Mr. Vincent said. "The ratio of loss of life from fire to the population of the country has dropped as the population has increased. Studies also show that fire losses as compared with the amount of property and value of property subject to fire loss have actually been reduced steadily over the past 60 years, and these reductions are continuing during the pres-ent decade.
