Born April 21, 1914, in McKinney, she attended Memphis, Texas high school and later received her B. A. degree from Hardin-Simmons University, graduating Magna Cum Laude.

She married C. W. Wesbrooks October 15, 1939. He is a resident engineer for the Texas Highway Department.

During World War II, she taught home economics at H-SU and received her M. A. degree from there in 1949. She had worked with various charitable organizations including the Red Cross, Abilene State School, Cancer Drive, West Texas Rehabilitation Center, Christian Church Mission and spent much time working in and for Brook Hollow Christian Church.

Survivors include her husband; mother; three brothers, one sister, four nephews and one niece. Mrs. Wesbrooks was the daughter-in-law of the late Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Wesbrooks, pioneer residents of Burkburnett.

Sheppard-Burk Bank Day Started Wed., Oct. 10th

Bank Day at Sheppard-Burkburnett School located in Capehart at Sheppard Air Force Base, held the first student bank day Wednesday, October 10. This was announced by Mr. A. E. Brown, principal. On Wednesday students from the 4th grade through high school became eligible to participate in a Students Savings Plan within their own school.

This plan allows the students to deposit funds at his home room class to the school banker, who in turn accounts for these deposits in the students pass book. The deposits are then forwarded to the First National Bank of Burkburnett, Texas and credited to the students regular savings accounts. These accounts bear interest at the current rate.

The people put up every dollar that is returned to them by government through welfare state charity. And they pay not only in money but in the infinitely more important coin of lost liberty.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

By a majority of 88%, the nation's independent business and professional people, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have approved a resolution introduced into the House of Representatives by Rep. Herlong calling for a constitutional amendment to place a limit on social security taxes.



While many expressed dislike for the limits proposed in the Herlong resolution, it was C. W. Harder felt that unless there is speedily enacted some safeguard, the socialist schemers within the present ranks of American bureaucrats could push social security taxes up to a level almost equal income taxes.

The Herlong proposal would make it impossible to raise the employer-employee tax to more than 10% and 7 1/2% for the self-employed.

As it stands now, the social security tax which started very small, has grown like Topsy until today it is up to 6 3/4% and will hit 9 3/4% by 1969.

Without a constitutional amendment limiting amount bureaucrats can tap the nation's payrolls, there is no estimating where it could stop.

As it stands now, there is nothing to prevent hiking social security taxes to provide free beer, free vacations, free wigs, or anything free.

Some of these items may sound ridiculous, yet are they? Many union contracts now provide vacation expenses for the worker, others provide the employee with a day off with full pay on his or her birthday, others provide for free psychiatric care, thus it becomes difficult to establish any point at which matters become too ridiculous for consideration.

The income tax started as a modest little affair fifty years ago, has now become one of the most dominant factors in all economic and business planning.

There seems but little doubt that if years ago there had been enacted a maximum income tax rate, American nation would be in different position today.

But it is doubtful that anyone ever dreamed that American wealth would be siphoned off by the income tax to throw almost 100 billion dollars around in global give away programs. Neither was it perhaps even wildly dreamed that Americans would be taxed to pick up travel tab around the world of Dixieland jazz bands.

Thus, it is quite logical to stop social security tax increases now.

