



Obstacles To Trade

What is one of the most serious obstacles to the growth of Free World trade?

Anthony F. Arpaia, former Chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission and now Vice President-International Services, REA Express, provides an answer. It is, he says, outdated, unnecessary and repetitious documentation requirements.

Ham is a year-round favorite in many homes, but it is espe-cially popular during the spring months. Its low cost per serving portion means good food value with budget savings.
