Joseph J. Davey of Burk Burnett Named "Young Texan of Month"



YOUNG TEXAN FOR DECEMBER—Notre Dame freshman Joseph J. Davey of Burk Burnett has been named "Young Texan of the Month" for December by the over 200 Texas Optimist Clubs and the Troy V. Post Foundation. His exceptional high school scholastic record brought Davey three scholarships to state schools and a West Point appointment. He chose, however, to enter Notre Dame as a pre-medical student. As a result of his selection as "Young Texan of the Month," Davey will receive the Troy V. Post Award, the state's highest youth recognition honor. Davey was chosen from hundreds of nominees from across the state by a panel of notable Texans headed by Governor Price Daniel.

A Burk Burnett native, Joseph J. Davey, has been named "Young Texan of the Month" for December and recipient of the Troy V. Post Award. This youth recognition honor, the state's highest, is presented by the over 200 Optimist Clubs in the state in conjunction with the Troy V. Post Foundation. Davey, son of Dr. and Mrs. J. A. Davey, 601 Meadow Drive, Burk Burnett, is a freshman at Notre Dame University. He is enrolled as a pre-medical student, having declined an appointment to West Point. The Troy V. Post Award... a walnut and bronze plaque, wrist watch and sterling silver key chain with medallion... will be presented to Davey at a special program by members of the nominating Optimist Club. As valedictorian of the '62 senior class at Burk Burnett High School, Davey culminated an outstanding public school record of scholastic achievement. He averaged "A" for his entire four years in high school, winning awards in English, general science, Spanish, algebra and chemistry. Davey served as class president his senior year and was chosen "Most Likely to Succeed" by his classmates. He was awarded three scholarships with in the state as well as an appointment to West Point. He has received several awards in both church and Scout activities. He is an Eagle Scout, holder of a Bronze Palm, and officer of the Order of the Arrow. During high school, Davey participated in track, basketball and football, lettering in football his senior year. He hopes to box in the Bengal Bouts next March at Notre Dame. As monthly winner in the Young Texan program, Davey becomes eligible to win one of three scholarships... one for \$2,000 and two for \$1,000... to be presented at the annual awards banquet. In addition to the scholarship, the yearly winner and his father will receive an expense-paid, one-week trip to Washington, D. C. Other Young Texans chosen in the six-month-old program include Robert J. Caswell, 18, Dickinson; David R. Underdown, 17, Athens; Sammy Schult, 17, Gainesville; Russell Wilkinson, 18, Lubbock; Mike McCollum, 18, and George Little, Jr., 18, both of Dallas. McCollum and Little tied as representative chosen from the Dallas County "Teen-Ager of the Month" program... fore-runner of the Young Texan program. The Young Texan program was established to bring favorable and positive public attention to deserving young men of the state. It is underwritten by Troy V. Post, Dallas banking, investment and insurance executive who has had a long-standing interest in youth and their development into outstanding adult leaders. Nominations for the monthly Young Texan Program are originated by Texas Optimist Club members or from any member of the general public submitting a nomination through his local community's Optimist Club. Preliminary screening of nominations is conducted by Optimist members in each Optimist district of the state, and each monthly "Young Texan" is selected from district finalists by a panel of twelve outstanding Texas civic, business and religious leaders headed by Governor Price Daniel.



Academy Grants Fellowships

A Burk Burnett area dentist will be among a group of twenty-four men from throughout the nation to be honored by the title of "Fellow" of the Academy of General Dentistry, at a convocation to be held in the Conrad Hilton Hotel, Chicago, Illinois on February 2, 1963. The Academy is an international organization with headquarters in Chicago. It is dedicated to the principle that a professional man has no right to be other than a continuous student, and therefore should constantly keep up with new trends and methods of practice. Besides the annual school attendance, preparation for fellowship requires an additional 500 hours of academic study plus significant contribution to dental education or organization. The candidate to receive this distinction is Dr. Carl J. Morrison.

Burk Water Dept. Employee Receives Water Citation

An official State Health Department citation was awarded this week to Donald Cantrell, operations specialist with the Burk Burnett Municipal Water Department, for proficiency in water plant management. The impressively designed certificate of competency, signed by the state commissioner of health and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, credit recipients with having demonstrated "skill and knowledge" of water treatment plant management and an understanding of the public health importance of the work. Under the State Health Department's operator certification program, operators are carefully examined on their technical ability and on their knowledge of their works influence on community health. Each must pass a stiff written test to qualify for certification.

