## BURK MAN IS STILL SEEKING BROTHERS HE LEFT IN 1893

Three young boys were placed in an orphan home in 1892. A year later one of them was adopted and left the home. He never saw his brothers again.

Robert Hammond currently lives with a married daughter, Mrs. Harold Lindsey in Burkburnett. He is 75 now and has been ill most of the last two years. But his search for his brothers has never stopped.

Hammond was four years old when he entered the Sisters Orphan Home in San Francisco, California with his two brothers, Charles and Edward. They spent a year there together, before Robert was adopted by a couple who were settling in this country from France. Thomas and Matilda Preston took young Robert to their home. The other boys remained in the orphanage.

Shortly after Robert was adopted, the Sisters Orphan Home caught fire and was destroyed. The two brothers were transferred to St. Vincent's School for Boys in San Rafael, California. Later, they too were adopted, one of them to a couple named Martinez, the other to a man and wife named Cunningham.

Meanwhile, Robert's adopted parents moved from San Francisco to near Denver, Colorado, where they stayed for about a year, then moved back to San Francisco.

## Governor John C. Connally To Make State-wide Telecast Over Twenty-two Stations Friday Night

Governor John Connally will review steps of progress for Texas under his administration in a special half-hour state-wide telecast Friday night of this week. The program will be carried on more than 22 stations in all parts of Texas. Tentative time in most areas is 8:30 p. m. on CBS stations.

It is the first major appearance by the Governor of his reelection campaign. He has made a few non-political appearances over Texas, but mostly concentrated on tending to duties of the governorship at Austin.

In the half-hour program, to originate from the State Capitol, Governor Connally is expected to stress several highlights of his administration since taking office. Foremost is likely to be the field of education, which has been a frequent theme of his statements. At the governor's recommendation, the 58th Legislature authorized creation of the Committee on Education Beyond the High

School, which currently is evaluating the state's educational resources and laying out a blue print for the future.

The governor also is expected to dwell on increased industry for Texas and points out that 317 new plants were built in the state last year — second only to New York. He also likely will point out that the state's new Texas 65 Health Plan provides the low cost medical care for aged as a result of legislation passed last year. More than 50,000 elderly Texans enrolled in the plan for first thirty days.

In addition to the statewide half-hour program, Governor Connally also has revived his popular "Coffee with Connally" series inaugurated two years ago. The five-minute informal program is scheduled in stations throughout Texas — in most areas on NBC stations during the Today show.

Mrs. John Connally carried out a busy schedule of coffee appearance in several Texas cities last week in support of her husband's candidacy.

But it would seem that it would not be cheap for the taxpayer, and also better for the health and longevity of these illiterate jungle peoples if the government withdrew from all this activity and encouraged the return of profit seeking gun-runners. The slaughter would be on a smaller scale, but it would save tax money and afford adventuresomeness an opportunity to make a solar new and then.

The National Jewish Hospital at Denver, a free nonsectarian treatment and research center, has specialized since 1958 in chronic chest diseases — and since that time has provided some 8 million days of care to patients accepted without regard to race, creed or national origin.

The work of the National Jewish Hospital is more important in 1964 than ever before. Chronic respiratory diseases are the most rapidly rising cause of disability in the nation.



At a testimonial dinner in New York City in May, Harold M. Lane, president of McCrory Corporation and chairman of Lerner Stores Corporation, will receive the hospital's first Golden Caduceus Award for leadership in encouraging research in chronic respiratory diseases.

**PROGRAM DEVELOPER**  
A long-time national trustee of the medical center, Mr. Lane has been a leader in developing the programs in drug-resistant tuberculosis, asthma, chronic bronchitis, emphysema and cystic fibrosis.

While a trustee of the hospital, Mr. Lane has seen the list of its financial supporters grow to more than 250,000 persons dedicated to advancing the work of an institution whose motto is: "None may enter who can pay . . . none can pay who enter."

