

DEAD FOR THIS YEAR

Effort to reduce the percentage depletion rate for oil and gas wells died for this year. That happened when the Senate voted "No" on two amendments to a revenue bill which would have cut the long standing 271/2 percent rate by varying amounts.

But the issue will arise again next year. And, undoubtedly, it will be given particular attention and debate when the promised tax reform bill comes before congress.

The reasons for percentage depletion-which amounts to a credit against federal income taxes-are as compelling as they are simple. For one thing, an oil or gas well is a wasting asset—the best of wells become exhausted in time. For another, wildcatting and searching for new age depletion applies only to oil production-not to refining, transporting, or other industry activities.

Moreover, the cost of drilling has soared in recent years-partly due to higher wage and equipment costs, and partly due to the fact that drillers must go deeper and deeper into the earth. The known shallow deposits ican business to get on its feet again." have all been developed.

Policybolder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. What do life insurance companies mean by "life expec-

A. It means the average number of years that anyone at a particular age can be expected to live. All life insurance policy reserves and premiums are based on life expectancy tables devel-



pped over the years on the basis of life companies' experience with many policyholders. However, an individual policyholder may live many years longer or die many years sooner than is indicated by these tables.

Q. I have a \$15,000 straight life insurance policy and \$25,000 in separate term insurance policies, all taken out with the same life company. I am now 35 years old. Last year, I had to borrow all I could on my straight life policy. I probably won't be able to repay that loan for many years. Someone suggested that I drop all these policies and take out a new "package plan" which would give me as much straight life and term insurance as I now have, plus some term insurance on my wife and children, who now have none at all. Should I make the change?

A. It is seldom a good idea to give up an existing life insurance policy in order to take out a new one. One disadvantage is that any new policy would be at a higher premium rate because you are now several years older. Also your bealth may have deteriorated so that you could no longer get insurance at standard rates. However, because almost twothirds of your present protection is term insurance and even your permanent insurance is heavily encumbered with debt, your case might possibly be an exception to the rule. There might be some merit in your making a change to the type of package plan you describe. But you should talk it over with the agent and company from whom you bought your orig-'nal policies. Your present compan; migat be willing to exchange your policies for a new debt-free "package pian" that would be to your advantage. Also, before aropping any policies, you should new insurance at standard rates.





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

keep your flower arrangements fresh and prolong their beauty. Keep them away from drafts, direct sunshine, and hot radiators, or from air conditioners in sum-mer. At night let them rest in a cool dark place.

Gardeners should keep in mind that Fall is the best time to set out lupines (in a sunny location) and raspberry plants (cultivate the soil well to eliminate weeds beforehand). It's also the season to dig up and divide large clumps of perennial phlox for replanting in a sunny place.

Picnickers can enjoy the meal better when the tablecloth doesn't flap in the wind. To stop the flap, make a pocket on each underside corner and fill them with small stones. Sew similar pockets in the front of the cloth to hold napkins.

Muddy shoes can be cleaned off before they get inside the house with this simple device: fasten upside down a large size, tough bristled scrubbing brush to the floor of the back porch.

Those open toed sandals and shoes are messy to polish, aren't they? They needn't be, though, if you slip your hand into a plastic bag and insert it into the shoe. Excess polish gets onto the bag. not your hand.




