The Burkburnett Bulldogs face a stern test Friday night, when they host the Graham Steers, last years district 4AAA representatives in an 8 p. m. conference battle at Bulldog (Morgan) Stadium.

The teams have one or two things in common. One, they have both lost their last two games, and two, they both lost the bulk of last year's starting team. However, the Steers had several more returning lettermen and a bigger junior varsity. The Steers started off in a big way, winning their first two games, but then nitting a blank wall, as they lost their next two by shutouts, 20-0 to Weatherford and 16-0 to Sweetwater.

The Bulldogs have yet to taste victory, but have been shutout only once, that by the powerful Rider Raiders. Last week, a perhaps, slightly underrated Iowa Park team lowered the boom on the Bulldogs for a 35-6 win. For a spell it looked as if the Bulldogs were losing their fighting spirit, but near to the end of the game they came storming back in their usual form, crossing the Hawk's goal line in the final stanza, a feat matched only by the Hirschi Huskies.

This week is another story. The Bulldogs are looking forward to their first district encounter with renewed vigor and determination, and they don't feel like they're out of this contest by a long shot. They feel like Graham can be beaten by a hard working team and they're working hard. Need more be said?

The Steers top weapon might possibly be fullback, Bill Ingram, 180 pound power man. Quarterback Preston Pratt has been known to throw the football and one of his favorite targets is end Terry Collins. Collins is also a fine defensive man.

The Bulldogs will utilize the services of several backs who shown well against the Hawks. Tommy Olds gained 49 yards in 13 carries from his fullback position. Reserve fullback Dean Thompson added 36 yards in 6 tries, followed by Rusty Kinnett, with 28 in 7 and Bob Hubble with 21 in 6. Rod Turner carried 3 times for 13 yards, and Bill Roe picked up 9 yards in 2 attempts before going out with a twisted ankle.

Robert Jones, Pete Glover, David Salter, John Carrah, Ollie McDonald, Jerry Bingham, and Dean Thompson all looked sharp on defense and should be in the thick of things again this week.

The Bulldogs were somewhat stunned last Friday night, but they don't intend for it to be that way this week. The kickoff time is 8:00 p. m., and the Bulldogs were over heard yelling "Get Graham!"

### Rural Water District No. 1 Cotton County \$128,000 Loan Approved for Randlett, Okla.

The loan will enable the Randlett Community to drill wells, construct a pumping station; erect a 50,000 gallon water tank; and lay 15 miles of pipeline.

Approximately 25 people will be employed in the construction of the water system; this includes the engineer, well drillers, operators of the ditch digging equipment, and day laborers. When completed, the system will be capable of delivering 60,000 gallons of water a day.

State Director Maxey reports that the construction of the water system will mark a milestone in the history of the Randlett community. Residents of this community have been hauling water for a number of years.

This system will enable families to modernize their homes and will make water available to the school and business firms in Randlett. It is estimated that at least twenty new homes would be built in Randlett when the new water system is installed.

The Farmers Home Administration loan is to be repaid over a period of 40 years, based on an insured basis by the Funds for the loan are provided Amalgamated Trust and Savings Bank of Chicago, Illinois.

Mr. Wesley Beard, Randlett, is chairman of the Board of Directors; Leroy Laminack, Randlett is vice chairman of the Board of Directors; and Robert Eastman, Secretary - Treasurer. Floyd Justice and Jesse Goode both of Randlett are directors.

Rural water systems are available to water districts operating on non-profit basis. Small rural towns under 2,500 population are also eligible under the Farmers Home Administration loan program.

Houston spoke on the purpose of the organization and its operations. Mr. Houston is now a local painting contractor.