## Florida Uses Safety Tags



Florida's 1964 license plates are "safety" tags covered with a reflective material similar to that commonly used by 16 other states and the District of Columbia. Pat Tierney, Miami, demonstrates the plates, which can be seen up to 1,500 feet after dark.

They have markedly reduced night rear-end collisions in the states that have been using them. The American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators recently recommended the adoption of the reflective license plates believing their widespread use would further its aim to promote highway safety and reduce automobile accidents. Referring to the five-cent additional charge for the "safety" plates, Col. Henry N. Kirkman, director of the Florida Department of Public Safety, said, "That's mighty cheap insurance."

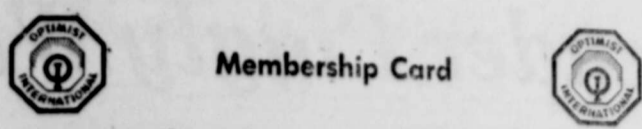

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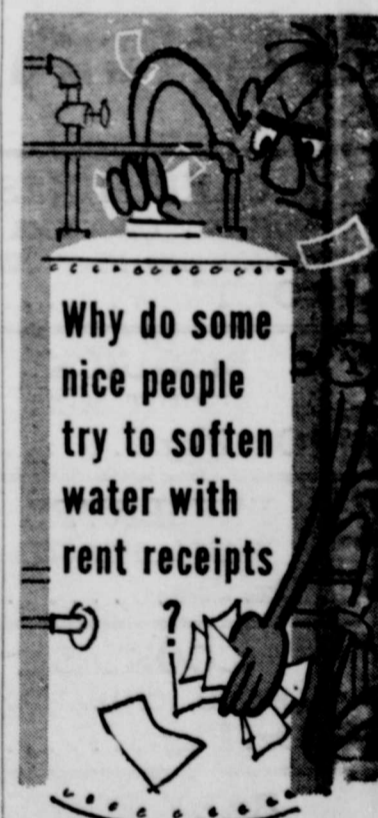

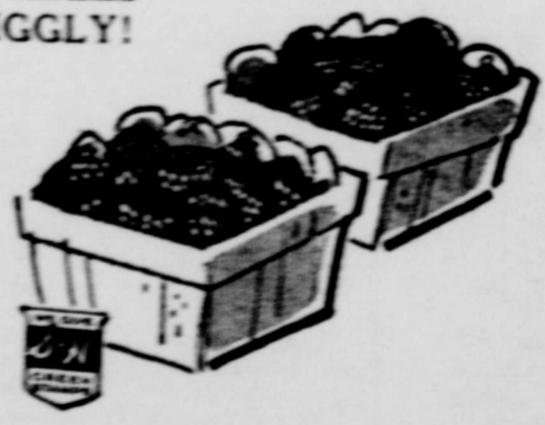

## News From The County Agent

The home owner who expects to grow beautiful trees, shrubs and flowers must carry out a preventative program against the diseases which commonly attack such plants in his area. It's really a case of where "a stitch in time saves nine," says county agent B. T. Hw.

For example, he adds, black spot and powdery mildew are common diseases of roses and occur annually in most rose gardens. If the gardener waits until these diseases have become severe, little can be done to eliminate the problem without causing the infected plants to suffer a loss in vigor and beauty, the county agent said. On the other hand, if a recommended fungicide spray or dust is used regularly, the disease can be prevented.

It is important that gardeners be able to recognize common diseases early in their development or better still, anticipate their occurrence. Control measures taken when the disease first appears will serve to insure the health and vigor of the plants, Haws explained.

In addition to protective foliar fungicides, the use of soil sterilants prior to planting can prevent infection of plants by soil born diseases. Such chemicals as Vapam, VPM, or Mylone are commonly used soil sterilants, but they must be used well in advance of planting, the county agent said.

The home gardener can prevent many diseases by keeping his plants in a healthy, vigorous state of growth. The use of adequate amounts of water and fertilizer will help produce healthy plants. When irrigating or watering, care should be taken to keep the water off the foliage, because fungi and bacteria are more likely to attack plant parts which remain damp, the county agent explained.

