# THIS WOULD BE A SWITCH

"My paramount object in this struggle," wrote Abraham Lincoln to Horace Greeley on August 22, 1862, "is to save the Union, and is not either to save or destroy slavery. If I could save the Union without freeing any slave, I would do it; and if I could do it by freeing all the slaves, I would do it; and if I could save it by freeing some and leaving others alone, I would also do that.'

A century later we are confronted with the spectacle of the President of the U.S. proposing to Congress a sort of secession-in-reverse-by which the Union could withdraw from any state considered delinquent in its observance of an encyclopedic Civil Rights Acts of 1963 all funds allocated to the state under Federal spending programs. Carried to its ultimate, at the whim of bureaucrats appointed by Washington, such a concept must contemplate expulsion of a state-or states-from the union.

Such a prospect, when viewed against the background of President Lincoln's pre-occupation with national unity makes the specific civil rights proposals of President Kennedy of secondary importance. It also elevates from a suspicion to a reasonable supposition the increasingly-mentioned possibility that the Administration's eagerness for paternalistic spending programs cloaks the lust for unassailable power at the state level as well as the federal.

Whatever the effect of this glimpse at autocracy on the President's manifold recommendations for social reform, it should provide a warning to every Senator and every Representative to examine with special care every proposal to do for the individual or the community what it can better do for itself. And it should remind every thoughtful lawmaker of the historic high cost of break and circuses-in terms of human freedom and national

In concluding his civil rights mesage, President Kennedy said: "In this year of the Emancipation centennial, justice requires us to insure the blessings of liberty for all Americans and their prosperity-not merely for reasons of economic efficiency, world diplomacy and domestic tranquility-but, above all, because it is right."





## **SELF-DEFEATING TAX RATES**

The doctrine of "soaking the rich" may have a popular appeal-but as a revenue producer it is pretty much of a flop.

Henry Hazlitt tells the story in a recent issue of Newsweek. He writes:"The basic 20 percent rate yields 85 percent of the entire revenue from our personal income tax. Our whole progression up to 91 percent yields only 15 percent. And all the progressive rates above 50

percent yield less than 1 percent of total revenues."

The significance of this should be clear. Super tax rates do little to finance the government. Yet these rates deprive people in the higher income brackets of money that otherwise would be used for investment, for the building of new plants and facilities of every kind, and for creating jobs. The exorbitant rates, therefore, are self

# Let's Go

FIND 'EM, THEN FISH Fishin's easy. Finding fish is

the tricky part. This observation will take on more importance during the summer months as many thousands of vacationing fishermen try their luck on strange waters. How successfully the obstacle of finding fish is surmounted often determines the trip's success.

To make your job of exploring the depths easier and quicker, Mercury outboard fishing ex-perts outline several methods that will be helpful.

Your best bet, they say, is to hire a guide or enlist the aid of a friend who knows the waters. he cannot be with you each day, utilize his time in showing you a variety of "hot spots." Fish each only briefly, then move to another suggested location. The knowledge thus gained will be invaluable on succeeding days.

When exploring alone, keep your outboard running. You'll have to cover a lot of territory in order to pinpoint the places favored by local anglers with years of experience.

You can either troll or drift slowly while casting shoreline stretches and points of land that appear promising. The old trick of moving in reverse cuts speed to a minimum, allowing you to maneuver easily with one hand and cast with the other. It also permits you to maintain position in a wind.

Always ask plenty of questions ... at gas stations, tackle stores, marinas. Resort operators, whose businesses often depend upor fishing success of guests are

usually top sources.

Take the Mercury folks' advice: Remember that prospecting precedes the catching. Map your strategy accordingly, and you'll be able to spend more time fishing where the catching is good.
