



Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance 488 Madison Ave., N. Y. 22, N. Y.

Q. In many businesses today, there seem to be more and more mergers and consolidations, and fewer and fewer companies doing business. Is this happening in the life insurance business?

A. Although there are occasional mergers in the life insurance business, there are now more life insurance companies in the United States than ever before in history. The number has passed the 1,500

A survey by the Institute of Life Insurance shows that there were 1,503 legal reserve life companies in business throughout the nation on June 30th. This was an increase of 31 companies over the 1,472 doing business at mld-year 1962.

Smaller companies, specializing in the life insurance needs of families in their regions, are compet-ing successfully and in fact have



been growing faster than many larger companies. Only about 1% of the life companies do business in all 50 states. At least two life insurance companies are chartered in each state, with more than half the states having 15 companies or more with main or "home" offices in those states.

Texas, Arizona and Louisiana lead in numbers of home-based companies, but New York, New Jersey and Connecticut companies had the largest amounts of life insurance in force.

Q. How much life insurance does the average family own?

A. The average amount of life insurance among insured families at the end of 1962 was about \$14,300. The average for all families in the United States was \$11,400. While this figure has more than doubled in the past decade, it is still equivalent to only about 21 months of average disposable income per family.

#### More Insulation. Pays Off In Lower Bills

Many new homes today are not insulated well enough to provide either optimum comfort or heating and cooling economy. Fortunately, this can be remedied after occupancy. Mineral wool insulation can be blown into exterior walls and attics by a contractor who uses pneumatic equipment.

Many families find that savings on heating often pay for the cost of the additional insulation in a few years. Insulating to recommended standards also adds to the resale value of the house.

An insulating formula estab-lished by the National Mineral Wool Insulation Association calls for home owners to use mineral wool with an installed resistance to heat loss of R-19 in ceilings, R-11 in walls and R-13 in floors above unheated spaces.
