HOW MANY RUSSIANS LEFT No one really knows how many Russian soldiers, technicians, or officers still remain in Cuba. The estimates range from a low of about 2,000 to a high of 18,000. "defensive." These would be able to "blow up" areas in Flor-ida, but not any large Ameri-



Boys are fond of mistletoe be cause of its power to invite a kiss from a pretty girl. Bhds like mistletoe, too, for a different reason. The white-berried plant serves as winter food for mockingbirds, whins and waxwings. These small birds are responsible for the spread of the damaging parasite. After eating the berries, the birds clean their beaks on the trees, firmly planting the mistletoe seeds they do not eat.

The tap roots of the seedling pierces the tenderest portions of the tree — young branches or buds—and the tree sap is drawn into the thick leaves and transmeent berries of the guest plant.