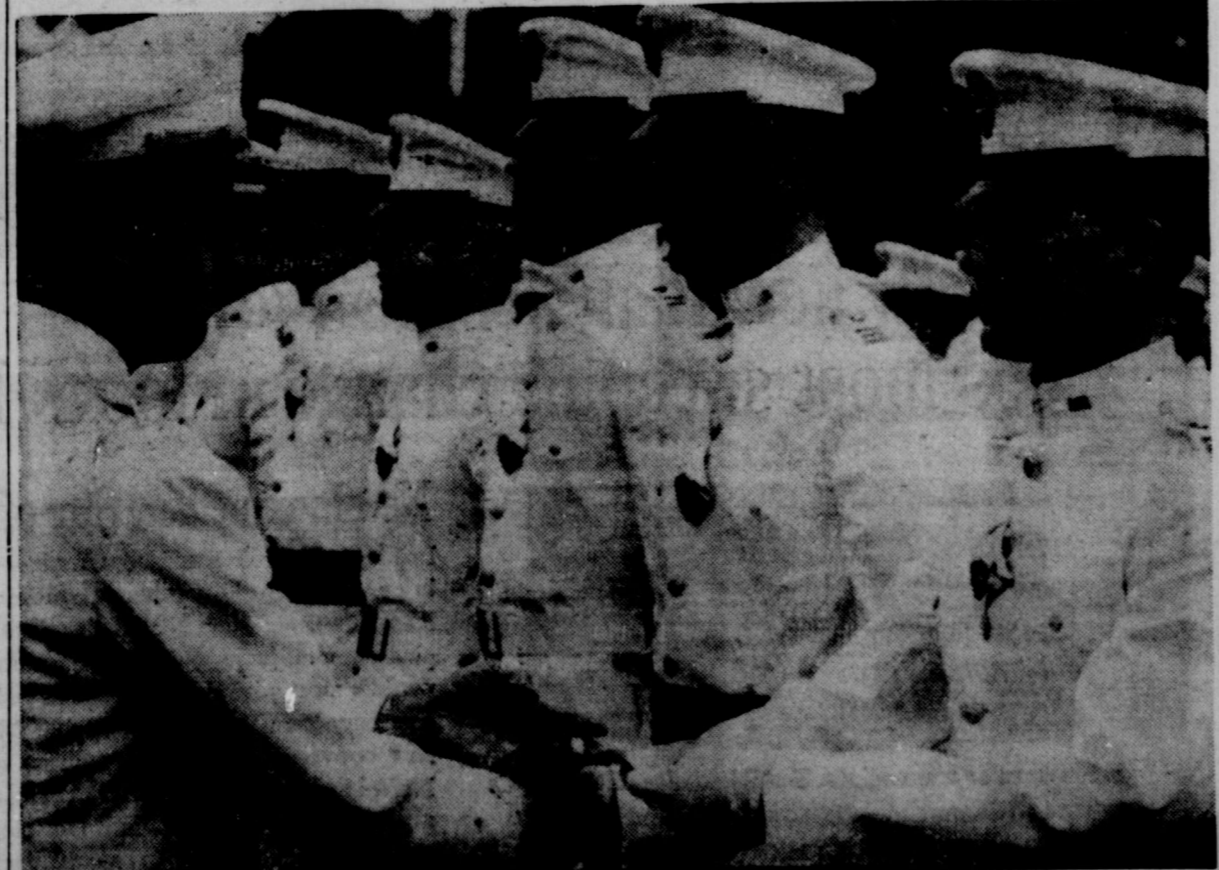

## NATIONAL NEWSPAPER WEEK

National Newspaper Week is to be observed during the October 11-17 period. And when, over those days, editors risk the appearance of immodesty by blowing their own horns, they have a right and an obligation to do just that.

The local newspaper provides a service that is unique, irreplaceable, and a fundamental part of our national life. Its pages tell an endless story of the events, great and small, that influence and determine the destinies of each of us. There is good news and bad — but, whatever its character, it is part of the scheme of things. Only the newspaper can adequately record it — and keep it as history in the ever-growing files of past issues.

Beyond this, there is no freedom more vital than that of freedom of the press. A good newspaper is, in a sense, a watchdog of the public. It stands for integrity and fair dealing in public and private affairs. Newspapers, on innumerable occasions, have unearthed and revealed violations of trust that would otherwise have remained forever buried. And newspapers have successfully fought for every conceivable kind of reforms, often against disheartening odds, that the public interest demands.

No other nation has a press quite like ours, ranging as it does from great metropolitan dailies down to the

smallest of the country weeklies. Every one of our thousands of papers, each working in its own special way, is a vital part of the great edifice of freedom on which this country rests.

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

The 41,000 mile-long Interstate Highway System is the biggest public works program in the history of man. The original cost estimate, made in 1956, was \$27.5 billion. The most recent is \$41 billion. The next cost appraisal, due in 1965, is expected to show a further jump.