Control measures are known for most diseases which attack ornamentals, and publications on the subject are available at county Extension offices. MP-574, "Texas Guide for Controlling Diseases on Ornamental Plants" is one of the most popular, Haws said.

For an attractive lawn this summer, homeowners should review and plan lawn care, reports B. T. Haws, county agent.

Proper fertilization, watering and mowing are important, he says. Fertilization should continue through the growing season.

Start when grass begins to grow using a complete fertilizer. Haws suggests one having equal amounts of nitrogen, phosphate and potassium for this first application. Apply at the rate of two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet.

During the growing season apply nitrogen every eight to 10 weeks at the rate of one to two pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. Haws points out that nitrogen is the key element i turf growth. It produces the deep green color homeowners desire.

When watering the lawn, you should soak the soil to a depth of six inches.

"This encourages a deep root system that will utilize plant nutrients more efficiently and be more resistant to diseases." "Light sprinkling produces shallow, weak root systems that encourage weed infestations and disease."

Mowing should be frequent with a small amount of plant growth removed with each cutting. Haws recommends mowing only one inch off St. Augustine lawns at each mowing. St. Augustine should be cut at a height of two inches and Bermuda at 1 1/2 inches.

"Lawn mowers should be

sharp," he said. The blade should cut the leaves, not shredding or crushing tips. The machine should be in good running condition and have adequate safety devices. Stones, sticks and other objects should be removed so they won't dull the blade or be thrown dangerously by power mowers.

Additional information about lawn care can be found in the Extension Publications B-203, "Home Lawns" available at the county agent's office.

## McLendon Against Civil Rights Bill

Gordon McLendon concentrated his fire on the pending civil rights bill in the waning days of his campaign for the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator.

He followed a schedule designed to reach, through personal contact and communications media, the greatest possible number of voters before the May 2 Primary. His itinerary calls for thousands of miles of travel into all sections of the state by plane and helicopter. "My opposition to the bill being debated in the Senate actually is a crusade for civil

rights," he declared. "I'm not in favor of denying any of our citizens the rights granted them by the Constitution, but I am against the passage of this bill because certain sections of it threaten the civil rights of all citizens. Those provisions would deny everyone, regardless of race or national origin, the right of trial by jury and deprive us all of control over our property — including our very homes.

"Some of the people who are demanding the passage of this bill, without changing a word or a punctuation mark, evidently are misled. But I am convinced that the leaders who are mapping the strategy of this high-power campaign know exactly what they are doing. They see in this bill, with its disregard of fundamental civil liberties, another instrument of power over the lives of the American people."

McLendon emphasized that the only way of registering majority opinion on the principles involved in the campaign is to vote in the Democratic primary.

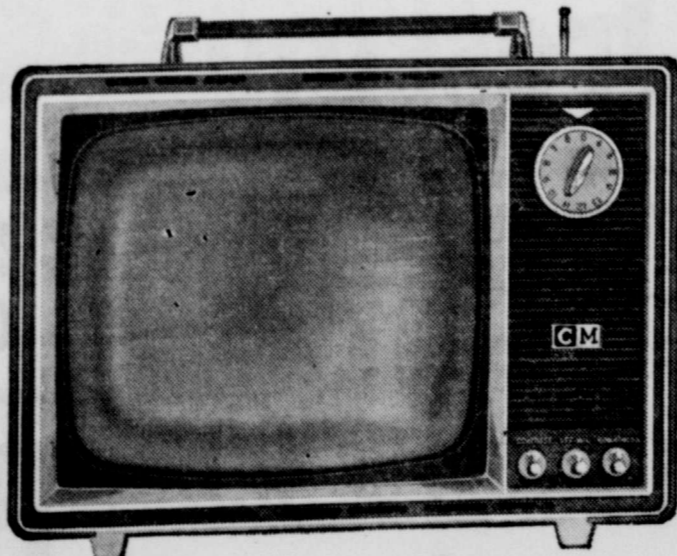

should have been brought out at this time for political purposes. I only arrive to show where I have done anything dishonest. I have respected my official dignity by refusing to knowingly solicit votes from my family or employees. I would appreciate it if he would operate under the same code of ethics and refrain from harassing my family in this respect. Some areas should be sacred, even to politicians. Other than the above, I have no criticism of my worthy opponent.

