### Civil Rights In The Living Room

But if the pending civil ights legislation is passed, the meowner will no longer be free to use and dispose of his property as in the past whenever his home has been finaned in the usual manner. There will be a federal agent at the door to tell him what to do. Many home owners assume that the civil rights bill has nothing to do with them. They assume the proposed legislation as something to do with voting rights, or education. They think that because they do not operate a large corporation in interstate commerce they will escape federal regulation.

That isn't so. The civil rights bill grants power under which may be required federal ap-proval of the deal, when the omeowner goes to sell. Or to rent even so much as one room. At the same time, the prospec-tive homebuyer or renter must pass federal inspection before he can accept the owner's of-



### Sen. Hart Mislabels His Bill

Congress, it seems, is to be asked by Michigan's Senator Hart and sundry do-gooding supporters to emulate the infamous Emperor Nero and fiddle while vital issues smolder-and while American housewives burn.

Mr. Hart dreamed up a measure that has been called the "Truth in Packaging Bill" which, in plain fact has nothing to do with truth and everything to do with Government control-regulation of the shapes and sizes and enforced drab uniformity of the packages in which the little woman may be allowed to buy foods, drugs and cosmetics.

Truth in packaging has already been taken care of A manufacturer may now be hauled into court anywhere, anytime for putting 11 ounces of something into a packanytime for putting 11 ounces of something into a pack- Irrespective of the architecage and labeling it 12, or making any other false claim tural styling of the basic house, on his label. Acres of office space are now being occupied by civil servants enforcing such laws.

Supporters of the bill (S-387) believe that the American housewife should buy on price alone. Even if she has shown her preference for convenience and attractiveness, for ingenious dual-purpose containers, these frills, say these theoreticians, are uneconomic (which isn't so, either) and should not be permitted. If a homemaker are attached to wood posts. The can buy more bug juice for her money in a jug with a cork in it, she shouldn't be allowed the luxury of a push button aerosol package.

Senator Hart and friends plainly do not trust us to know what is good for us. They do not think we are smart enough to get our money's worth without their help.

By the same token, they misjudge the concept of free enterprise by which American industry gained world leadership; and the force of competition-that has proved more effective than Government regulation in pressing values upward and prices down.

If the backers of the Hart Bill are right, then free elections are wrong. But most of us, we suspect will continue to prefer democracy in the polling booth—and in about 50 gallons. the market place.
