ments" for these pesky foot lesion which someone characterized as "creations of the devil." Some doctors apply chemicals to the wart while others grind out the warty tissue with a high speed burr. Surgical removal is some times necessary when everythin else fails. No one method seen to work in all patients but this need not discourage you from seeing a physician. Plantar war can be cured . . . though it take time and patience.

Acceptance of Patients Q. Is a doctor required to accept anyone who presents himself for treatment?

A. A physician is free to accept or reject any person as a patient. He should not be required to perform in instances wherein he feels that he can not do what's best for the patient. However, once the physician accepts a person as a patient, he is legally responsible for his care. The doctor can, of course, withdraw from case at any time after giving the patient adequate notice.
