southeast of Burkburnett de-stroyed a King Oil Co. pump-ing station and burned about 30 acres of grass. The fire was first spotted about 12:05 p. m. Sunday.

Ed Rogers, field superintend-ent for the firm, estimated it would cost about \$2,000 to replace the contents of the building, a large gas engine pump-ing several oil wells.

Rogers said he believed a live carbon spark from the engine started a grass fire that backed into the building The engine was still running as the fire was being fanned by a southeast wind. Downwind there were no buildings or oil field

Says Thelma Wirges, the Wi-chita County Home Demonstra-tion agent: "Whether renting or owning a home, a monthly cash outlay is necessary. The amount that can be spent for housing can be determined best by planning a realistic allow-ance for all living expenses."

To determine that portion of the family income that is available for housing, the home agent suggests listing the amount spent on the following items - either on a monthly or annual basis: - Food, cloth ing, Utilities, medical care.

Life insurance, contributions savings. Recreation and entertainment

Transportation, installment payments

School and college

Also to be listed are: - Total living expenses other than housing

Total income minus tax and retirement deductions. Total net income minus liv-

ing expenses other than hous-





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

- 1. Know your controls. Learn how to stop the engine quickly in an emergency.

Never cut the grass by pulling the mower towards you. Stop the engine before pushing the mower across gravel drives, walks or roads.
