In the event that the Wheat Referendum carries the market price will be certain to level off at the feed wheat price of \$1.30 per bushel and the certificates to be issued by the Secretary of Agriculture will have a value of .70c per bushel. This added to the \$1.30 in the market place will give the producers the \$2.00 per bushel wheat as advocated by the Secretary of Agriculture for 80% of his allotment times the average yield. 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





will of course rise much more The utter immorality with which this scheme was sold to the American people may be seen from the following facts. If a worker had paid the maximum Social Security tax from 1937 when the program started and retired this month at age 65 with a wife the same age he and his employer would have paid in a total of \$3,168. If both husband and wife live their normal ex-pectancy and there are no more rises in benefits they will draw out a little more than 10 times the total amount paid in. Of course this deficit will have to come from somewhere and it means that younger workers now entering the scheme will have to pay more, much more, than they themselves may expect to draw out in benefits.

The case is even worse when we look at the facts for selfemployed persons. If one entered self-employed Social Security when the scheme was started in 1951 and paid the maximum each year he would have paid in a total of \$1,724. If he retires at age 65 this year and his wife is the same age and both live their normal expectancy they will draw out 18 and two-thirds times the total amount paid in.

It is the normal desire of parents to leave something for their children, but Social Security reverses that normal human stinct and levies upon children and grandchildren an enormous heavy burden of caring for the aging generation.

Social Security looked very attractive in the beginning, but like all other means of obtaining nething for nothing it proved to be a hollow mockery. What could be more immoral than the frightful spectacle of the older generations stealing from the

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
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
