News From The **County Agent**

The home owner who expects to grow beautiful trees, shrubs and flowers must carry out a preventative program against the diseases which commonly attack such plants in his area. It's really a case of where "a stitch in time saves nine," says county agent B. T. Hw.

For example, he adds, black spot and powdery mildew are common diseases of roses and occur annually in most rose gardens. If the gardner waits until these diseases have become severe, little can b done to eliminate the problem without causing the infected plants to suffer a loss in vigor and beauty, the county agent said. On the other hand, if a rec-ommended fungicide spray or

dust is used regularly, the disease can be prevented. It is important that gardeners

be able to recognize common diseases early in their development or better still, anticipate their occurence. Control measures taken when the disease first appears will serve to insure the health and vigor of the plants, Haws explained.
