BETTER SENSE

"A farmer's best hope for good prices is to keep production in line with demand, not to retain high production and then attempt to plug up the outlet to market," says the Portland Oregonian. "In the long run, the law of supply and demand cannot be violated. The federal government's farm program has proved that."

This sound observation was inspired by the recent effort of a comparatively new farm organization to persuade producers to boycott the livestock markets. The organization's main purpose is to force packers to sign contracts guaranteeing high livestock prices, regardless of the state of the market. Additionally, the contracts would provide for a "check off" system, whereby both producers and packers would be forced to pay what amounted to dues to the farm organization. The cost to the consumer would be staggering.

The packers, needless to say, have refused to sign, and there is small likelihood that they will change their minds. Such contracts would probably be illegal, and gravely so. Legalisms aside, the end result of this effort, if it proved successful with crop after crop, would be a monopoly of the nation's food supply. No nation can afford that.

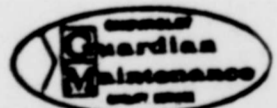

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

As of the start of the fall season, the U.S. government, or in other words, the taxpayers, had tied up in surplus dairy products, i.e., butter, cheese, and dried milk, a little over a third of a billion dollars. In butter alone, there is now piled up some 400,000,000 pounds, and there is only storage space available for 100 million pounds more.



This surplus of storage, and does not take into account the free money C. W. Harder products the government gives away. With these costs added, the dairy industry is costing the taxpayers about two-thirds of a billion dollars per year. In the meantime, income to nation's 400,000 dairy farmers has dropped.

It would appear the big problem is that few of the country's dairy cows have ever attended Harvard, thus, have little conception of the principles of a government rigged economy.

In March of 1961, the supplies of surplus dairy products had dropped substantially. So for reasons quite unknown the government raised the support prices from \$3.22 per hundredweight to \$3.40. This encouraged greater production of milk, and at the same time raised the cost to the consumer so that milk sales declined.

A year later, or early in 1962, the government dropped the support price down to \$3.11 per cwt., but much to the surprise of the bureaucrats, production did not diminish. This was perhaps due to the fact that milk

cows largely neglect to read government edicts.

Perhaps some of the Potomac bureaucrats are now preparing a white paper charging milk cows with having leanings toward Moscow for not cooperating. But the sad fact is that with the government upping the support price in 1961, more heifer calves were started on the road to a career of milk production.

Now once a young cow is started on a lifetime career of milk production, she's going to produce more and more until reaching retirement age. In fact, even the most docile cow willing to go along with whatever bureaucratic nonsense that emanates from Washington, is just plain unable to turn off the spigots.

In the meantime, the system of rigging consumer prices on fluid milk plus the government assuring the processors both a price level and an outlet for manufactured milk products, has built three large dairy processing and marketing combines into a virtual monopoly.

In the past ten years, over 20,000 independent milk distributors have been driven out of business, unable to find outlets for their product. Either through direct ownership, or financial control, milk monopoly is able to dictate in many stores whose milk will be sold, or not sold.

Thus, competition in the marketing of dairy products has been practically eliminated. But if the consumer refuses, as is being done at present, to pay the monopoly set prices, the consumer still pays in the form of taxes. In any place other than Washington, this would be termed ridiculous.

THANKSGIVING

The Pilgrims were joining some strange company when they declared a Thanksgiving celebration in 1662. For the practice of giving thanks for a plentiful harvest goes back almost to the time when man first gave up wandering and hitched himself to a plow.

Along the Mediterranean, ancient peoples held festivals at harvest time in honor of a mother goddess. The Semites called her Astarte, while the Phrygians named her Semele.

The Romans honored Ceres, the goddess of agriculture, in a celebration called the Cerealia, reports World Book Encyclopedia. And the Greeks paid tribute to Demeter in secret rites called the Elusinian Mysteries.

Christianity put an end to many of these festivals, but a pagan-inspired belief in the Corn Mother, or the Mother of Grains, survived among some peasants in the British Isles and Europe. Her spirit was thought to live in the last sheaf of grain left standing in the field.

In northern England, the last handful of corn was the "kern", and sometimes it was fashioned into a "kern doll." In Austria it was shaped into a wreath and placed on the head of a girl who became the harvest queen.

During the Middle Ages the most common thanksgiving and harvest festival was held on the Feast of Saint Martin of Tours, or Martinmas, on Nov. 11th. People throughout Europe still celebrate the day with feasts and new wine.

The Pilgrims probably became familiar with celebration when they went to Holland to escape persecution in England, and it may have been the remembrance of this holiday that inspired them to hold a thanksgiving feast after their first prosperous year in the New World.