"I wish to assure my many friends who petitioned me to run for the tax office, that some of the things I hear, if true, are most unfortunate concerning the opposition, but will not be repeated by me or my family. I cannot speak for my best of friends, but I sincerely trust that they will assist me in keeping the discussion on a high moral plane.

"Good business judgment dictates that the large majority of present deputies should be retained for proper operations of the office. I have never required a county employee under my supervision to work one minute overtime. Overtime pay in any county office is not provided. My personal overtime was volunteered and not compulsory. I propose, during the rush periods in the tax office, that my time will continue to be at the disposal of the people of our county as it has for the past years.

Where savings can be accomplished, I will pursue them. I worked with the district clerk and judges to bring about a saving in the expense of notifying jurors. Now completed this system is saving hundreds of taxpayers dollars every month. Jurors are now notified by 4 cent postcards rather than by registered and certified mail as previously. Registered mail currently costs 75 cents. You may calculate the savings if you wish."

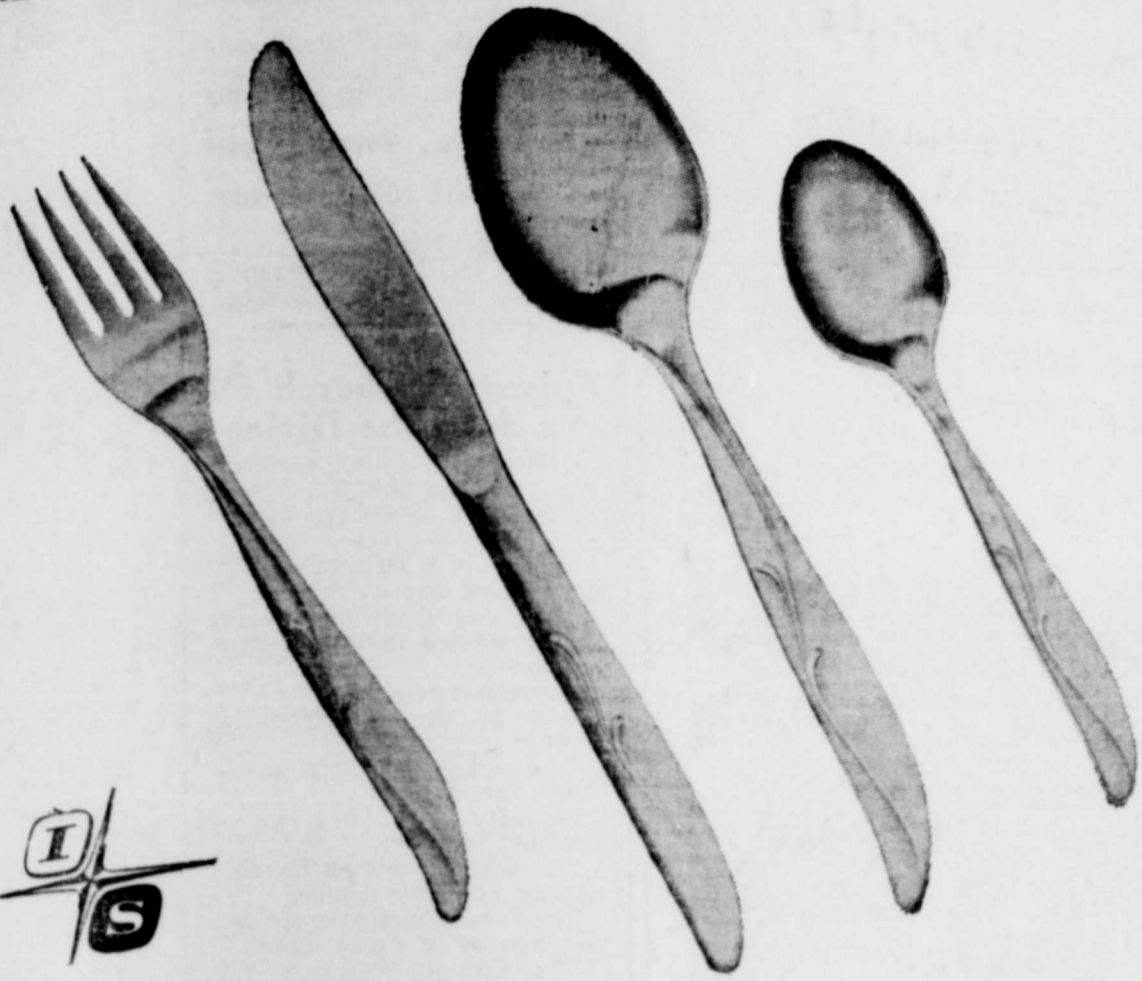

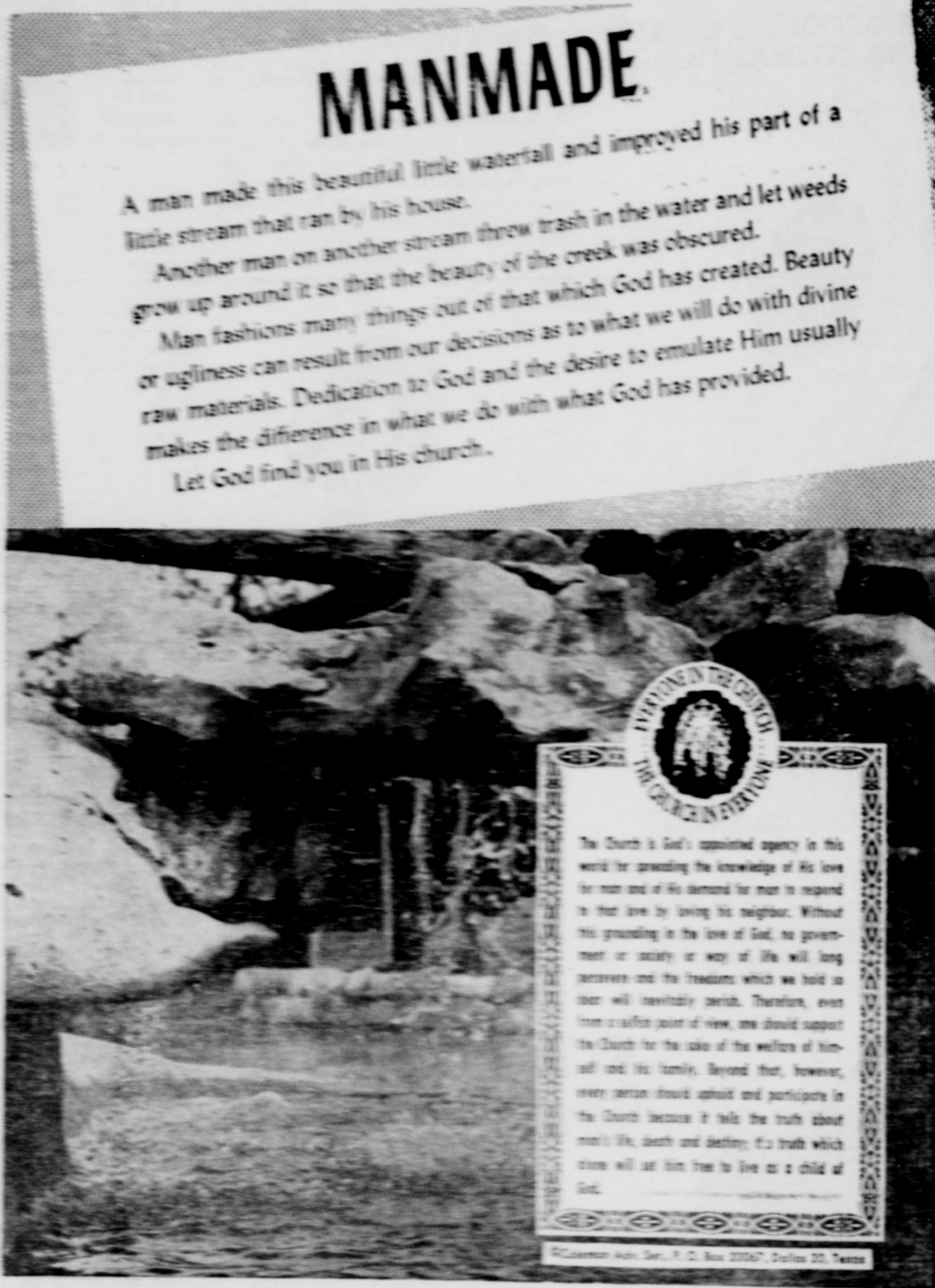

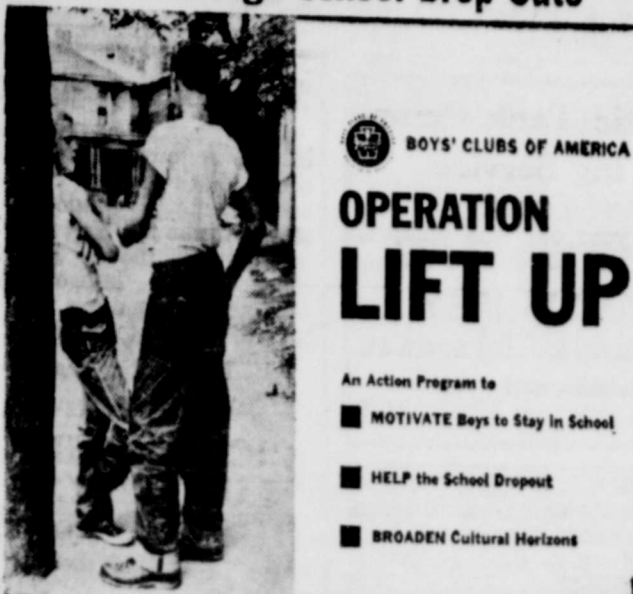

Youth unemployment and high school "drop outs," while twin problems of understandably great concern to so many authorities, are not truly new to the Boys' Clubs of America.

For more than 50 years, this national youth-guidance organization has conducted programs designed to combat what they term "this dissipation of great natural resources." The latest of these, "Operation Lift-Up," is now in operation through some 635 Boys' Clubs in more than 425 cities and towns.

Utilizing the experience and knowledge gained during generations of dealing with youngsters who will seldom have the opportunity to attend college, Boys' Clubs do an effective job of halting, if not eliminating, this contagion.

Testimony as to the importance of their work has been appearing in many cities and towns. Recently, in a national magazine article titled "They Help Boys Want To Be Educated," great credit was given the fine work being done by Chicago Boys' Clubs. Similar programs are being successfully conducted in Wilmington, Del., in Boston, San Francisco and dozens of other cities.

It's all part of what the Boys' Clubs of America calls its "Juvenile DECENCY" program. Seems to work, too.

