

000, with proportionate increases for other public officials and em-ployees of the federal govern-ment. It should be noted also that ment. It should be noted also that many of these public officials, specially Senators, Congressmen, and Cabinet officers, enjoy a great variety of perquisites and allowances, some of which are tax exempt and which greatly increase the income of these persons far beyond the figures noted above. Until there is a scarcity above. Until there is a scarcity of able men and women who are willing to serve in the top posi-tions in Washington, we believe the further expenditure of money for higher salaries is highly undesirable.

In a period of great prosperity, we are, nevertheless, increasing the federal debt many billions of dollars every year. No man in his right mind will borrow money and pay interest in order to in-crease his own salary, but that is exactly what Congress and the President have done. Forty odd years ago, Congressmen were paid \$3,000 per year, and there was no dearth of competent men seeking to represent the people in Washington, In those days serv-ing the public in that capacity was considered a high honor.

During the last gear for which figures are available, the federal government paid 18.9% of the cost of our colleges and universities: the state governments paid 22.9% and local governments 2.6%. Adding these three figures we find that government paid 44.4% of the cost of operating our colleges and universities. Of the remaining cost, student

tuition fees paid 20.7%, private gifts and grants 6.4%, endowment and general income 9.4%, dormitories, cafeterias and dining halls 17.5% and student aid

BABSON DISCUSSES THE "COLLECTING" CRAZE

I doubt that there has ever been such a craze for collecting things as there is throughout the country today. Coins, old furniture, stamps, glassware, books and many other articles are being sought and hoarded on an almost unbelievable scale. What is behind this scramble for collectors' items-why has it reach-

ed such a fever pitch?
INFLATION FEARS MAY BE BEHIND IT

It is my opinion that people have always loved collecting material things that have caught thtir fancy. History indicates this, especially through archaeological studies. But today there seems to be an extra incentive, and I believe that it is a conscious (or sometimes unconscious) fear of inflation. When you stop to think of it, inflation has been going on for longer than statistics have been available. It is punctuated by only temporary periods of deflation, then it resumes. So the assumption by most people that more inflation will come seems

reasonable enough. Even the most casual economic observer knows that money itself becomes less valuable intrinsically as the cost of the goods it will buy increases. Therefore many seem to feel if they start hoarding some articles these are going to be more in terms of dollars in days to come and they will be better off than if they hoarded the dollars themselves. You probably wonder whether I believe in such collecting as a type of hedge against possible further declines in the purchasing power of the dollar.
