## IT'S UP TO YOU By Howard E. Kershner, L.H.D.

THE U.S. Departments of Labor and Health, Education, and Welfare have allocated just under \$300,000

J. K. Kennedy took office in January, 1961. During the next two years unemployment dropped 713,000. The present ad-ministration would like to have us prod no farther, but a deeper investigation reveals that during the same period of time, the Kennedy Administration has added 125,141 persons to the federal civilian payrolls and drafted an-other 192,000 into the armed forces; 690,000 were added to the payrolls of the state and city governments. This totals 1,007,-141, and sixth grade arithmetic would tell us that there are nearly 300,000 more persons out of jobs in the private tax producing sector of our economy than there were when Kennedy be-came President.

In 1935 the cost of the federal, In 1935 the cost of the federal, state and local welfare programs was 6.49 billion dollars. Fifteen years later-1950-it had risen to just over 23 billion dollars. Ten years later-1960-it had reach-ed the gigantic figure of 51.88 bil-lion dollars. If it continues rising at the reise of the last decode by at the rate of the last decade, by the end of the century the welfare program will be costing far more than the entire national income today. In 1958 the Grace Line sold

two vessels to a Greek concern and transferred ten ship engineers to new ships without the less of a day's work. Nevertheless a New York Supreme Court justice awarded the ten engineers severance pay totaling \$200,000. That looks to me very much like legalized plunder. Robbery or theft might be better words.

Representative Arthur Younger gives a good example of the rate of bureaucratic growth. The Bureau of Outdoor Recreation had 15 employees and spent \$28,-000 in 1962. The following year the budget was \$1,100,000 and the

number of employees was 95. For the next year the Bureau had requested \$2,462,000 and 218 employees.





## News From The **County** Agent

Stockmen in many sections of the state with grazed out pastures are turning to supplemental pastures including drouth stunted plants of the sorghum family. B. T. Haws, county agent, points out that some danger of poisoning exists when these plants are graz-

The danger is from prussic acid, he explains. Prussic acid is the breakdown product of a glucoside normally present in some young, actively growing plants. It does not occur in a plant unless the growth is stopbed by moisture stress or frost. Moisture stress may result from inadequate soil moisture or from excess moisture loss due to high temperatures and low relative humidity.

Haws says all members of the sorghum family, including Johnsongrass and Sudan, produce the glucoside under favorable levels of fertility and that this group of plants is the most dangerous of commonly grazed forages. The more luxuriant the plant growth, the more likely it will be dangerous when wilted

If moisture stress is from depleted soil moisture, the plants may remain toxic for long periods, he says. If hot, dry winds cause the stress, the plants may be toxic only during the periods when evaporative losess exceed the plant's ability to pick up moisture from the soil. To illustrate, hungry animals turned into a feild during the hot afternoon might be poisoned, but if turned in early in the morning, might fill up and quit grazing during the period of the day when the forage would be toxic

### Babson Discusses Buying Household Needs

Not for quite a long time ave I discussed the best time of year to buy foods, fuels, and other household necessities. Yet, there is a best time to buy each item, and you may if you are responsible for a large, healthy family.

Importance of Freezing Units The biggest part of the family budget goes for food, so that should get the most attention. Food expenditures for the average family heavily emphasize meat. Of course, you cannot get really big savings unless you have a freezer of considerable capacity — so I heartily recom-ment your buying one if you have not yet done so. Otherwise, you can rent a unit in a public freezing storehouse, although that is not so cheap in the long run nor so convenient as it is to have your own. An emergency generator is probably a good idea, too, to protect your food in the event of a

power failure. First, let us take a look at seasonal trends in meat and poultry prices. The best time to buy is usually during Novem. ber and December when marketings of hogs, cattle, and chic- . ter. kens are seasonally very heavy. The big influx of supplies at this time forces price concessions at retail counters. How-

The heaviest laying season for hens is still March, April, and May. This means that egg prices are at their seasonal low point save considerable money if you usually during the spring. Read-know when it is, particularly ers should also note that spring eggs are the most successfully stored.

Prices of dairy products gen-erally are closely related to the milk flow, which reaches its seasonal high about June. If you are interested in storing dairy products, the best buys in butter can normally be expected in June or July. Cheese buying opportunities are delayed be-cause of the long curing period; November seems about the best time for this commodity. Fuels and Miscellaneous Items

In fuels, seasonal factors also play an important part in terms of prices. If you are heating with coal, you will save money by taking advantage of sum-mer reductions. Heating oils and kerosene are usually cheapest during the summer because of mounting refiners' stocks, low demand, and intensive competition. Gasoline prices generally dip lowest in mid-win-

Jot down the best seasonal buying time for a few other items: Canned peas, June; canned corn, July; canned toma-toes, August; canned salmon, usually August and September; dry beans, November and December; potatoes, late fall; rice and flour, August and Septem-ber: lard, December; citrus fruits, January or early Febru-ary; furniture, during February sales: furs August, and act sales; furs, August; and soft



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
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