The Department of Agriculture has reported that Americans smoked 16 billion fewer cigarettes during the first half of this year than in the comparable period of 1963. That was a 6.5 per cent decline. Cigar sales, on the other hand, increased about 12 per cent.

If you drive children to school, says the Portland, Oregon, Traffic Safety Commission, never allow them to leave the car except from the curb side and always let them out on the school side of the street. Don't jeopardize their safety and ignore an opportunity to set the proper example just to save a few seconds.

In 1955, the federal government owned just under 408 million acres of land in this country, — 21.4 per cent of the total acreage. Last year it owned almost 770 million acres — or 33.9 per cent of all the land.

## Household Hints

Working wife? There are more than 15 million of us. "Going to work" plus keeping house really equals two full-time jobs—but if you apply business practices to your household operation, you can short-cut your at-home worktime without short-changing your family. Here are five thought-starters for becoming an "organization woman" in your own home:

1. Memo-rize. Write memos, keep continuing lists for the grocery store, drug, department stores and milkman, then when you're ready to order you'll have the week's needs all in one place. If you can never find a pencil and pad try one of the magnetic combinations which includes a pencil on a chain and tuck it up near the telephone.
2. Put your telephone to work for you. First, tape a small file card with most-called numbers near each phone. You'll save time and energy if you buy your groceries, household supplies and whatever else you can siting down with telephone in hand. When shopping for groceries stock up on staples and you won't have to shop as often.
3. Install a bulletin board in your kitchen area. If you don't have a special place for a board, use the side of the refrigerator. You can attach notes and lists to it with miniature clothespin magnets. Good place for appointments, family job assignments and shopping lists, too!
4. Keep all appliance instruc-

tions and information in one place even if it's a brown envelope in the kitchen drawer. That way you'll be able to spot minor repair needs as they occur, and also refresh yourself from time to time on caring for your equipment. This cuts down on service calls and on the frustration of inactive household machinery.

Another tip: Make a list of repairmen and services and write it on the outside of the envelope.

5. Organize your cleaning products to save steps. Put small items in a portable tote of some kind and include versatile products—one product that will do the work of two or three means less work for you. For example, a high-concentration pine oil cleaner will clean, disinfect and deodorize all in one operation. You can use this triple-duty product in every room of your house—even in the laundry room as well—as an addition to the wash water to cut down germs present in every family's wash.

All these tips will help short-cut the working gal's homemaking time and at the same time streamline housekeeping for the at-home homemakers.

We all filled out a membership card for the county agent. The members that were present were Mary and Mar-

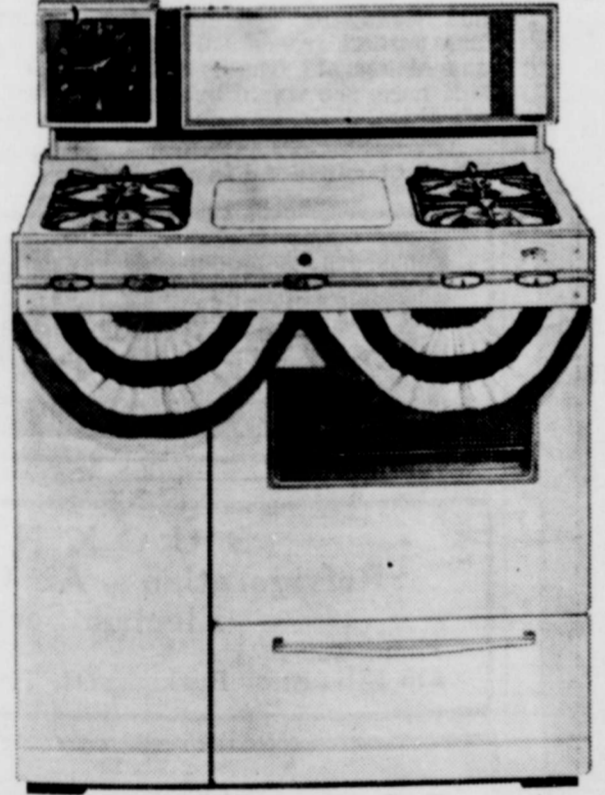
