### Paying Twice For Postal Service

Basically, the Government operates the postal service for all the people as a giant monopoly financed by general taxation. But then, it insists also that postal revenues from mail rates shall balance postal costs.

Under this policy, both the amount of taxes going to support a public service postal system and the rates being charged mail users have gone only one way for many bears-up and ever up.

In fact, postal rates have now climbed so high that at is time to ask whether we aren't paying twice, once thru taxes, and again in stamp charges, for the same poor

First class stamps have gone from three to five cents in two steps since 1951; second and third class rates have increased more than 100 percent in the same period.

This insistence on higher postal rates, in addition to a larger flow of money from the general tax fund to the postal service, is a variance with Federal policy for other departments and agencies rendering important public services. ### **TORNADO** SAFETY RULES

To Know What to Do When a Tornado IS Approaching May Mean the Difference Between Life and Death

If you are near a tornado cellar:: When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVA-

If you are in open country: 1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.

2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat on the nearest depression such as ditch or ravine.

III If in a city or town: 1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly rein-

forced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS! 2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.

3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection. If in schools:

1. In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction ,stay inside, away from from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDI-TORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorlysupported roofs.

2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

If in factories and industrial plants: On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by runnning out into streets and by turning back into the path of the tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

VII Keep tuned to your radio or television for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.






