Here's A Real Loophole

If you are a businessman, you have been figuring out your federal income tax under new rules that apply to your transportation, lodging, meals and entertainment costs. And remember, there is no exemption allowed for productive time lost in daily bookkeeping.

It doesn't set well with a hard-pressed private citizen when he reads of the loose manner in which Congressmen are permitted to list their expenses for travel on junkets around the world, for which tax money pays. Instead of an itemized statement they turn in a report that reads, for instance, lodging \$400, meals \$800, transportation \$500, miscellaneous \$300. No details are required about who, when or how they fed a guest, whether the cost for entertainment, transportation and lodging pertained to government business, etc.

Why shouldn't a Congressman be required to fill out in detail the same kind of an expense account as a private citizen, before he turns it in to the government for payment? After all it is public money he is spending and that seed bear fruit for their use. In more primitive times, that should be more carefully accounted for than personal income.

If the government is really trying to plug tax-loopholes, why not include the public officials who travel at taxpayer expense, as well as the private citizen who travel In hunting in rugged country precautions should be taken against getting lost. Throw a at their own or company expense? In other words, let government set a good example.

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. Is it necessary to have insur-

ance on your wife? A. A wife makes an important economic contribution to her family, regardless of whether she actually brings in any income. In rearing the children, caring for her husband and keeping up the home, she performs valuable services which would be difficult and expensive to replace if something should happen to her. For this reason, it is important to the family's welfare to have life insurance protection on the wife, Many insurance companies offer family plan policies which provide a base of permanent insurance on the father, plus term insurance on the wife and children. Many fam-



illes also buy permanent policies on the wife.

Q. Why do ordinary life insurance premiums differ among insurance companies?

A. Actually, premium rates among life insurance companies do not vary a great deal. The biggest difference arises from the fact that some policies are issued on a "participating" basis, while others are "non-participating." Premiums for "non-participating" policies run somewhat lower, but this difference is off-set by dividends which are paid to policyholders. Normally no dividends are paid on "non-participating" policies. But, since dividends are never guaranteed in advance, there is no way of knowing ahead of time which type of policy cost less.

Every company's premium rates are affected by death rates among its policyholders, earnings on its investments, and the company's operating expenses. These factors vary among companies. Premium rates are also affected

by seemingly minor differences in benefits provided under similar policies. For example, a policy that builds up cash values at a faster rate may require a slightly higher premium. But later on, the policyholder will have more cash value to provide himself with a retirement income or for some other important purpose.

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

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

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
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> Q. What exactly are "steroids" as used for arthritis and what are the damaging side effects?

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FARMER'S LUNG

Q. What is "farmer's lung?"

A. Farmer's lung is an acute inflammation of the lungs due to exposure to moldy farm due (hay, grain, tobacco, etc.). Characteristic symptoms are chills, fever, and shortness of break within a few hours after exposure to moldy dusts. There is no specific treatment. Worken who develop this condition should avoid further exposure to farm dusts.