Lank Bank Cuts Interest Cost To Borrowers

The Federal Land Bank of Houston has announced that effective on January 1, 1963, it will reduce temporarily to 5% the interest rate on all outstanding loans which presently bear a rate in excess of 5%. The contract rate on new loans will continue to be 5 1/2% but interest on loans closed on and after December 1, 1962, will be billed temporarily at 5% until further notice by the bank. In making the announcement, Hal Weatherford, President of the bank, said that of its \$200 million of loans outstanding more than \$100 million bear contract rates in excess of 5% and that the savings to Texas farmers and ranchers by this action will be more than a half million dollars in the year 1963 alone. Weatherford said this is the fourth time the bank has voluntarily reduced the interest on its outstanding loans. The Houston bank makes long-term farm and ranch loans through 73 Federal Land Bank Associations located throughout Texas. The one serving this area is the Federal Land Bank of Wichita Falls, Paul H. Zink, is the manager and the other officers and directors are: T. J. Pace, President, Iowa Park; L. W. Young, Vice President, Saint Jo; E. E. Turner, Jacksboro; F. J. Schroeder, Windthorst; J. T. Lyles, Henrietta; and Floyd Garner, Wichita Falls.

Double Talk From On High

A vast and dismaying amount of what may fairly be called double talk is coming out of Washington these days.

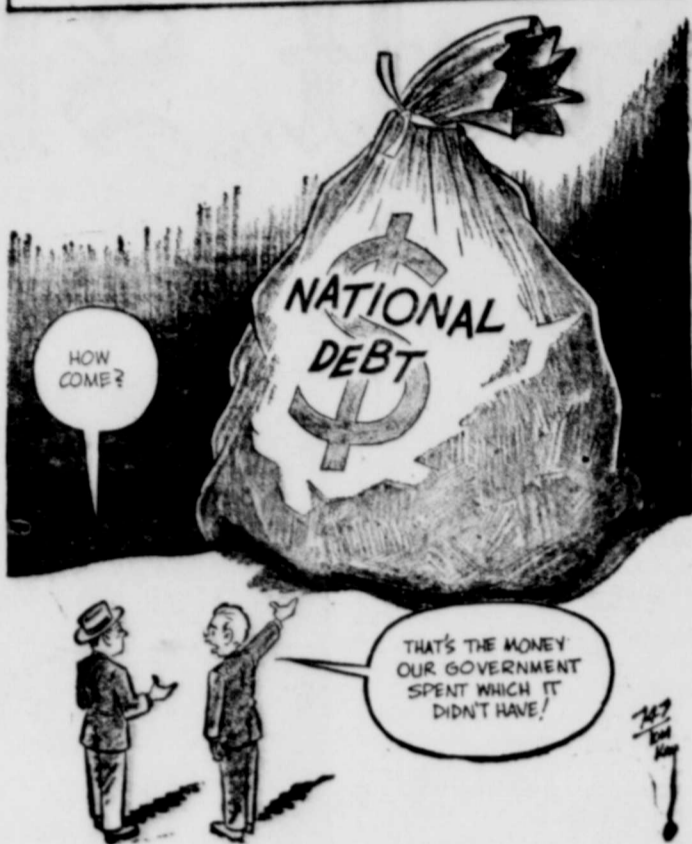
We are told that we must have reductions in individual and corporate income taxes, running to \$5 billion or more a year, in order to spur sluggish economy, and to guard against the possibility of a real recession in the comparatively near future. Lip service is paid to reducing or eliminating the annual multi-billion dollar deficits.

We are told, at the same time, that the Federal government must assume the responsibility for dealing with more and more of our problems, ranging from those of the states and cities to the family, by creating new bureaus and appropriating funds to pay for them. The list here is a long one, including the medicare scheme, more socialized federal electric power development, a federal agency to deal with urban difficulties, a farm bill of incredible complexity and unknown cost, more federal unemployment benefits to be paid over longer periods of time, federal ownership of space communications, and so on and so on.

Some of these proposals have been, for the moment at least, refused by Congress, and some are yet to be acted on. Some are Administration backed, some have other advocates. But all are seriously advocated and all, whether temporarily defeated or not, will remain in the political arena. And all call for more federal spending, some on a massive scale.

Well, one thing is certainly true. We can have tax reduction and more federal spending, at one and the same time. We can do it by ignoring the deficits, by, sooner or later, turning the Treasury's printing presses loose — and bringing on a dollar-destroying inflation that will make past inflations look trivial by comparison.

ORDINANCE NO. 264

An Ordinance prohibiting trespassing on real estate within the city limits of Burkburnett, Texas; prescribing a penalty, and declaring an emergency.

Section 3. The fact that trespassing within the corporate limits of the City of Burkburnett, jeopardizes the peace and health of the citizens of said City, creates an emergency, and this ordinance is hereby declared an emergency measure on the grounds of urgent public need for the preservation of peace, health and safety of property; and the rule requiring the reading of ordinances on three several days is hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and approval, and after same has been published.
