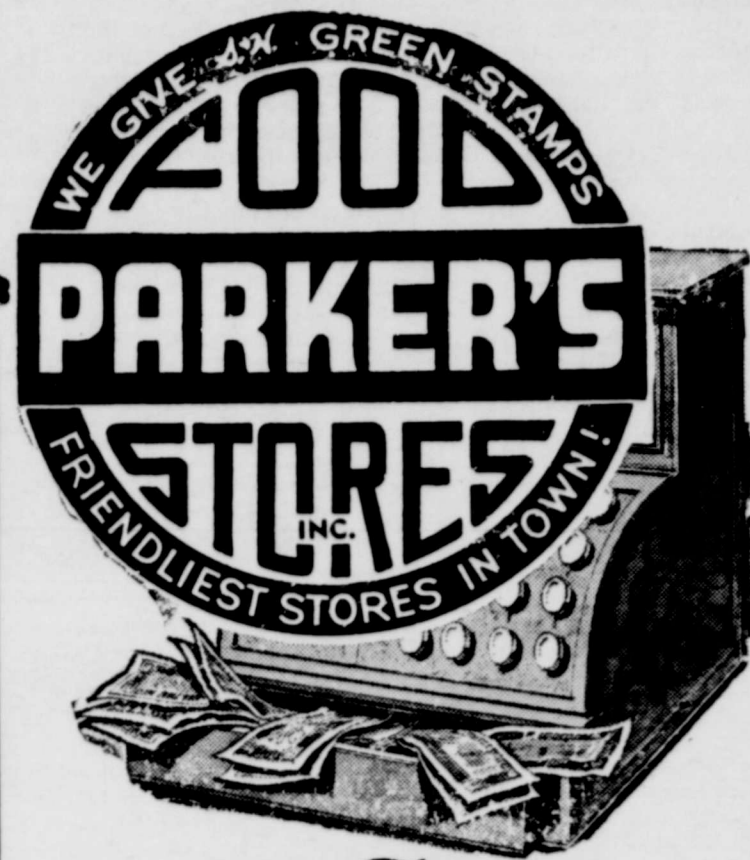

News From The HD Agent

Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program are hopeful that a recent absence of screwworm cases reported in certain counties within the sterile fly release area reflects the effectiveness of the program.

In early July all counties within the sterile fly release area, which includes over 60 counties in southern Texas, reported some screwworm cases. Since that time, the number of counties in the release area reporting no screwworms has increased to more than 20 counties in the beginning of September.

Officials are hesitant to give

complete credit to fly release since that period of hot weather usually results in fewer screwworm cases anyway, but they are watching the situation very closely to see if it does represent a definite trend.

The eradication program entails the production and sterilization of screwworm flies at the plant near Mission, Texas, and their release over infested areas. The sterile male flies mating with naturally-occurring females results in infertile eggs.

Zone 4 residents of the State's 182 soil conservation districts have an election date to keep on October 2. B. T. Haws, county agent, says the election is very important and he urges all eligible voters to cast their ballot.

Zone 4 voters in Wilbarger-Wichita soil conservation dis-

trict will elect a farmer or ranchman who will serve as their supervisor and representative on the Soil Conservation Board for the next five years. Time and place for the October 2 balloting is Punkin Center Community House beginning at 7:30 p. m., says Haws.

A Valuable Trick to Know

A good woodsman, when he is turned around in the wide open spaces, can always find his directions by using his watch, providing the sun is shining. All he has to do is to point the hour hand at the sun, then half-way between this hand and twelve o'clock on the dial will be due south.

But when the day is cloudy, and no sun is to be seen, it is a different matter. Yet, the watch may be made to serve as a compass even on cloudy days. If the tip of a knife blade, or a pencil point is set upright on the thumbnail on a sunless day, the sun will still cast a faint shadow. By noting the direction of the shadow, you can point the hour hand of the watch toward the sun, and thus get your bearings.

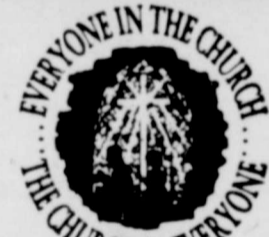

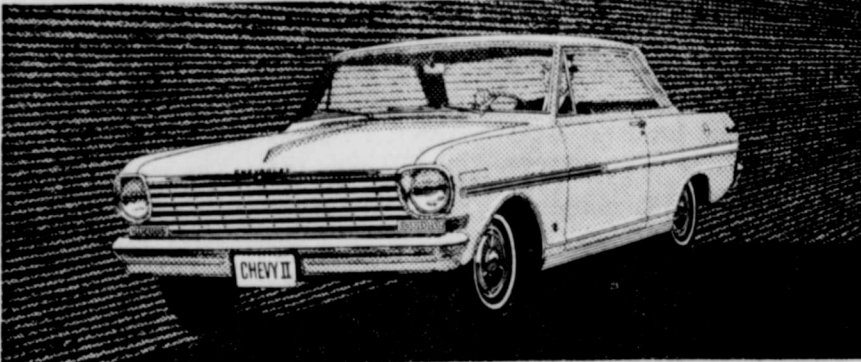

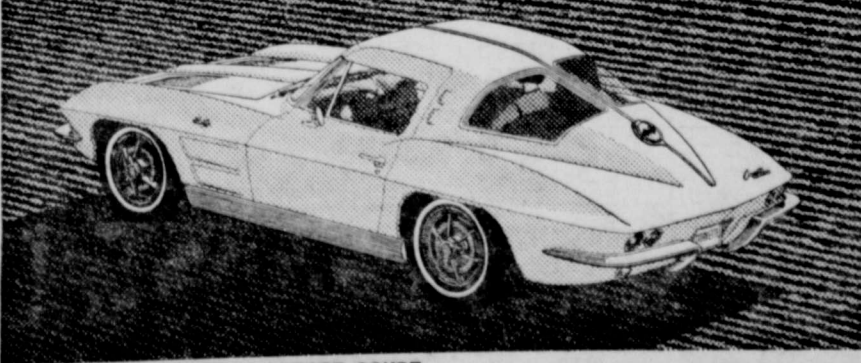