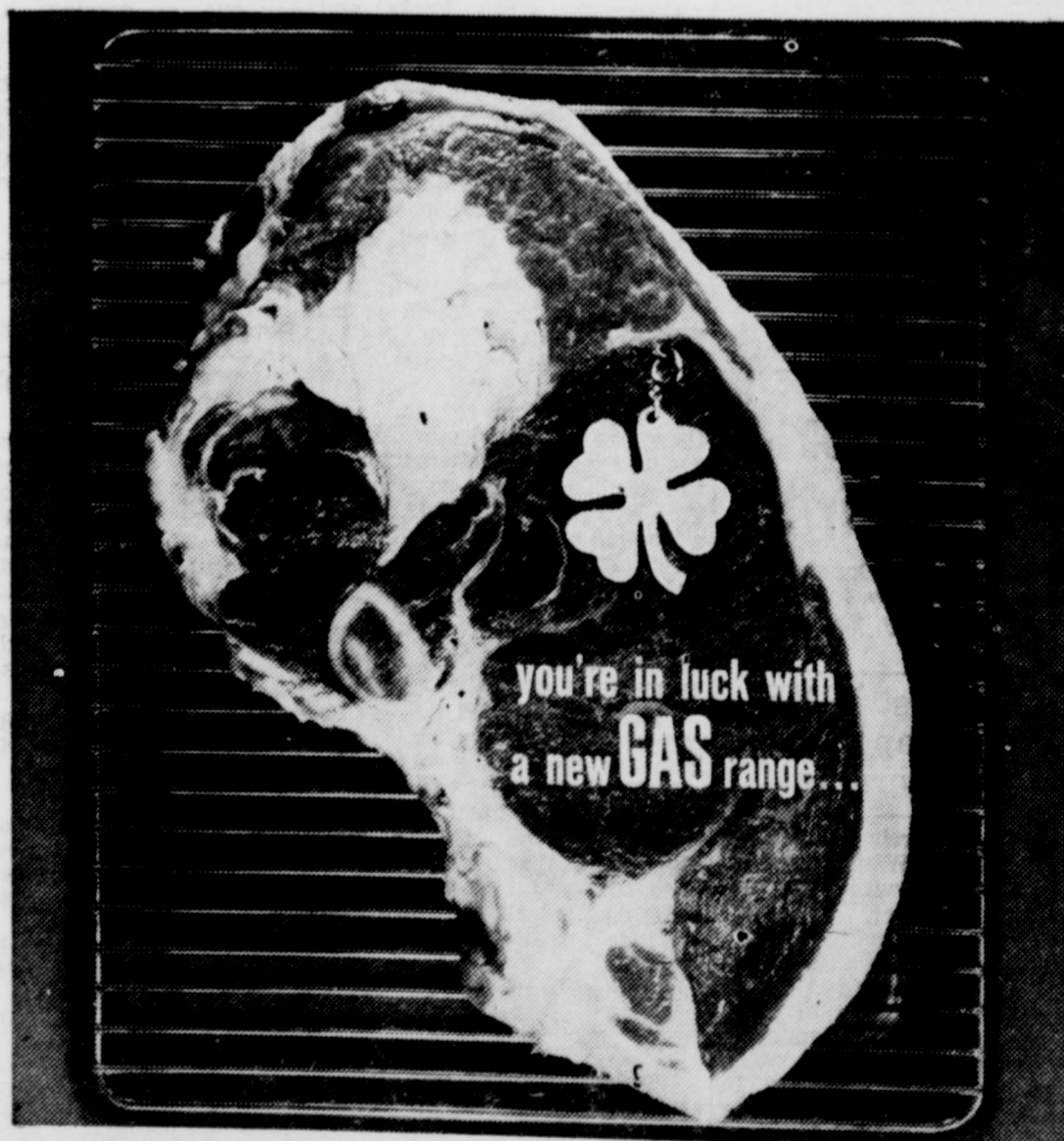

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. I read that life insurance companies are now basing their policies on a new mortality table which reflects a lower death rate. Does this mean I am being overcharged for my old life insurance policy, which was issued prior to the new table?

A. No. The Commissioners 1958 Standard Ordinary mortality table is based on the death rate of all ordinary life insurance policyholders from 1950 to 1954. This table is used mainly to calculate the minimum reserves that life insurance companies must maintain and the cash values of policies currently being issued. But premiums charged by each company are based on its actual mortality experience with its own policyholders, rather than on a standard table, and are periodically revised to reflect changes in the policyholders' death rate. The premium rate for your policy is based on the latest revision by your company at the time you took out your policy.



Q. I have a life insurance policy on which my premiums have been paid-up for many years. Recently I learned the company that issued it is no longer in business. Does this mean my policy is no longer any good?

A. Unless your policy has lapsed or expired, it should still provide you or your beneficiaries with the benefits it stipulates. For sound business reasons, life insurance companies—like other business firms—occasionally change their names or merge or are bought out by other companies. Such a step may result in the disappearance of a company's name, but virtually never, in a loss to policyholders. The policyholders' rights are "reinsured" by the surviving company, even though it may have a different name. In such cases, every reasonable effort is made to notify policyholders. But—especially if they are no longer paying premiums—some may not receive the information.

If your life insurance agent cannot tell you what company is now insuring you, you can probably find out by writing to the Institute of Life Insurance, 588 Madison Avenue, New York 22, N. Y. Include the full name and address of your original company as shown on your policy, and the year the policy was issued.

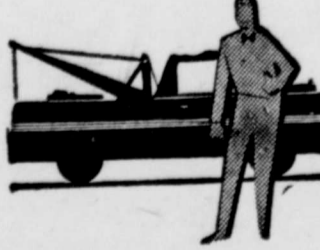

Farm Facts



The 1959 Census of Agriculture reported that there were 3,704,000 farms in the United States. This is the smallest number (for the 48 states) of any census since 1870.

There were 1,079,000 fewer farms in 1959 than in 1954. About 232,000 were no longer counted as farms because of a change in census definitions.

To be considered a farm, a place must have a minimum of 10 acres of productive land as compared with a minimum of 3 acres under the old definition. If it has less than 10 acres, sales of agricultural products must add up to at least \$250 annually.

Even without a change in the definition of a farm, changes in farm size and number were great between 1954 and 1959.

Total farm acreage dropped from 1,158 million in 1954 to 1,120 million in 1959. The average size of farms increased from 242 to 302 acres.

Results of the 1959 census are evidence of a further concentration and specialization of agriculture in the United States.

There was a 30% drop in the

number of farms selling less than \$2,500 worth of products and a 36% rise in the number selling \$10,000 worth of products or more.

