Burk Water Supply Holding Out "Well"

Burkburnett residents used 33,901,000 gallons of water during June. City Manager Jess Whatley said the city's facilities met all demands. The city added nine more operational wells to its 58 in operation last year. The supply from wells located east of town is holding out very well. July and August, Whatley notes, are the heavy water demand months. When temperatures remained in the 100 degree levels, the town's pumping facilities constantly run. Whatley said two years ago when temperatures were at the 104-107 degree mark for several days, it was necessary to alternate the operation of pumps. The town is now using a new type pump submerged in the well. This type pump which pushes rather than draws the water is better than conventional pumps. Burkburnett is cooperating with a manufacturer in the improvement of this pump, which later will be actually submerged deep in the well. When fully developed, this pump will eventually eliminate the need for surface engines propelling conventional water pumps.

Burk Street Paving Awaits Owner Consent

City officials of Burkburnett are ready to pave College Street from Avenue D to Preston. The city's share of the costs has been appropriated and only agreement of residents along the street remains to be made. The agreement sought from property owners by the city calls for a charge of \$1.25 per foot payable in cash or time payment at five percent interest for two years. The note can be paid at the bank or at the city manager's office. Consideration has been given to the fact that the property owners participation plan for College Street will be a burden to a few. However, the fact that the improvement will raise property values and not increase taxes overrides foreseen difficulties. City Manager Jess Whatley says at present College does not have a sidewalk for use of school children. The proposed project will alleviate this as it calls for a sidewalk on the southside of the street. Whatley says all construction planning is complete. Consequently, work will begin as soon as property owners sign agreements. The agreement includes building curbs and gutters along the entire street. The city on its own, is planning to improve one block of East Second from Ave. C to D. 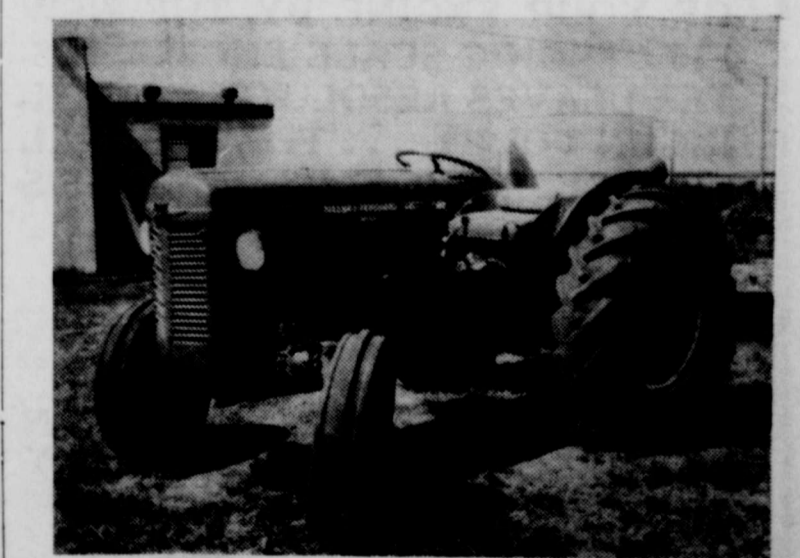

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Self-Sealing Shingles Fight Winds

In revising its code aimed at making roofs more resistant to winds, the FHA has issued standards for roofing installation in high-wind, medium-wind, and low-wind zones.

The code now requires cementing down the tabs of asphalt shingles on all roofs in high-wind areas, specified as over 90 m.p.h. In areas where winds reach a maximum velocity of 80 to 90 m.p.h., the alternative to cementing is use of shingles weighing 275 pounds per 100 square feet. Low-wind requirements are left to local officials, but cementing is recommended wherever winds over 70 m.p.h. have been experienced.

The new standard calls for cementing down the tabs of asphalt shingles on low-slope roofs in all zones.

Roofing contractors favor self-sealing asphalt shingles which have factory-applied cement that softens under the sun's heat, causing the shingle tabs to adhere to the course below.
