# From 'Bury' To Borrow

Recent developments in Russia and in one of its satellites are steeped in irony.

That's because Premier Khrushchev has been compelled to try to bolster his faltering industrial output by instituting principles of free enterprise\_\_the very system that he vowed to "bury".

Here are typical examples of the "copycat" trend: A new cash bonus arrangement for factory managers and workers has been installed in six major industries in an effort to improve quality, as well as, quantity production. (This is a far cry from the not-too-distant time when plant managers were reportedly "liquidated" for failing to meet quotas.)

A textile mill in Bulgaria, which was allowed to func-

tion very much in the fashion of a private American style plant, proved to be a rip-roaring success. It completed its yearly production plan six weeks ahead of time, made a substantial profit, boosted workers' earnings by 10 per cent and greatly expanded employment in the community (Actually, this operation was a back-lash because the Soviet planners initiated it to 'show up" the free enterprise system and their faces rivaled the red in their flag when the project hit the jack-pot and the Bulgarian public demanded that many more factories be allowed to operate in the same manner.)

While these moves represent only surface-scratching shifts in Soviet economic policy it certainly must be mighty embarrassing for Khrushchev to have tacitly asknowledge the superiority of our system by borrowing

Roger W. Babson says: "... politicians and labor leaders want men to be manageable in units. Their goal can be far more easily achieved if individualism can be submerged . . . In America's a-borning period, the rugged individual never let his private convictions be smothered by the group judgment of a committee, a board of directors, or even a political party. A man believed that 'one with God is a majority.' Democracy came from many hours of 'cracker-barrel' discussion in country stores where quiet reigned. Thinking requires quiet, and time enough to relax and chew things over.'

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
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
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

# News From The County Agent

Important contributions are being made to stabilize wheat production and farm income by the outstanding test weight of new varieties of wheat. These varieties have been developed by the Small Grain Section of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Crockett, Tascosa and Cad-

do wheat varieties have produced an average test weight ranging from 2 to 4 pounds per bushel greater than varieties grown 10 to 20 years ago. This has resulted in the grower receiving No. 1 wheat prices most seasons. Normally No. 1 wheat sells from 3 to 10 cents more than No. 2 wheat which means an additional return of \$3.00 on each 100 bushels.

Comparative tests in Texas over an 8 year period gave an average test weight of 61.5 for Caddo, Tascosa and Crockett while Comanche, Tenmarq and Turkey averaged 58.5 pounds per bushel in the same tests. Insecticides for use around