In 1959, there were 134,000 farms of 1,000 acres or more. This compares with 63,000 in 1925.

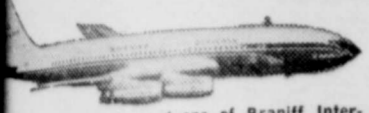

College Tax Illegal?—Texas Supreme Court action is expected soon on a case which could upset the junior college set-up in Texas.

Taxpayers' suit from Harris County contends that the Legislature had no constitutional authority to allow the levying of taxes by junior college districts.

Supreme Court has been studying the case since April. Shoulton it agree with the taxpayers, it would take a constitutional amendment to legalize the college districts. Meanwhile state money might be needed to keep the 32 junior colleges going until the voters have a say on the subject.

Old Badges—Texas Rangers have gone back to the old days and old ways.

Old time Rangers carved their own badges out of Mexican pesos. It was a star within a circle.

A fancy new style badge was adopted in 1936 when Rangers were put under the Department of Public Safety.

Now they are going back to the old type badge. But they won't carve their own. All 62 Rangers were issued shiny new ones, ready made.

Slow Picking—Texas Department of Agriculture reports a slow down in cotton picking. Harvest slowed to 29 per cent, which is the same as this time last year.

Damp weather kept bolls from opening in the South Plains and rains slowed the picking in other areas.

Wet fields also have slowed the sorghum harvest.

Summer Reading—Nearly 21,000 school age children in 285 cities earned certificates from the Texas State Library for summer reading.

Boys and girls who read 12 books during the summer got the awards.

Study Committee—A citizen's advisory committee has been named to help the Texas Legislative Council study the problems of emotionally disturbed children. Rep. C. W. Pearcy, Jr. of Temple is chairman.

The study committee was set up after experts advised that Texas has few facilities for curing such disorders.

Governor Names—Governor Daniel named Mack Wallace of Athens as district attorney, to replace Jack Hardee of Athens, who resigned because he is the Democratic nominee for district judge. District is composed of Henderson, Anderson and Houston Counties.

He also named Boyd Hilley of Lamesa to the Egg Marketing Advisory Board, and reappointed Jack Dubose of Gonzales and Marvin Gilbreath of Weimar on that board.

B. H. Dewey of Bryan and Rep. George Hinson of Mineola were named to the Southern Education Board.

Ballot Roster—Secretary of State Frank Lake has certified 24 candidates for statewide office.

Names appearing on the November 6 general election ballot will include 14 Democratic nominees, eight Republican and two from the Constitution Party.

In addition, the fate of 14 proposed constitutional amendments will be decided by the voters.

Two Withdraw—Two Constitution party candidates have notified the Secretary of State to withdraw their names from the November election.

They are Ruben Lozano of San Antonio, candidate for Congressman-at-large and Roy R. Brown of Bonham, candidate for Lieutenant Governor.

Jobs on Rise—Figures released in Austin by the U. S. Department of Labor show the Texas employment picture to be twice as good as the national average.

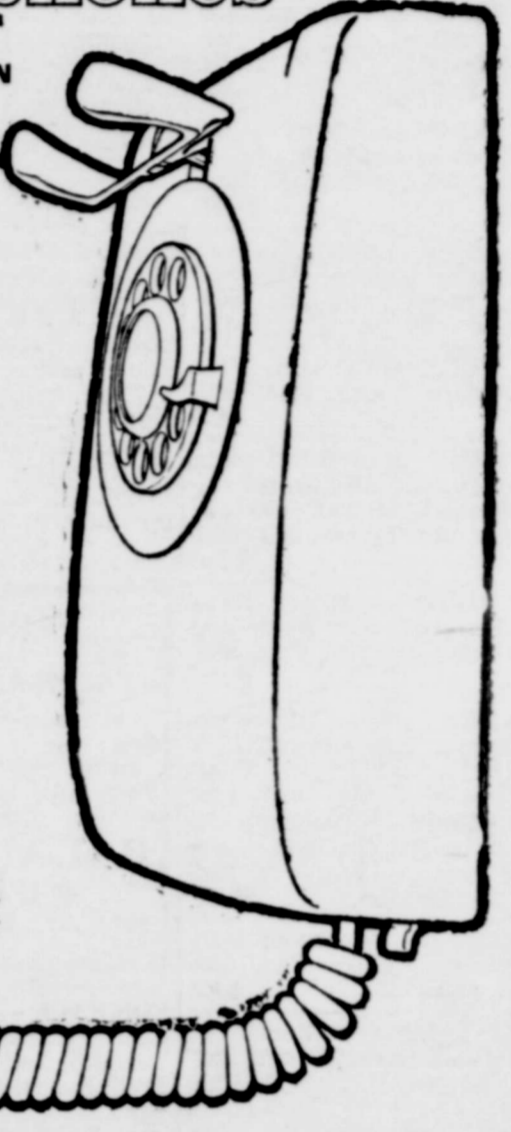
