



A change aimed at making major improvements in Burkburnett's public telephone service was made last week.

All "coin" or "public" tele-phones in Burkburnett are now Pre-Pay" instead of "Post-Pay."

"Pre-pay simply means a user will have to deposit a dime or two nickels before he can receive a dial tone. After the user receives the dial tone, he can dial his number, Dub Deuschle, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, explained. 'If the called number does not answer or if the number is busy, the customers money will automatically return," he said. Under the old system, a customer dialed his number then received a special tone when the called party answered. He deposited his dime or two nickels at this point.

Telephone technicians have been at work several weeks installing the special additional equipment needed to make the more popular "pre-pay" service work, Deuschle said.

"Pre-pay" is the more popu-lar and more widely used type of coin telephone service.
