concerned about crippled chilare many ways today in which a crippled child can be helped.

"It is important to get the best possible treatment for a child who has a handicapped condition as soon as it can be arranged.

At present, some 70 young-sters afflicted with a variety of crippling defects ranging from nine months to sixteen years of age receive treatments at the center where six professional therapists are on duty in addition to a consulting or thopedist. Mrs. Zimmerman said tha

the questionnaires are being sent to the schools because majority of people in this area." People who do not receive a copy of the questionnaire from the school can pick up a copy at their local physicians office. Upon receipt of the questionnaire, parents are asked to fill it in if

1. They have a crippled child of their own or a child with a speech disorder.

3. They know of some other person who is handicapped. The questionnaire should be returned by the student to the school where the collection will be made.

Mrs. Jack Wages, executive director of the Society and the Center pointed out that "handicapped" refers not only to body movements, but also to speech and hearing.





Research indicates The 1964 wool incentive and mohair support prices have been announced by the USDA. that more homemakers want

Shorn wool incentive price was set at 62c per pound and the mohair support price at 72c per en. pound for the 1964 marketing year.

The marketing year in 1964 coincides with the calendar year for the first time. This is in accordance with recent changes. Prices of pulled wool will continue to be supported at a

level comparable to the incentive price for shorn wool. The county agent notes that in 1961 marketing year Texas

wool producers received a gross incentive payment of \$10,094,-527.54.

The quality of eggs available to consumers today is higher than it was a few years ago, and in the future will be even higher, says B. T. Haws. This difference is true, whether the eggs are purchased at retail outlets or directly

from the farm. This increase in quality is due to scientific feeding of the laving hens and the improvement of the environmental conditions under which the eggs are kept from the time they are laid until homemakers purchase them. These environmental conditions are mainly prop-er refrigeration and controlled humidity. Another factor is

The county agent believes that eggs in the future will be of even higher quality than those marketed today, due to improved production and management practices, and better environmental conditions for handling them. The time required for the marketing of eggs will be further reduced, thus lessening the chance for loss in quality from the farm to the consumer.

The homemaker of the future will buy more of the high quality protein food.

Raw milk can be produced with a bacteria count of under 10,000 per cc with average conditions on Texas dairy farms. And with a little extra care in washing, cleaning and sanitiz-ing equipment it can be re-duced to less than 3,000. Milk
