Daniels felt his call to the ministry while growing up in the Christian atmosphere of the Home. 

## Six Flags 19 Season To mence

Panama is complicating our foreign relations with all Latin America, and indeed with all countries:

Let's review a little back-ground. In 1902, the present Republic of Panama was a part of the Republic of Columbia. We sought to buy rights for a canal across the isthmus, but Columbia turned us down. So in 1902, Panama revolted from Columbia and our warships kept Columbian troops from landing in Panama Thus Panama's independence was obtained with the help of the Amer-ican Navy while Theodore Roosevelt was President.

Then in 1903, we signed a treaty with Panama by which we obtained rights in perpetuity to a ten-mile wide strip of land across the 50-mile wide isthmus, and we built the Panama Canal from 1904 to 1914. Panama reserved what is called titular sovereignty. We built the canal at a cost

of \$380 million and the lives of 4,000 American citizens from yellow fever and other causes. We paid the Republic of Pan-ama certain money. In recent FLAGS will be open on F years, Panama has demanded more money, so in 1959 we entered into another treaty with Panama and made concessions. We reaffirmed the titular sovereignty over the Canal Zone that remained with the govern-

\$1,900,000 a year. We also have setup a com-mission to improve U. S.-Panamanian relations. We agreed to pay the Panamanians who third straight record brea work in the zone higher wages. We bulit a thousand new housing units for Panamanian employees, and opened more job opportunities to Panamanians. And in September of 1960,

Some World War **Two Veterans Eligible for Loans** 

Many World War II veterans are still eligibile for GI home, farm and business loans, but time is running out, Glyndon M. Hague, Manager of the Vet-erans Administration Reigonal Office in Waco pointed out.

For great numbers of World War II veterans the deadline has already passed and the ter-minal date for all such veterans is July 25, 1967, under present law, the VA manager said

He explained that each veteran can figure out his own GI loan deadline date by using the following formula.

Add ten years to the date of his discharge from his last period of active service in World War II. Then add an additional year for each 90 days of active service in World War II. (Any remaining balance of less than 90 days cannot be used to extend the deadline).

For example, Mr. Hague said, a veteran with two and a half years of active service who was discharged on January 19, 1946 would add ten years to that date, arriving at January 10, 1956. Then for each 90 days period (four in each year and two in the half year peirod he would add a year or a total of ten more years, making his individual deadline date for GI loans January 19, 1966. Should he have served three full years, the extra two 90-days periods would have exceeded the maximum deadline date.

No individual date can be later than July 25, 1967, set by the governing law as the maximum date for World War II entitlement, Mr. Hague said. In the event that the veter-

Whatever your age - your nutritional well being depends largely upon the kind and amount of food you eat, according to Thelma Wirges. As we grow older and slow down on physical activity, less energy food is needed. The tendency to add pounds is a natural one, since many of us are likely to keep eating the

same kinds and amounts of

food When overweight threatens, its time to cut down on foods that furnish mainly energy (or calories) without carrying many vitamins, minerals or proteins. That includes sugar, candy, cake, cookies, pastry, gravies, oil salad dressing and fried foods.

On the other hand, when you do cut down on food, be sure not to slight milk, eggs, meat, fruits and vegetables. Eat a dark green or yellow vegetable daily. Drink a pint or more of milk daily to help fortify bones against breakage. Cheddar and cottage cheese will add calcium in a differnt form. Protein in every cell of the body must be replaced in order just as it is in younger persons. If he hasn't already done so, the farmer first files a report with the county ASC office on the farm's acreage and crops in 1959 and 1960. The county ASC committee will then send the farmer his feed grain base made up of the barley, corn and grain sorgum bases for each farm.

Next step, says Haws, is for the farmer to complete and file an intention-to-participate form at the county ASC office between February 10 and March 27. At that same time, the farmer may request an advance payment for the number of acres to be diverted from feed grain to conservation uses.

After these forms are filed, the farmer diverts the designated corn, barley, or grain sorghum acreage to a conserving use. The conserving use of diverted acres is in addition to the farm's normal acreage (1959-60 average) in conserving uses or practices, including summer fallow and idle land. Further details on provisions of the program are available from the county ASC and Extension offices.

Sign-up dates for the 1964 Feed Grain program will be February 10 through March 27, according to County Agent B. T. Haws. Wichtia County farmers planning to participate may sign up at the county ASC office at lowa Park any time during the sign-up period.

Two major changes have been made in this year's program, the agent points out. The maximum acreage which may be diverted has been raised to 50 percent (from 40 percent) of each farm's feed grain base. The payment rate per acre for diverting 40 percent or more will also be higher than in 1963.

Ine largest acreage for which payment can be made for diversion is 50 percent of the farm's feed grain base, or 25 acres if this is more than 50 percent of the base. As in the past, the smallest acreage that can be diverted for payment is 20 percent of the base. In other words, the 1964 pro-

gram is generally the same as last year, says Haws. The voluntary program combines corn, grain sorgnum and barley into a single feed grain base for each 1arm. Farmers participat-

sorghum and barley growers to analyze how possible participation in the feed grain program can affect their income and farming operations. He has budget forms to assist in this anarysis at his office.

To be eligible for feed grain price supports, Wichita County farmers must participate in the 1964 Feed Grain Program, advises B. T. Haws.

According to Haws, corn, barley and grain sorghum producers participating in the program will qualify for price supports on these crops. The first step is to file an intention-to-participate with the ASC county committee. The sign-up period is Februray 10 through March 27th.

Farmers then divert the signed-up acres to a conservation use or plant an approved substitute crop. At the same time, they maintain the conservation use acreage for the farm.

A participant staying within the feed grain base on all farms in which he has an interest will remain eligible for price supports, according to Haws. But he can limit participation in the program to one farm.

Price support payments will be made on the basis of established normal yields and the number of acres planted for harvest in 1964. These will amount to 15 cents a bushel for corn, 12 cents a bushel for barley, and 23 cents a hundred pounds for grain sorghum. Participating farmers will receive these payments regardless of whether the crop is harvested, fed to livestock, sold, or placed under price support loan.

#### Down With Hole Diggers

Dogs often dig holes because of sheer boredom. Sometimes they'll dig just for exercise, but it all stems from an age-old habit of digging for moles, chipmunks, or other game.

C. C. "Tex" Fawcett, Di-rector of the Purina Dog Care Division, says that you can keep your dog from dig-

ging again in a hole by placing one or two set mousetraps, covered with paper, in the hole. Once he springs them he'll be startled by the snapping noise and become pretty leery about further digging in that spot.

spot. Another way is to fill the hole with crumpled chicken wire well pegged down. Dogs don't like to dig against wire. You can also fill the hole with stones.

If your dog continues to dig, catch him in the act, scold him sternly and repeat the corrective procedure. He'll soon get discour-

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

BABSON, MASS. Upturns in selected commodity prices, especially nonferrous metals, are causing concern in some quarters. These could be the first signs of a broad price break-through on the upside within a a few years. Many are wondering whether this might be the

forerunner of a new wave of inflation

effective.

WHAT IS INFLATION No two authorities define inflation in exactly the same way. The economist take one point of view, the banker another, the manufacturer a third, and so on. But they all boil down nations abroad. to this: INFLATION COMES WHEN THE SUPPLY OF MONEY EXCEEDS THE SUP-PLY OF GOODS.

Such a situation occurs whenever there is a big enough increase in government or private credit to trigger higher prices and higher wages. It can also occur when there is an increase in the circulation of money, because this had the same effect that more money would have. In very recent years, careful money and credit management by the federal government - especially the Federal Reserve System - has kept inflation pretty much in check. 
