





Yellow traffic markings, says the Vision Conservation Institute of Philadelphia, are 35 to 50% more visible than white markings.

The nation's largest fleet of refuse collection trucks, oper-ated by New York City's Department of Sanitation, are painted "golden yellow." Acording to a department official, yellow makes the 1,300 vehicles easier to see "and scrub."

The color yellow, it appears,



is having a day in the sun. As a housewife - an average one, I'd like to think I'm particularly interested in Gotham's collection trucks. Further, the whole problem of waste disposal in a city the size of New York might interest women whose husbands are often too busy to take out the trash.

Imagine, if you will, the problems of a department catering to New York's eight million people.

Department officials claim

they carry one million loads of trash a year, or over two and one-half million tons. Commissioner Frank J. Lucia, a strict believer in the cleanliness-begins-at-home school of thought, introduced "golden yellow" trucks less

than a year ago. He took the step for practical reasons. Far easier to see and avoid than grey vehicles in winter months, the trucks also attract attention to New York City's never end-

ing anti-litter campaigns. I'm not suggesting that you can make your husband more receptive to wrestling with refuse by painting the station wagor yellow. Certainly, that might be going too far.

However, perhaps a coat of yellow paint on the trast cans will accomplish the same thing. It's just a thought.





Policybolder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. I am thinking of adding \$10,000 life insurance to my family program. How much should this

A. Only you can answer that, because it depends on what kind of policy you buy and your age. For a \$10,000 contract, you can pay from \$50 to \$500, or even more. Age alone accounts for a large part of the difference. Type of policy is another important factor. The lowest rate would be for a term policy at a young age, the higher rate for an endowment policy at a more advanced age. And there would even be some difference in initial premium from company to company, though the long term over-all cost comes out pretty much the same. You need to consult your agent to make certain what kind of policy would be best for you, within range of what you can afford to pay.

Q. Could you explain why my life insurance policy has so many words in it and why it is in language beyond my understanding? I've counted and it has 7,000 words, mostly legal language.

A. Those words are in your policy in your own interest. Both the length and the legal nature result from the effort to meet all of the many legal requirements of the state laws and also set up a contract that can be fulfilled without question when claim payment is made, whether any parties to the contract are living or not.



You are buying the policy for the protection of your beneficiaries. History has shown that the contract language must be refined to the greatest possible degree, as it may not come up for interpretation for 50 or 60 years or more and then by persons knowing nothing about your present plans. For decades life company officials have searched for means of simplifying their policy contracts and shortening them, but the first objective is protection of the policyholder's and beneficiary's intereste

Considerable acreage of brush are controlled by mechanical means each year, states James Park of the Soil Conservation Service at Iowa Park.

Tree dozing lends itself well to areas where trees are of moderate height and can be spotted by the machine operator to prevent over-running. Dozing disturbs the vegetation in proportion to the size and thickness of tree stand, but usually leaves sufficient grass plants to revegetate disturbed areas within two or three years. Where the range is absent of better grass species dozing lends itself well to hand overseeding of disturbed areas to increase carrying capacity of the range. This method of control usually leaves the land in roughen condition for a number of years, but the roughened condition holds extra water and helps to control erosion.

Deep root plowing controls a high percentage of brush and lends itself well for placing land into a state of cultivation. But quite often this treatment destroys a high percentage of de-sirable range grasses, especially if work is performed during low moisture conditions.