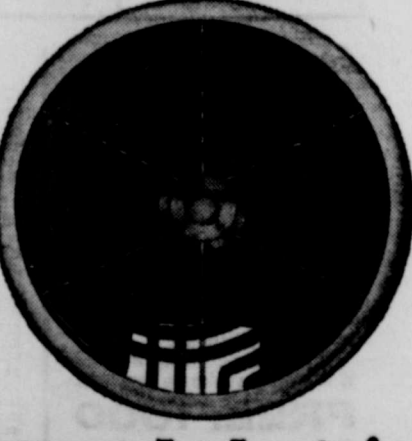

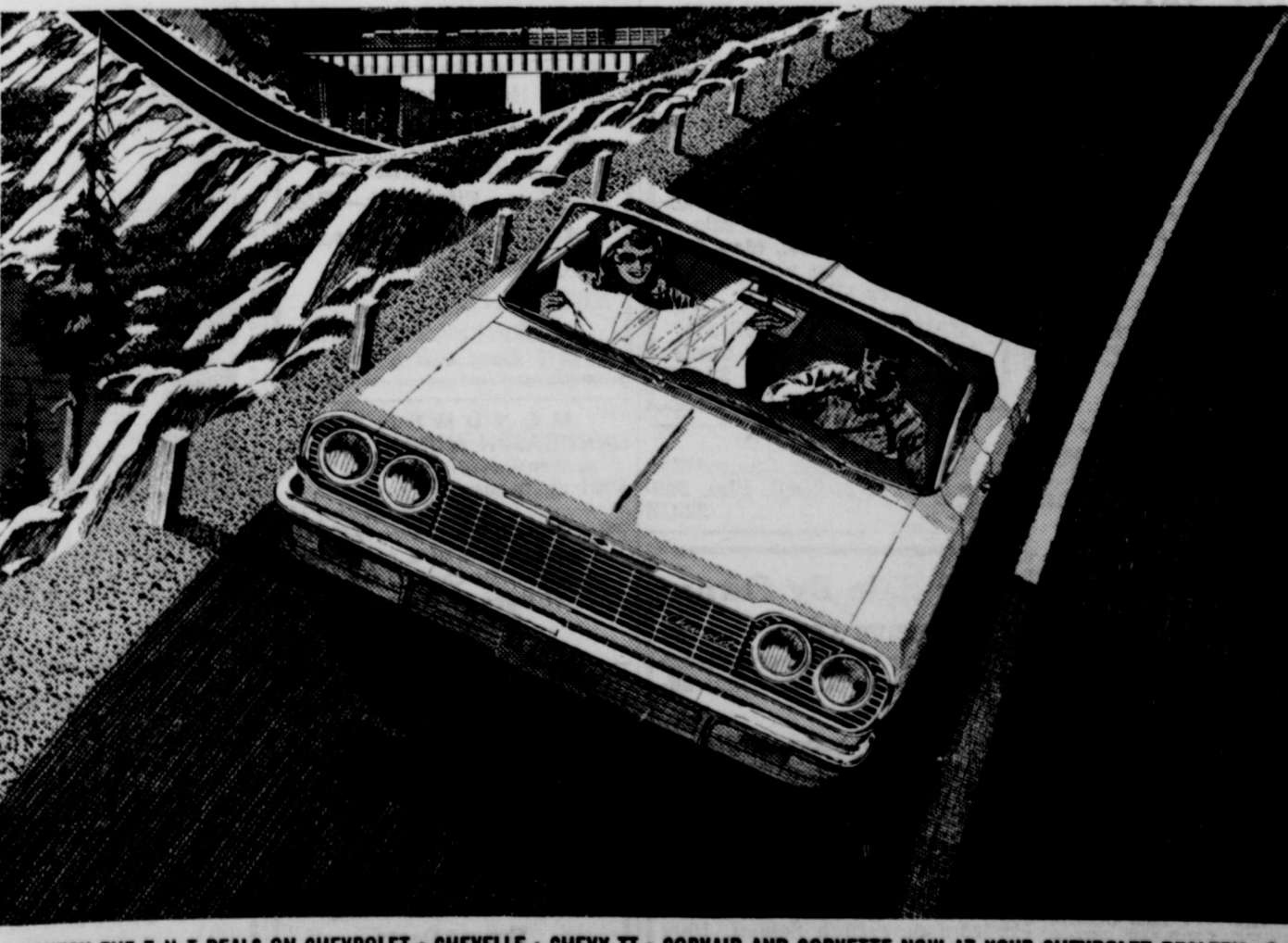
