Most of us find it pretty tough to dip up enough dollars to pay our bills and taxes, but at least we are dealing with just one kind of money. It has been a depreciating kind these past 20 years and is not likely to improve. the looks of the projected federal budget and deficits. It may be a comfort to realize that things were worse in the old days when Americans had about ten thousand different kinds of paper money of varying and usually uncertain value. It's hard to believe that such a condition actually existed prior to February 25, 1863, when Abraham Lincoln signed the National Currency Act establishing our first sound and uniform currency and setting up the basis for our present commercial banking system.

This legislation provided for a network of national banks to operate side by side with the state chartered institutions and so established the basic financial framework which helped implement the imagination of Americans who developed the resources and built the industries that turned a continental wilderness into the world's createst land of plenty. Additions have been made to this framework through the years, as for example central regulation of the supply of money and credit established by the Federal Reserve Act of 1913. Banking today is as different from a hundred years ago as is everything else.

If you decide to tackle it at home and not send it to a professional drycleaner, be very careful about keeping it away from chloring bleach and strong soap. Another agent which may yellow the wool is hot water. To prevent yellowing of wool you should wash it often, before it is soiled. Use mild suds and lukewarm Use mild suds and lukewarm

If wool has yellowed from too much heat or from chlorine bleach, there is no way to whiten it again. However, if it has been yellowed by strong soap or detergent try soaking it in a solution of two tablespoons of hydro-gen peroxide to 1 gallon of cool water. Soak for at least one half hour and rinse. This may help to whiten the wool again.





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
