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Self-Sealing Shingles Fight Winds

In revising its code aimed at making roofs more resistant to winds, the FHA has issued standards for roofing installation in high-wind, medium-wind, and low-wind zones.

The code now requires cementing down the tabs of asphalt shingles on all roofs in high-wind areas, specified as over 90 m.p.h. In areas where winds reach a maximum velocity of 80 to 90 m.p.h., the alternative to cementing is use of shingles weighing 275 pounds per 100 square feet. Low-wind requirements are left to local officials, but cementing is recommended wherever winds over 70 m.p.h.

in all zones. Roofing contractors favor selfsealing asphalt shingles which have factory-applied cement that softens under the sun's heat. causing the shingle tabs to adhere to the course below.

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


